"Zlata Prilba" ("The Golden Helmet") is a cancellation frequently seen on both older and recent covers from Czechoslovakia. This cancellation honors a motorcycle race equally important to the host city, Pardubice, as its famous horse race, the marand Pardubice Steeplechase". Motorcycling was first mentioned in Pardubice in 1895 and the first motorcycle race there was held in 1903. Of course the "Golden Helmet" of Czechoslovakia has added more fame to Pardubice.


The first "Golden Helmet" was essentially a national competition and was won in 1929 by Zdenek Pohl. From then until 1938, with the exception of 1937, the race was held yearly and attracted such international names as Strban of Jugoslavia, Sam Mayer of Austria, Van Dijk of Holland, and the Germans Klein, Butler, and Gunzenhauser among the victors. The races recessed just before and during World War II, but were resumed in 1947 and have been held six times since. During the social movement in Czechoslovakia the race was reorganized by the Association for the Cooperation with the Army.

The "Golden Helmet" of Czechoslovakia now ranks among the noted motorcycle events of Europe such as the Grand Prix of Czechoslovakia in Brno; scrambles meets in Sark and Prerov (which count toward the world and European championships); the world and European speedway championships in Marianski Lazne, Liberec, Slany, and Plzen; the international scrambles meetings in Holice and Sedlcany; and the motor rally of "Peace and Friendship".

The course is located in pleasant surroundings and is one and one-half miles long, around a track twenty-seven yards wide on the straight-aways and thirty-eight yards wide on the turns. The final race is of seven laps and is thus over eleven miles in length, one of the most difficult in Europe.

Philatelically the "Golden Helmet" has been commemorated only with special cancellations. The first special cancel appeared in 1934. Prior to World War II some of the cancellations appear in black, blue, green, and yellow; now only black is used. A listing of the cancellations follows:

Here, for better or for worse both chronologically and in size, is the August issue of "JSP". I regret sincerely that it was delayed and that it is not up to its full size. Circumstances far beyond my control prevented my giving the usual amount of time on schedule to its production. Not is there any guarantee that things will improve measurably in the immediate future. I just can't predict how much time I will have to devote to SPI.

Those of you who read the philatelic press will have noticed the announcement that APS intends to black-ball the olympic issues of every country not fully registered as a member of the International Olympic Committee. Give this proposal some serious thought. It may well be the most logical plan yet to guide the individual collector in cutting down the scope of his Olympic collection and thus frustrating the purely commercial efforts of many countries. I offer my congratulations to Editor Jim Chemi of APS for the development of this criterion and $I$ wonder why it is that SPI didn't give enough serious thought and leadership to come up with this concept long ago.

If one eliminates the imperforate issues, the perforate souvenir sheets, and the imperforate sheets and now refuses to buy the issues of those countries who do not belong to the IOC; he may have a very workable concept for his Olympic collection. The following of these principles by a large number of sports collectors might have two additional effects on the small, have-not countries which cause our trouble; they may find their products attracting so little market interest as to (l) force them out of the printing business on Olympic issues or (2) motivate them to join the IOC to gain respectable status. I grant that the latter is unlikely, but the former may have merit.

If you are bewildered and struggling with the mass of Olympic material or possibly even thinking of giving up olympic collecting entirely, why don't you give this new criterion some consideration as a means of controlling your collection before it controls you'

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## REVIEWS

With the appearance of Part 2 of its album pages for the 18th Olympic Games, the KLine Publishing Company launches a new policy, designed to ease the strain on the olympic collector's pocketbook. Each part appears in two sections. The first section includes perforate sets of stamps and perforate souvenir sheets. The second section includes imperforate sets of stamps and imperforate souvenir sheets. If only an imperforate souvenir sheet has been prepared, it is included in the first section with the perforate set of stamps and the second section is eliminated for that particular country.

This policy can do nothing wrong in gaining the approval of the financially-harassed collector of Olympic stamps. Now he can pick and choose to meet his needs and save accordingly. I salute George Kobylka for his consideration and ingenuity, but i suggest to him that yet another step is to get all souvenir sheets out of the section covering the perforate set of stamps for each commemorative issue. This policy would come even a little closer to giving a break to the many collectors who will not touch any souvenir sheets.

As usual, the sheets are excellent in their make-up and quality.
The stock is heavy and printed on only one side. Each sheet has rounded corners and is punched for threering binders. Explanatory material covers each commemorative set. The illustrations are appropriate and clear. For the collector who wants printed album pages rather than preparing his own sheets from scratch this is the answer. Keep it up, George. R.M.B.

Algeria B47-50. Previously tipped in this column, this set contains only one stamp of interest to sports collectors, B49, which depicts the head of an athlete with a crown of laurel leaves. Some collectors also include B47 in their collections because it has a picture of two boys playing by a stream. This set catalogues only $\$ 2.55$ in the latest edition of "Scott", but it has sold for approximately full catalogue value for the past several years. Wholesale stocks have been depleted for a long time; after all, this set was issued eighteen years ago. In France this set retails for approximately $\$ 2.80$, up from $\$ 2.50$ a year ago. I can foresee no spectacular rises for this set, although it. is an excellent purchase at current prices.

