COLLECTING OLYMPIC GAMES SEALS AND LABELS

Most of us have probably learned about Olympic seals and labels by viewing Olympic collections at stamp shows. We are impressed with the highly individualistic touch these seals and labels lend to an otherwise routine display of well-known stamps. Because the labels are primarily used for publicity and/or to raise funds, they are generally attractive and large size.

In this article briefly discussing how to collect this kind of material, I use the terms "seals" and "labels" interchangeably. These terms may also cover "poster stamps", "match box labels", and "vignettes" (a word primarily used in Europe).

The most important tool for an Olympic seal collector is a catalogue--just as in any other branch of philately. Probably the most comprehensive is "Katalog der Vignetten zu den Olympischen Spielen" by Paul F. Rampacher. It is obtainable for a mere dollar from Hermann Bollhardt, Itzehoe/Holstein, Germany. Its fourteen pages list Olympic Games seals and labels by Olympic year through 1960; Winter Games labels are also listed. There is a four-page center plate illustrating fifty-two of the scarce or rare items. Valuations are given for most material, but rare items are designated "R". The text is in German, but there is a translation key for abbreviations. The task of translating other words is only a minor challenge with the assistance of a German-English dictionary. There are no complicated sentence descriptions to translate. The catalogue is probably the most complete and thorough listing available.

A considerably less comprehensive listing can be found in the English language in Ernest Trory's serially issued "A Philatelic History of the Olympic Games". Trory's histories are released in chronological sections, the latest covering the 1932 Olympic Games. The entire field of Olympic philately is covered and the series belongs in the reference library of every sports collector. Unfortunately many of the seals and labels are not listed. Trory's valuations are generally much higher than Rampacher's, but the two usually agree on which items are rare. Information can be obtained from Mr. Trory at 57 Tivoli Crescent, Brighton 5, England.

Seal collectors in general realize well the difficulty of obtaining material for a limited topic. Therefore, the items without gum, off-center, thinned, and with minor tears are not to be scorned. Early seals never had the popularity of postage stamps and were probably much less saved.

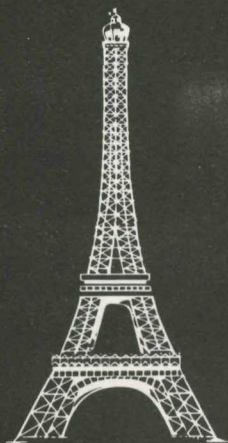
There are a number of ways to obtain Olympic seals. Your local dealer may have a junk box of odds and ends--unlisted non-Scott material. Scan it carefully. He may charge pennies for items which, in a knowledgeable market, might cost several dollars. Do not overlook the backs of ordinary covers inexpensively priced. They may have a very desirable Olympic seal! Covers with Olympic seals tied by timely postmarks are extremely rare.

Other excellent sources are the SPI auctions and SPI sales circuit. The variety is wide and elusive items do turn up. Also these same media are excellent for disposing of one's duplicates.

My own experience with seal societies has not been very successful. Most of the members are primarily interested in Christmas, tuberculosis, and religious seals and the

boundless sea of "non-Scott" items. A tedious, but more rewarding, route is friendly correspondence. Have you tried using the SPI membership list to search out seal collectors? You may even turn up one or two within driving distance of your own home!

I'll be interested in your comments on Olympic seals. If you wish a reply, please enclose a stamped, self-addressed envelope. What you say may guide me in future articles which I may write on this topic.

Kosiechkin, Viktor

Russia

1960 Speed skating--5,000 meters (7:51.3)
10,000 (silver medal)

Russia 2563

This issue was overprinted (in Russian) on a previous stamp depicting speed skaters in Luzhniki Stadium to commemorate the victories of Mrs. Inga Voronina and Viktor Kosiechkin at the World Speed Skating Championships in Imatra, Finland, in February, 1962.



Kovacs, Pal

Hungary

1948 Fencing--saber (bronze medal)
1952 Fencing--saber

*Hungary 1003

Kovacs became the seventh Hungarian to win this Olympic event; fencers from this country have won this title in ten of the fifteen Olympic Games. He also won world saber crowns in 1937 and 1953 and was national champion in 1954, 1958, and 1959.

