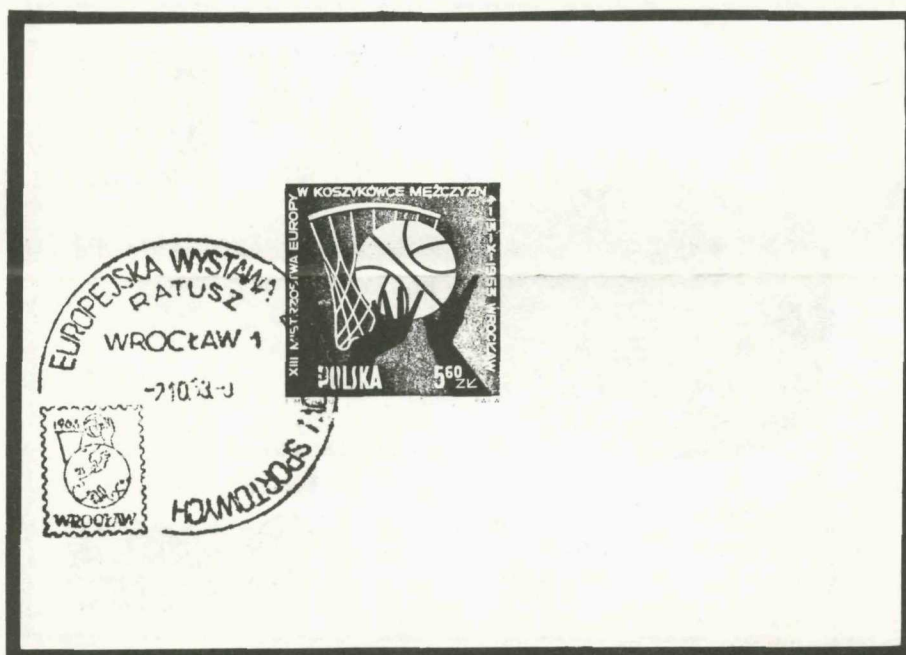

## BASKETBALL AND THE 1963 EUROPEAN SPORT STAMP EXHIBITION

Basketball was invented in the winter of 1891 by Dr. James A. Naismith. Dr. Naismith was seeking a vigorous indoor sport to bridge the gap between the football and baseball seasons for the students at the International Y.M.C.A. College (now Springfield College) in Springfield, Massachusetts. Although his first rules established a game which was comparatively crude in comparison with today's fast-moving spectacle, little did Dr. Naismith dream that his simple fill-in game would become thoroughly international in scope.

Basketball first spread throughout the world via Y.M.C.A. workers trained at Springfield, but before long the game progressed by leaps and bounds through its own momentum until today it ranks behind soccer as the second most important international sport. Over ninety stamps have been issued either to commemorate basketball competitions or using basketball scenes as all or part of the motif.

Basketball was added to the Olympic slate in 1936 and other national, regional, and world championships have sprung up for both men and women throughout the world. The first European Games for this sport were held in Geneva in 1935; others followed in Riga in 1937 and in Kaunas in 1939. After World War II competition was resumed in 1947.

Poland had sponsored an organized international competition for women in 1958, but its first European men's championship took place in Wroclaw on October 4-13, 1963, with sixteen countries participating. (Editor's note: The stamps and first-day covers issued