Central African Republic C4, Chad Cl, Gabon C3, and Republic of the Congo Cl. These overprints were made in 1960 to honor the 17 th Olympiad in Rome. Each stamp was surcharged for a face value of 250 African francs, which equals one dollar in U. S. currency; the set, therefore, had a face value of $\$ 4.00$ in $U$. S. currency. Current wholesale on this set is $\$ 5.00$, with dealers adding a mark-up of twenty-five per cent or so. No one seems to know the exact quantity of sets issued, although it has been authoritatively estimated that it ranges between 12,000 and 20,000 sets. Like almost all of the stamps being issued by the former French colonies in Africa, this set was a controlled issue, distributed by the syndicate run by Varga, the Parisian dealer. Supplies would appear to be about equal to demand now, so no rapid price rises are in sight.

Central African Republic 08. This handsome multicolored pictorial was issued to honor the Tropic Cup, a series of soccer games held by the former French African colonies in late December, 1962. With a face value of $40 \phi$, this stamp is still being offered wholesale at face value and most dealers ask only $50 \neq$ or so retail, although the retail in France is $75 \not \subset$; this is your tip-off to get this stamp now.

Dahomey 152. This stamp is an overprinted variety, intended to honor the abidjan Games, held in late 1961. With a face value of only ló, this stamp is still available at $13 \phi$ wholesale and costs $20 \phi$ or less at retail. The retail price in France is now $30 \phi$, up from $20 \notin$ only a year ago. Surcharge varieties of this stamp also exist. At today's modest prices, be sure this stamp is in your collection.

French Equitorial Africa 042. I unabashedly admit that this is one of my favorite sports stamps. Issued in honor of the late Governor General Felix Eboue, this stamp is quite elusive--wholesale stocks are non-existent and even most retailers are now unable to offer this stamp. "Scott" prices this stamp at 90申, although it retails for \$1.00 on the Parisian market. "Sanabria" is more realistic and prices it at \$l.50. Buy this stamp now, if it is missing from your collection; it would be even better to buy a commercially used cover with this stamp on it, although it will take a real chase to locate such an item.

Madagascar 319. This attractive commemorative depicts two athletes, one white and the other Negroid, shaking hands. It was issued in 1960 to commemorate the first Sports Games of the French Community, held in the capital of Madagascar. With a face value of only $10 \phi$, this stamp has held firm at $16 \notin$ wholesale and $20 \phi$ retail. But the retail price in France has increased from $20 \not \subset$ to $30 \not \subset$ in the past year, indicating that this stamp should be purchased immediately at the $20 \notin$ price figure.

New Caledonia C31. This exquisitely designed multicolored stamp is almost guaranteed a good future--it's a sports stamp; it's an airmail; it's from a French colony; and it's a beautiful stamp. Depicting a skin diver shooting a fish, this stamp has a face value of about $30 \notin$ and lists for $50 \not \subset$ in "Scott". This stamp retails for $55 \notin$ in France and almost as much here in the U. S. I don't anticipate any spectacular increases, but I would make sure that I owned this stamp now.

Reunion 299-300. These stamps are a hot item on the world's philatelic market and are among the best French Colonial sports stamps you could possibly own. Overprinted on France's sports issue of 1953, these two stamps retail for $\$ 4.25$ in the United States, compared with $\$ 3.95$ in Paris last summer (1963). Frankly, I have never seen these two stamps on a commercially used cover, although I presume you might unearth such a museum piece if you are a human bloodhound. Anyway, these stamps ure alleged to depict the French winners of the 1952 Olympic Games, so many sports collectors include these items in their collections of olympiana. I sincerely doubt if these stamps will ever be cheaper, but I can easily conceive of a higher price--and you know what that means.

Reunion 318-21. These overprinted sports stamps are also gilt-edge material and are among the blue chips of sports philately. No wholesale supplies exist of either this set or of 299-300 (listed above). Currently retailing at $\$ 2.00$ to $\$ 2.50$ in the United States, this set was selling for $\$ 2.35$ on the Parisian stamp market a year ago (and prices certainly have not declined since then). Try to get this set on cover so you can feature it on the page with your mint set.

## 12 PHILATELIC MARKET REPORT (Cont'd)

Senegal 202-05. This set depicts five different native sports, masterfully depicted in the beautiful engravings we have come to expect from prance and colonies. Issued in 1961 with a face value of approximately $30 \notin$, this set is still avallable for $40 \not \subset$ wholesale and retails for $45 \phi$ or $50 \phi$. In France, however, this set retails for $65 \notin$ to $70 \neq$, so it would be wise to pick up your set now. Many of these stamps were used up on commercial mail and are freely available if you like used stamps.

## SERVICES

Current APS "black-blots" on sports issues. The list of black-blotted stamps and additional philatelic material in the April and May issues of the American Philatelic Society's periodical listed no sports stamps-for a change. Apparently none were included again in the June issue; if this statement is in error, correction is welcomed. Please include all details if you are sending in a correction.

Editor J1m Chemi (SPI 473) of "The American Philatelist" has announced that in the future he will list for black-blotting the olympic issues of all issuing countries which are not actually members of the International olympic committee, the sponsoring organization of the Olympic Games.

The American Philatelic Society has pointed out repeatedly that its service of suggesting doubtful issues is only a recommendation, that no one is bound by its judgments, and that it is telling no one what he should or should not collect. It is very difficult to recommend that a country's issue is beyond the boundary lines of worthwhile collecting simply on the basis of postal services and similar characteristics. Here, however, is an external criterion which applies not to the issuing country's postal service, but rather to the subject closest to the collector's heart, the Olympic Games and their sponsoring organization.