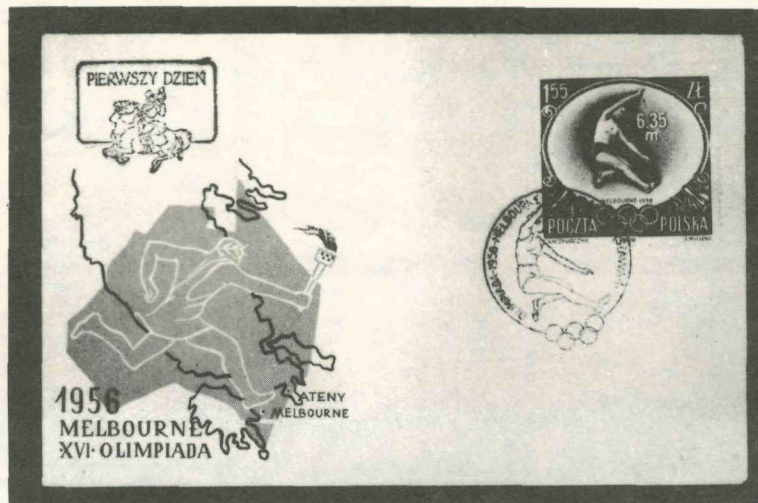


* Krzeskiska, Elizbieta Poland

1956 Women's broad jump (20' 9 3/4")
1960 Women's broad jump (silver medal)

Poland 756 and 921

This 17-year old pigtailed Polish gal set the world record of 20' 9 3/4" (6.35 meters) on August 20, 1965, at Budapest and was able to equal this mark at the Games in Melbourne on November 27, 1956. At the Rome Games she was bested by the Russian Vyera Krepkina by exactly four inches; Krepkina set the new world and Olympic record at 20' 10 3/4".



Kusocinski, Janusz Poland

1932 Running--10,000 meters (30:11.4)

Poland 915

At the time of the Los Angeles Games the Finns had had a monopoly on this Olympic event, having won every one to date, and again had two of their favorite sons entered. Kusocinski, however, was able to fulfill a pre-race boast of "carrying a pace farther and faster than any Finn could follow" and won by some ten meters for a new Olympic mark.



Kuts, Valdimir Pyetrovitch Russia

1956 Running--5,000 meters (13:39.6)
10,000 meters (28:45.6)

Russia 1969

This 29-year old Ukrainian became the first man to win an Olympic gold medal in track and field for Russia by taking the 10,000-meter race by forty-five yards over Hungarian Jozef Kovacs for a new Olympic mark. Valdimir also won the 5,000-meter event by an astonishing eighty yards at the wire to set another record, which still stands. He had set world records at 10,000 meters (28:30.4) at Moscow on September 12, 1956, and at 5,000 meters (11:36.0) at Rome on October 13, 1957.

Laudet, Jean France

1952 Canoeing--10,000 meters (C-2)

*France 703 and Reunion 299



Jean Laudet and Georges Turlier were the first and only Frenchmen to win this Canadian Double canoeing title in the Olympic Games. Note that the stamp is said to picture no particular athlete, but was issued in honor of their 1952 Olympic victory.

Leconey, J. Alfred United States

1924 4 x 100-meter relay (41.0)

United States 718



Leconey, with his teammates Francis V. J. Hussey, Louis A. Clarke, and Loren Marethison, won this Olympic title in a new record time of 41.0. Note that this stamp does not depict the exact likeness of Leconey; but it is said that the designer, Victor McCloskey, Jr., used a photograph of him as a model for the sprinter portrayed on the stamp.

Linca, Neculai Romania

1956 Boxing--welterweight

Romania 1452

To date Linca has been the only Romanian to win an Olympic boxing championship.

This little Greek shepherd of Maroussi became the marathon victor for the honor and glory of ancient and modern Attica. After so many defeats the Greeks finally made a clean sweep in this event at the First Modern Olympic Games in Athens. Note that there are several variations in the spelling of his name in various record books; Louis and Louys are used as well as Loues.



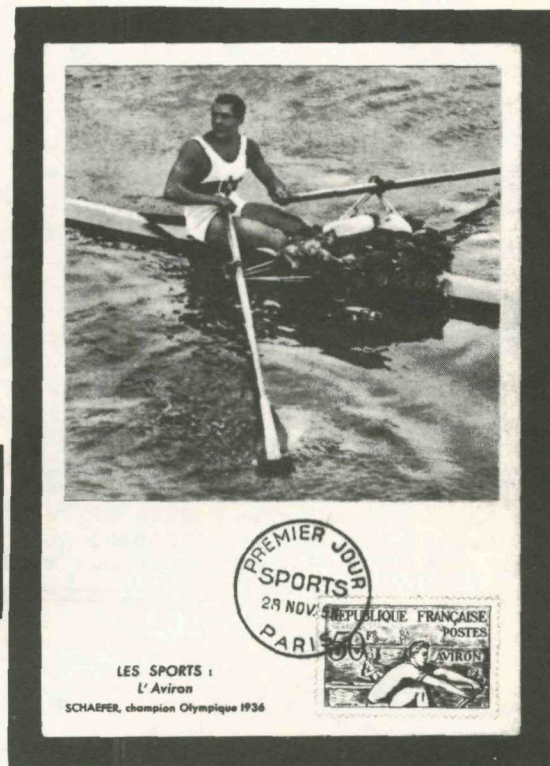
Malivioire, B.

Malivioire was the coxswain of this crew and the youngest competitor at Helsinki, being only fourteen years old. Note that it is said that the stamps in this set do not portray the actual athletes, but were issued to honor their Olympic successes in the 1952 Games at Helsinki.