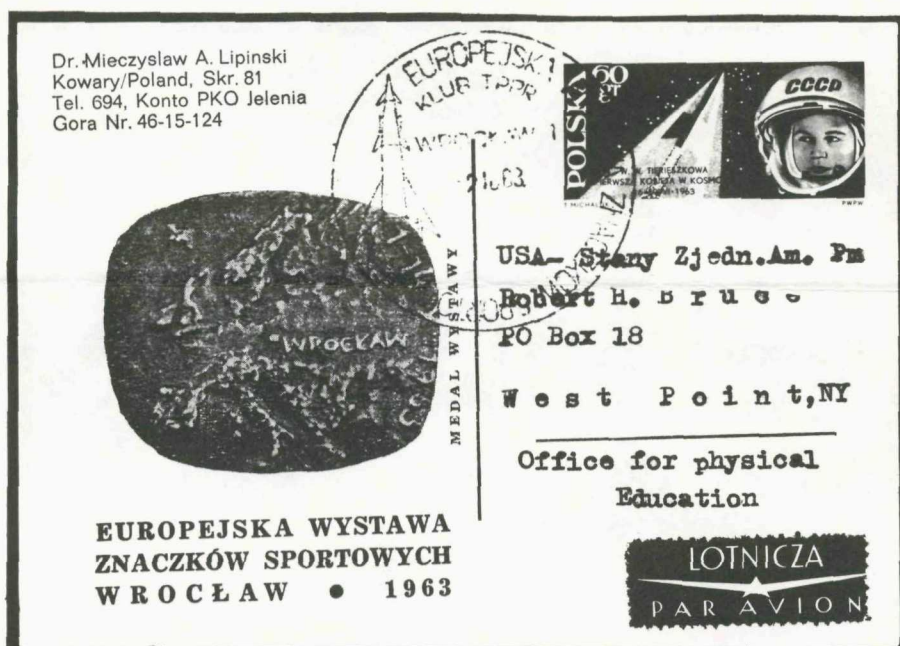

in commemoration of this European championship were illustrated and described in the March, 1964, issue of "JSP".)

Coincident with this basketball championship the International Philatelic Federation sponsored a European Sport Stamp Exhibition, "Wroclaw 1963". Over 250 entries of topical collections--sports, space, and flights--were involved. A nine-man international jury was nominated to select the winners of the Grand Prize, gold, silver, and bronze medals, and many other awards. Official exhibits were submitted by the governments of Austria, Czechoslovakia, France, Norway, Poland, and Sweden. The Polish postal authority issued a special souvenir sheet in honor of the exhibition.

Of particular philatelic interest to sports collectors are the postal cancellations and commemorative cards and envelopes which were prepared and used during the exhibition. That illustrated on Page One shows one of the three official postal cancellations. This cancellation reads "European Sports Stamp Exhibition, Wroclaw, 1.7-10.63". The small design in the lower left is the official emblem of the exhibition and includes a map of Europe, a hand shooting a basketball into a basket, the date "1963", and the word "Wroclaw". The second and third official cancellations are quite similar except that a missile or an airplane is substituted for the official emblem of the philatelic exhibition.

Illustrated next is a commemorative card from the exhibition, franked this time with an astronaut stamp. One must remember that flight material was included in the exhibition. To the left is a small relief map of Europe with Wroclaw specially noted. The official exhibition cancellation features a missile.

