1928 Yachting--6-meter class

Norway 360-74 and B43-6

Olav, Crown Prince

The Crown Prince of Norway won this 6-meter event in his yacht "Norma" over M. Witt of Denmark in "Hi Hi", with third place going to A. Fable of Estonia in "Tuti V". Note the stamps portray him as the Crown Prince and later as King of Norway.

Dominican Republic 484 and Bl1-2

Ouellette scored 600 to nose out Vassili Borissov of Russia who had 599 for the first perfect score ever recorded in this Olympic event (60 shots in six series of ten each) on the 50-meter range. However, the range was measured later and found to be short, so his performance does not rank as an Olympic record.

Owens, Jesse

1936 Running--100-meter dash (10.3) 200-meter dash (20.7) Relay--4 x 100 meters (39.8) Broad jump (26' 6 21/64")

Dominican Republic 475, B2, and B27

This great Ohio State University athlete, who on four occasions in one day at the Berlin Games surpassed former Olympic marks (twice bettering

listed world records), staged one of the greatest individual performances recorded in the Olympics. The tan streak was the first to score a double dash victory, as well as to equal the great Paavo Nurmi's feat of winning four gold medals in one Olympic venue, and established himself among the world's track and field immortals.

Palusalu, Kristjan

Estonia

1936 Wrestling--free style (heavyweight) Greco-Roman (heavyweight)

Japan 568

Palusalu is the only man to win both the free style and Greco-Roman titles in this event and was only the second (and last) Estonian to win an Olympic wrestling crown. He is shown here grappling with the German, Kurt Hornfisher.

Pavesi, Carlo Italy

1956 Fencing--epee (individual and team)

Dominican Republic 529 and B38

Pavesi led his teammates to a sweep in this Olympic event, all having 5-2 won-andlost records at the finish of the competition

Petersen, Kurt A. Sweden

1948 Wrestling--Greco-Roman (bantamweight)

The information I have is that this stamp depicts Pettersen and Akar of Turkey. I am assuming this to be the Petersen listed in the Olympic record books. He was the only Swedish wrestler to win this Olympic title.



Petrescu, Stefan

Romania

1956 Shooting--silhouette pistol

Romania 1453

Petrescu won with a 587 score over Evguenii Tcherkassov of Russia, who scored 585 of a possible 600. This rapid-fire shooting event on the silhouette at 25 meters (sixty shots in two courses of thirty each) is the most interesting from the spectators' viewpoint, with a series of five shots being fired from eight seconds down to four seconds each per series.






Pirvulescu, Dunitru

1960 Wrestling--Greco-Roman (flyweight)

Romania 1455

Pirvulescu decisioned Ignazio Fabra of Italy in the finals to win for Romania its first Olympic wrestling championship, winning three and losing one with one draw. The competition was held at the Basilica di Massenzio, shown on Italy 777.



Read won this event in a breeze--on a very windy day--over Erguenii Maskinov of Russia and the over-thirteen finishers over the 31-mile tour of the Australian countryside. The black-uniformed New Zealander broke into a happy dog-trot after crossing the finishline in the stadium, to the delight of the neighboring Aussie crowd. Although the United States entries have won only one Olympic walking title, in 1906, they were the only ones to have three finishers in this event at Melbourne.



Dominican Republic 505 and B25

Rose, Murray

Rose was a member of the youthful Aussie 800-meter relay team, which set a new world and Olympic mark in this event at Melbourne. The blond, smooth-stroking, 17-year-old Aussie also set new Olympic records in the 400-meter and 1500-meter free style events, to give Australia five of the nine men's swimming events at the 1956 Games. He retained his 400-meter crown at the Rome Games, Clipping nine seconds off his old Olympic record in this event.

REVIEWS

Part 3 of the K-Line pages for the 18th Olympic Games. George Kobylka and his company are making noble efforts to cope with the vast output of Olympic stamps, but many more pages will be necessary to handle the flood. Part 3 continues all the good things of previous issues of these album pages--heavy stock, clear illustrations, a wealth of descriptive material; you mame it and these pages have it. The cost of this section is \$5.20 plus postage (65¢); the K-Line advertisement appears regularly on the back cover of our "JSP".

With this set of pages K-Line has declared a bonus in the form of eleven pages summarizing the results of the Tokyo Games. This includes the results of both individual and team events and a complete chart of the entire tournament competition in basketball, field hockey, soccer, volleyball, and water polo. These sheets are included in the packet, but may be purchased separately for \$1.50 (including postage) by those who make their own album pages.