Tip of the month--Italy 600. For some unknown reason, this stamp has suddenly shown signs of sky-rocketing. Issued in 1952 in honor of the 30th Milan Trade Fair, this handsome emission depicts a sailboat and a motor boat moored outside the fair buildings. The wholesale price in 1963 was only 60¢, but a noted wholesaler has just revised his price upward to \$2.00! Another dealer offers to buy your surplus copies for \$1.15. With a current retail price approximating only 75¢, it's time you made sure this stamp is in your collection--unless you would prefer to pay higher prices later.

Italy 342-44. This set is literally ugly and the vignettes depicted have no relationship with sports, although the set was issued in 1935 to commemorate the University Games held in Rome and Milan. Retail dealers ask \$1.25 for this set, but a leading wholesaler wants \$1.40, which is more than your dealer is selling it for. Incidentally, very few dealers have this set in stock, which is your tip-off to make sure that you have this set now.

Italy 574-76. This attractive set, issued in 1951 to honor the International Gymnastic Festival in Florence, has always been one of Italy's better sports sets. The wholesale price in 1963 was \$3.00, which was increased to \$4.00 at the beginning of 1964. Current wholesale prices are \$6.50, which makes the current retail price of \$4.50 look mighty good indeed! This set is a winner even at the current wholesale price, so don't delay in purchasing it.

Italy 705-08. Italy was proud of being the host nation for the 1956 Winter Olympic Games, so she issued this handsome set showing stadiums for ice-skating and skiing. With a face value of only 20¢, this set was available for a very modest percentage above face value until recently. Current wholesale prices are \$2.00 from most leading wholesalers, although retail dealers generally ask \$1.75 for this set. With the current hoopla over the 1964 Olympic Games, this set is bound to come into greater demand (with commensurate higher prices) as new collectors are attracted to sports philately by the current flood of Olympic stamps. Buy now and beat the rise in price.

Italy 773-77. When Italy issued this set, honoring the 1960 Olympic Games held in Rome, somebody forgot to tell the designers that the emphasis should be on sports rather than on the ancient Roman ruins. The only indication of a sports connotation is the five-ringed symbol of the Olympiads. This set has a face value of approximately 40¢ and is still available from most retailers for 55¢ to 60¢. Latest wholesale quotations, however, range from 70¢ to 80¢. Just wait until your retailer finds this out!

Italy 779-807. This set also commemorated the 1960 Olympic Games in Rome, but this time the designs showed ancient Roman athletes (from sculptures) and sports stadiums. This set is as handsome as the sports philatelist could wish and is thereby guaranteed a good future. The face value of this set is approximately \$1.00 and retail dealers ask \$1.50 (the new issue price). Current wholesale was \$1.60 but has just been increased to \$1.90. Need I state that a rise in price at the retail level is inevitable?

Lebanon C200-06. This airmail set has a fascinating design which depicts skiers among the cedar trees in Lebanon's mountains. Issued in 1955 in an edition of 500,000 units, this set should be freely available at a modest percentage above face value--but it isn't! Retailers ask \$4.00 or more if the set is available and wholesalers don't even offer the set for love or money. One noted dealer offers to buy at full retail price (\$4.00), so a fat increase in retail price is in the offing. If you can buy at current retail price, you are indeed lucky.

Belgium B663-68. Parachute jumping is a big sport in Europe, especially in the Soviet bloc countries. This is a really handsome set, packed with action, and was issued in 1960 with a surtax for patriotic and cultural (sporting?) organizations. The face value of this set is only 40¢ and it has been freely available at 60¢ or 65¢ from most retail dealers. The latest wholesale quotations, however, are 85¢, which makes the retail price look like a bargain. If you like bargains, make sure that you buy this set.

Belgium 510-17. When Belgium granted the Congo its independence in 1960. it issued this attractive set depicting Congolese engaged in various occupational pursuits. The only value of this set which interests sports philatelists is #514, showing a Congolese athlete engaged in the shot put. Dealers are unlikely to break this set just to sell you the one stamp you want, so you'll have to pay the retail price of \$1.25 to \$1.50. Current wholesale prices, however, have been increased from \$1.00 to \$1.35, thereby closing the gap between wholesale and retail prices. If you need this set, try your luck with the retailers before they become apprised of this increase.

Haiti 421-23 and C115-18. The Swiss printing firm of Courvoisier did a superlative job in preparing this set, issued in 1958 to commemorate the thirtieth anniversary of Sylvio Cator's "world record" broad jump. Unfortunately, there have been shenanigans in this issue, whereby large quantities of unsold remainders have been unloaded upon the stamp trade in cancelled-to-order condition. From this investor's point of view, the release of the remainders in cancelled-to-order condition is beneficial because it means that the unsold remainders can never be unloaded below face value in mint condition. Mint sets should prove to be an excellent investment. With a face value of \$1.47, this set currently retails for \$2.50 to \$3.00 per set. Current wholesale is \$4.00 per set, up from \$3.50 in 1963. I have tipped this set before and the increase in wholesale prices has confirmed my tip.

There seems to be no basis in fact for this statement as all four stamps are known used on commercial mail of that era.