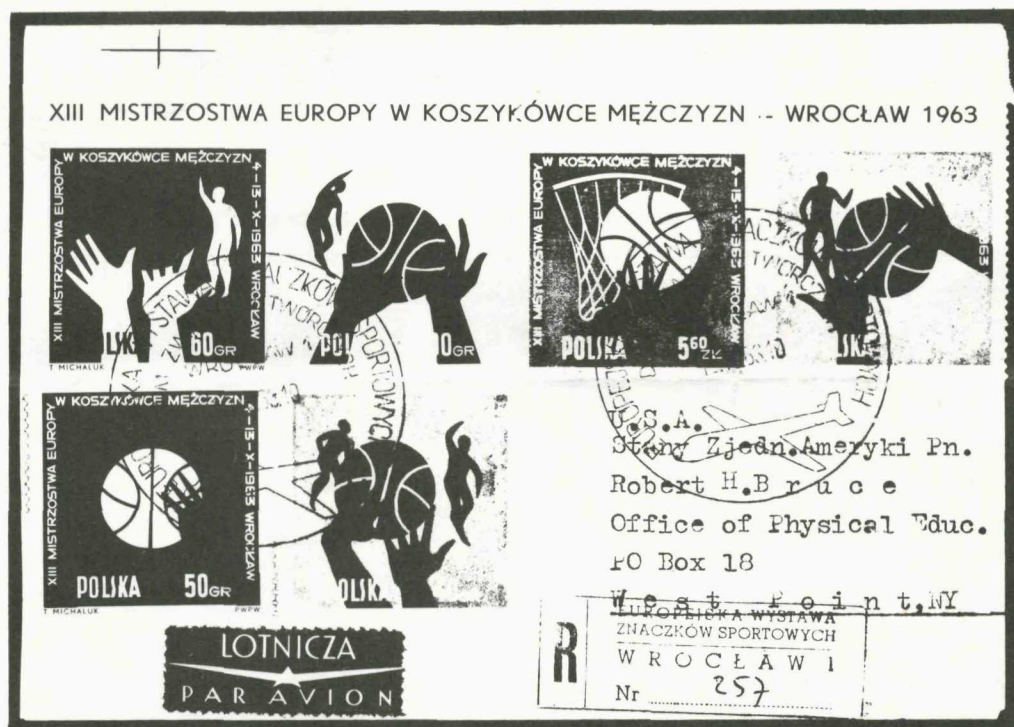

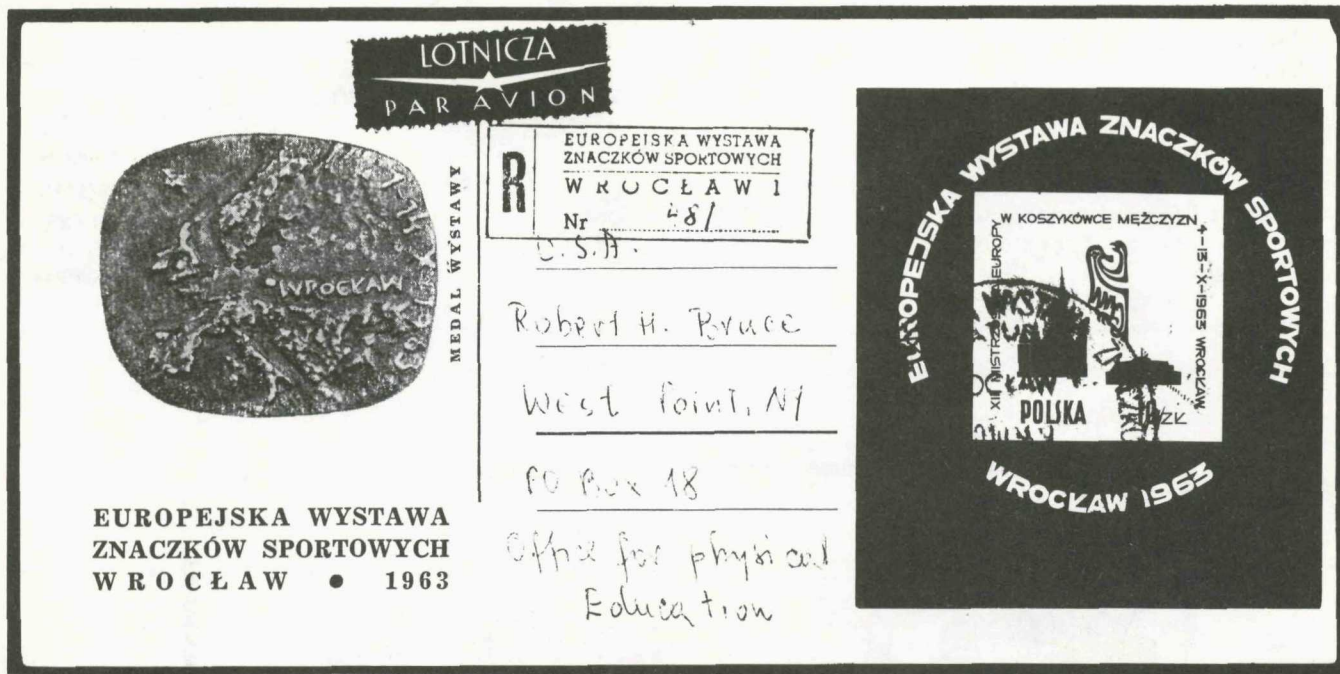

#### PHILATELIC MARKET REPORT

Tip of the month--Monaco 363-64. Stamps issued to honor the Olympic Games are always among the most popular stamps issued; this duet is no exception. Number 363 depicts the ski jump at Cortina d'Ampezzo, where the Winter Olympics were held in 1956. Number 364 is the "joker in the deck"--not only does it depict four events of the Summer Olympic Games, but it also shows four pieces of ancient sculpture. Hence this set is not only eagerly sought after by sports collectors, but also by collectors of art-on-stamps as well as specialists from the French area. With only 170,000 sets sold, it is doubtful if the market will long remain stable in price. Currently cataloguing only \$1.40 in Scott, the wholesale price is now 80¢--this is less than current retail! If you don't have your set, you'd better move fast before your favorite stamp dealer finds he is selling these stamps cheaper than he (the dealer) can buy them. With all the new sports collectors attracted to our specialty through the 1964 Olympic Games, I expect this set to sell at full catalogue price before 1965. The handwriting is on the wall!

Jugoslavia 260-61. Small-sized and rather bland in design, these stamps were issued to commemorate two events, the tenth anniversary of the completion of the ski jump at Planica and the International Ski Championships, sponsored by FIS, which were held at Planica in 1949. Some 150,000 sets were issued and most were exported to the United States and Western Europe in order to secure hard currency for Tito's regime. Few dealers are aware of it, but the current retail price of 30¢ or 35¢ is exactly equal to current wholesale quotations! I am not implying that these stamps will become rare, but it is quite obvious that no dealer can sell stamps at the same wholesale prices he pays for these stamps. Do you have your set?