Since the Olympic issues have been numerous and the K-Line pages come in sections, a listing of those issues included in this Part 3 seems appropriate. Perforate stamps are covered for Afghanistan, Cameroons, Central Africa, Chad, Republic of Congo (2), China, Cyprus, Czechoslovakia, Ethiopia, France, Gabon, Ivory Coast, German Democratic Republic, (2), Japan (2), Jordan, Jugoslavia, Mali, Mauritania, Mongolia, Niger Republic, Panama, Paraguay, Poland, San Marino, Senegal, Turkey, Upper Volta, and Yemen. Souvenir sheets are included for Afghanistan, Bulgaria, Cameroons, Central Africa, Chad, Republic of Congo, Cyprus, Gabon, Japan (3), Jordan, Mali, Mauritania, Mongolia, Niger Republic, Poland, Upper Volta, and Yemen. 



Dear Mr. Postmaster General,

At the outset let me say that I am all for the Sokol organizations. I admire their members, their ethnic pulling-together for this country, their program objectives (including physical fitness), and their overall effectiveness for their first hundred years in the United States. I congratulate them at the time of their centennial and wish them even greater success for their next hundred years. And if they merit a commemorative stamp by whatever standards you and your department judge requests for such issues, then I am thoroughly delighted.

However, my admiration for the Sokol commemorative stops right there and, from the rumblings from Sokols around the country, I am not alone in my complaints. I deplore the design of the forthcoming stamp, especially the subject selected. The classic discus thrower has been so thoroughly overworked on stamps as to be completely fatigued and lacking in significance. Our new stamp does not say "Sokol" anymore than it says "Turnverein" or "United States Olympic Committee" or "U. S. Track and Field Federation" or "Junior Chamber of Commerce"--except for the lettering, which does help a bit on the identification problem. I would have hoped that you, your experienced staff, and your advisory committee could have come up with something more pertinent.

Your answer may be that all stamps, including commemoratives, are simply for the prepayment of postage, that their design is not important. Such a statement, though technically accurate, is an over-simplification and a failure in itself. No one takes such an attitude seriously, for the public relations value of stamps is too great. Or you may say that it is just another in a series which fulfills its dual function of postal payment and commemoration. I agree in principle. We have large numbers of such issues; they vary greatly in significance of commemoration, in choice of subject matter, and in design and art work. But that response only avoids the issue. Or you might even tell me that, if I don't like the stamp, I can ignore it completely. Again I agree, up to a point. I can refrain from use of the stamp (not that that would gain anything for anyone) or I can use it only for modest personal needs just as I do other commemoratives. But, if I truly dislike this stamp, I can't isolate myself from it completely, for it will appear rather frequently on my incoming mail. But then, how silly can one get?

However, all these aspects fade into insignificance when compared with the real issue--the fully admitted and publicized <u>dual</u> purpose of this stamp. The issue commemorates both the Sokol centennial and physical fitness; there can be no doubt of this when one reads your department's publicity releases. However, it does favor the Sokol aspect at the expense of physical fitness; again there can be no doubt. Up to a certain point this dual attention is logical and appropriate, but eventually one must realize how grossly inadequate and unfair is the implementation of your decision.

What is this "physical fitness" which gets mere lip service as the second commemorative objective of this stamp? Very briefly, it is a national goal affecting every one of our citizens from young to old. It is a principle espoused by three Presidents through their Councils on Physical Fitness. It is a concept receiving progressively greater attention by the American Medical Association and specialized groups of medical personnel. It is one of the important objectives of the thousands upon thousands of professional people in health, physical education, and recreation work. It is the increasingly widespread concern of Boards of Education, recreation groups, the YMCAs and YWCAs, and literally hundreds of other local sponsoring and promoting organizations. This is the thing which runs the gamut from the baby playing with a ball to Dr. Paul Dudley White riding his bicycle. It is both an individual and a group concept far more important than the breaking of a few athletic records here and there or the continued superiority of this country's athletes in international competition.

Physical fitness doesn't apply only to a few hundred thousand Sokol members, Mr. Gronouski, but to you and me and nearly two hundred million in our country. This postal issue, as finally released by your department, should involve not simple commemoration of a successful organization and mere acknowledgment of physical fitness; it should provide much-needed publicity for a worthy national ideal. What an opportunity you let slip away!

And why did you blow it? We ordinary citizens will never know the facts, but it probably pitted a few sympathetic Senators and Representatives and a vocal group of supporters representing a few hundred thousand votes on one hand and a comparatively unsupported national ideal on the other. The first group you understand well in your business, but the other side doesn't get much attention. So the worthy Sokol cause received commemoration and the national need got the once-over-lightly treatment. That's quite a deal, even judged by the expediency of politics. Fortunately, neither cause got hurt; only an opportunity was lost.

But the need for publicity still exists, Mr. Postmaster General. You can't deny it, play it down, or hide it. Are you for physical fitness for our citizens or is it easier to forget the matter? What do you do now?