Jugoslavia 537. Although this very attractive stamp is not listed by anyone as a sports stamp, the writer includes it in his collection. This multi-colored pictorial stamp shows a number of sailboats in the harbor at Dubrovnik some five hundred years ago; at that time Dubrovnik was known as Ragusa and was both a great mercantile power and noted vacation resort. Although some 200,000 copies were issued, many of these stamps were used commercially; hence used copies are much cheaper than mint copies. With a catalogue value of only 20¢, you should be able to get your copy for 15¢ or so. HINT: get your copy now, before all the other sports collectors realize what is going on.

Poland 750-56. Previously listed in this column, this set was noted by the writer as available for less than \$1.00 retail although it retails for close to \$2.50 in Europe. The latest wholesale quotations from New York City confirm this tip--wholesalers here now want \$2.00 for this set! I hope you got your set before prices went zooming upwards.

Cuba 213a. Something strange is going on with this souvenir sheet. Issued by "Uncle Fidel" (Castro) to commemorate the XVII Olympiad in Rome in 1960, this souvenir



sheet contains four stamps, each of which has a stylized design. Personally I consider this sheet to be very unattractive, but that fact shouldn't prevent any sports collectors from making sure this sheet is in their collections. Some 95,000 of these souvenir sheets were sold and it catalogues \$1.25 in Scott. Most dealers who specialize in sports stamps sell this sheet for 35¢ to 50¢, but dealers who specialize in Latin America want \$1.00 and wholesalers don't even offer this sheet. This is a very interesting situation indeed. But with the pressure on all Olympic Games issues this year, it is quite logical that we may expect to see an increase in the price of this sheet--especially when the buyer considers the above-mentioned conditions.

Russia 678-86. Although it is not the practice of the writer to "tip" the stamps which are already winners (like the Olympic Games issues from Greece for 1896 and 1906), nevertheless the writer would be remiss in his duty if he failed occasionally to note market conditions prevailing for stamps and sets retailing for more than \$2.00. One such exception is this crudely printed set from Soviet Russia, issued in 1938. Among other designs, this set features a glider, a parachutist, a free balloon (quite a sport!), and several boys with a model airplane.

No one, it would appear, knows what this set is really worth. Catalogue quotations for mint sets are worth noting: Landmans--\$5.00; Scott--\$6.50; Sanabria--\$4.50; and Michel--\$18.50. Catalogue quotations for used sets are equally interesting: Landmans--\$1.40; Scott--\$2.17; Sanabria--\$1.60; and Michel--\$5.15. Note especially how high are the quotations in Michel.

Equally confusing are the prices asked for this set. Mint sets wholesale in the United States for \$4.00 and those same wholesalers offer to buy mint sets for \$3.00. Retailers in the United States ask \$3.50 to \$3.75 for this set; this is less than wholesale! European retail is at least \$7.00 for a mint set and that price was the prevailing price a full year ago! Even used sets wholesale for \$1.25 in the United States, so you may have to settle for a used set if your budget can't be stretched to cover the cost of a mint set. One thing is quite certain--if you want this set, get it before the prices become prohibitive.

From this foregoing story you may deduce one conclusion which can be used in budgeting your philatelic purchases; mint sports stamps from Russia are never cheaper than at the time they are first issued; all such mint sports stamps are an excellent philatelic investment. It is very seldom, however, that used sports stamps from Russia are either desirable or elusive, although this set is a very rare exception.

"MANY WATERS CANNOT QUENCH LOVE"

It is interesting to read various reactions by collectors and those who profess to speak for the collecting body at large to the tremendous number of new stamp issues now flooding the world philatelic markets.

While it can be assumed that the number of sports issues among these many issues embracing all subjects is of primary concern to members of this organization, any remarks pertaining to sports issues specifically surely obtain for all issues generally.

It is the feeling here, based empirically on the observation of collectors in action, that, for all the griping, each of us somehow gets a little bit of a thrill when a new set appears which can rightfully assume its place in our collections.



Surely there are abuses. There will always be abuses where the interests of many translate directly into dollars spent. On the market today are cheap transistor radios, under-achieving air conditioners, fuzzy lenses on inefficient cameras, all sorts of equipment that is not as advertised. The question becomes: do we do without air conditioners, radios, and the like because cheap and shoddy merchandise appears to compete for our dollars, or do we use a modicum of discernment and extract as much joy and knowledge as we can from the good while washing our hands completely of the shoddy? In other words, are we so faint of heart that the mere making of a decision is too much for us?

The old gag of "Decisions, decisions, decisions" certainly applies to those who would sooner throw up their hands in defeat than make the simple decision not to be bilked by those countries which obviously are out to get rich quickly at the expense of that group of collectors which presses hardest and in greatest numbers for stamps of its own particular collecting tastes.

We make this point now on the eve of what must surely prove to be a flood of new issues in this, an Olympic year. Let us assume that there will be sixty to eighty issues this year of which perhaps eighty-five per cent will be legitimate in the sense they will be issued with no hanky-panky whatever. Of these "good issues" perhaps they will average \$1.00 to \$1.50 each excluding such fancy extras as imperforate varieties, souvenir sheets, and the like. Is, then, the \$100 or so these issues will cost an exorbitant amount to pay for riding a hobby with as much style and gusto as this one of ours affords. What else can you do that gives so much satisfaction and fun and--mind you--still leaves you all or some part of your investment after it is made?

For all of the crying about the flood of sports issues, who has lost any money to speak of in buying them? Haven't they rocketed to new highs as regularly as clockwork? Not that one should stress this side so much, but there it is for those of us who stress it. If you attend the movies, which is an entertainment form, which of you stops off at the box office on the way out and asks for a refund? It is one hundred cents on the dollar spent--no returns whatsoever!

But here is our hobby which not merely affords entertainment but after the money is spent, there is, waiting at the end, a return--often a handsome one. Our own investment over the years--through no discernment whatsoever on our own part--has been an embarrassingly rich one. Sets for which we paid out money at the time in what we considered pretty fair-sized gobs cannot even begin to be purchased today at five and ten times the amount. Surely this is an increment--a dividend, if you will--which none of us should aspire to since it just isn't part of collecting. But there it is anyway--lovely, real, and worthwhile for all the fact collectively that we've not only eaten the cake but still have it very much with us.

So, there is little more in this lecture to be added other than that one does not need to own everything to enjoy sports stamp collecting. You need only to ask: who of us does own everything? And the answer comes back loud and clear--not one. Collect, have fun, discriminate, and as the years go by you will probably have few regrets, if any. What more could one ask? Just remember that a hobby becomes moribund when new incentives and new acquisitions dry up? We need these new items.

As long as we are able, each of us, to stay within the limits of our personal budgets, there is no reason in the world to complain. We always have the privilege of being selective. What we have should be, by our own standards, selectively chosen and in taste. No museum has every Rembrandt but most are very, very content to have one. So, if you cannot have everything, at least have what represents, for you, the musts your tastes dictate to you.

And because this field of ours is growing so fast and because it does have evils as well as much good, it shall come to pass that what is a special field will eventually splinter into a number of closely allied special fields. The trend is already noticeable as we begin to sub-divide into specialists in Olympics issues only, winter sports only, or even more, into skiing only. Maybe eventually the ski specialists will sub-divide into those interested only in slalom skiing stamps. Of course, over-specialization can become an evil as well but, so far, we must admit that all the diverse interests within the general field of sports stamp collecting appear to be healthy and logical. Let us hope this splintering does not become absurdly minuscule as it divides and re-divides.

He may be able to help you on mounting for sale; the charge, in terms of percentage of sales, is a matter for individual settlement with the department manager. It sounds like a good deal!

Information on the Japanese calendar. Allan J. Toussaint (SPI 211) sends in the following information on the Japanese calendar previously described as so profusely illustrated with examples of Olympic philately: Anyone desiring a copy of this calendar should address the Taisho Marine & Fire Insurance Co., Ltd., 5, Kyobashi I-chone, Chuo-ku, Tokyo, Japan, Attention: S. Miyagi, Planning Manager. The cost is \$2.00 per copy, but the mailing charges run about \$3.00 by air or 30¢ by surface mail.

This story does not jibe entirely with another version which indicated that the sale of these calendars had been turned over to the Japanese Organizing Committee for the Tokyo Olympic Games, but perhaps the proceeds go to the same fund ultimately.

So far there has been no response from Atsushi Sekimoto (SPI 176) whose collection is presumed to have provided the illustrations for the calendar.

Another Japanese calendar with sports motifs. Editor William W. Wylie of "Western Stamp Collector" reports that another Japanese business firm has issued a calendar with sports stamp motifs as a compliment to the coming Olympic Games. The Asahi Chemical Company, Ltd., has prepared this second calendar which illustrates a different sports stamp for each day of 1964. It uses the "Discobolus" design of the 1896 Greek Olympic series as a cover design. Now how do we get copies of this latest find?

APS black-blots the imperforates of the Hungarian Winter Olympic issue. Since only 12,000 of the imperforate versions of the recent Hungarian Winter Olympic issue were prepared and those were tied in with the purchase of the perforate set, that part of the issue has been black-blotted by the APS. The grounds cited were excessive length and intentional issue of oddities.

At the same time the Maldive Islands Boy Scout issue in commemoration of the World Scout Jamboree in Greece was similarly judged. The stamps were printed in compact sheets of twelve each with a special decorative border; obviously these sheets were not intended for postal use so they were classified as intentional oddities by the APS.
