

Jean Laudet and Georges Turlier were the first and only Frenchmen to win this Canadian Double canoeing title in the Olympic Games. Note that the stamp is said to picture no particular athlete, but was issued in honor of their 1952 Olympic victory.

This Polish stamp portrays two trumpeters playing the Olympic anthem and a fragment of the Olympic symphony composed by Truski, which won for him a gold medal (in music) at the 1948 Olympic Fine Arts Exhibition in London.

Vorobyex (Vorobiev), Akaddi Russia

Vorobyev lifted 325.5, 391.25, and 462.5 (press, snatch, and jerk) for a total of 1019.25 pounds at the Melbroune Games, establishing a new Olympic and world record. He successfully defended his crown at the Rome Games with 336, 314, and 391-25 for a total of 1041.25 pounds for yet another Olympic mark.






Winkler, Hans Gunther

Germany

Winkler won the Grand Prix de Obstacles (individual and team jumping) on "Halla" at the Stockholm Equestrian Games. In the individual event he won with four penalty points over the famous d'Inzeo brothers of Italy. Lt. Raimondo d'Inzeo was second on "Merano" with eight penalty points and Capt. Piere d'Inzeo was third on "Uruguay" with eleven penalty points.

This 26-year old Army captain won his first gold medal in 1948 and became the first Czech to win an Olympic championship. At the Helsinki Games he won the Woolworth Double (5,000 and 10,000 meters) and, not content with these laurels, he entered the marathon and won it too to establish himself as one of the Olympic immortals. He proved to the critics (who claimed he ran like a man who had just been stabbed in the heart) to be one of the greatest, if not the greatest, distance runners of all time.

Dana was the wife of Emil Zatopek, the distance-running marvel. Between them they won four gold medals at Helsinki--the first husband and wife team in Olympic history. At the London Games she had competed as Dana Ingova, but had failed to score; in 1952, as a Zatopek, she couldn't miss! At the Melbourne

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PHILATELIC MARKET REPORT

- Fred Farr -

This month's column has been written with the assistance of Martin Levin, the noted New York stamp dealer. As a professional philatelist, Mr. Levin cannot merely guess which stamps are undervalued—he must know this information if he is to be successful at his chosen profession. According to Mr. Levin, all the stamps listed below are under-valued in "Scott's Catalogue" and are an excellent purchase if you can find them. Many of these stamps, incidentally, have been tipped in this column before; but I believe that it will be advantageous if we took a look at their price structure again.

This stamp is not a very handsome piece of work, although it does depict the President Remon Hippodrome (race track). Issued in 1957 as part of a nine-value set, this stamp has a modest face value of only ten cents, yet it is generally unavailable except as part of the complete set. The complete set is available for \$3.00 and wholesalers offer to buy this set for \$2.00. Generally speaking, the major philatelic catalogues value this stamp at two to three times face value, although "Landmans" gives it a valuation of 64¢. According to Mr. Levin, this stamp is easily worth 50¢ to 70¢. Why not see if you can pick up a copy for your collection now, instead of waiting until this stamp has disappeared from the stamp market?

Bolivia 330 and Cl24. Tipped in this column once before, this set was issued in honor of the First International Automobile Races of South America. This set is not available from wholesalers; this is always an ominous sign. No data regarding quantities issued of this set is available; that fact denies us vital information. However, this set is definitely elusive, especially the airmail value which "Sanabria" values at \$3.50 (this is several times "Scott's" valuation). The current market price for this set is \$2.50 to \$2.75. I hope you realize that virtually all Latin American stamps are undervalued in the catalogues and their market prices often bear no relation whatsoever with catalogue valuations.

Ireland 90. I was much surprised to see this stamp on Mr. Levin's list of undervalued sports stamps. Frankly, this stamp is freely available from most dealers, irrespective of whether they sell sports stamps, British Empire, or general issues. But Mr. Levin must know what he is talking about, so why not buy a copy for ten cents if it is missing from your collection? Incidentally, Ira Seebacher has listed ten varieties of this stamp in his "Handbook of Sports Stamps", so you could try to acquire all ten varieties at this absurdly cheap price. You know the stamp, of course; it shows the fine old Irish sport of hurling.

New Jersey trout fishing stamps. Interested sports collectors may now obtain the seventh issue of the state trout fishing stamps for their collections. There are two denominations, a \$1.00 black-on-yellow stamp for resident fishermen and a \$5.00 brown-on white stamp of out-of-state fishermen. Both are offered to collectors at reduced prices.

The stamps come in sheets of ten, each stamp fully perforated. The set of two stamps is offered at 50%, blocks of four of each at \$2.00, and full sheets of each at \$5.00. Remittances must be made by U. S. check or money order, payable to the New Jersey Division of Fish and Game. The address is Trout Stamps, Division of Fish and Game, Box 1809, Trenton, N. J. 08625. Quick action is demanded for the unsold remainders will be destroyed on June 1st.

Missing APS black blot information. Through the courtesy of H. M. Critchfield (SPI 295) and John La Porta (SPI 79) the information on APS black blots on sports stamps, passed over last fall, is now available for our readers. Only one gap, that of the January issue of "The American Philatelist", remains to be filled and I hope to have that available in the next issue of "JSP".

The August issue of "The American Philatelist" black-blotted the imperforate version of the Hungarian commemorative for the First European Skittles Championship and the International Sport Show (stamps) in Rimini, Italy. The reason cited was intentional inclusion of oddities. Also indicted was Jordan's eight-stamp set and 200 fils souvenir sheet released for the recent Olympic Games; here the reasons were limited printing, excessively extended edition, and intentional inclusion of oddities.

The September issue stepped up the pace, citing Dubai's set of five Boy Scout stamps overprinted for the 1964 Winter Olympic Games (no direct relationship to the issuing country), Hungary's imperforate commemorative for the lawn tennis exhibition (limited printing and intentional inclusion of oddities), Libya's imperforate souvenir sheet for the Boy Scouts (limited printing and intentional inclusion of oddities), and Sharjah's souvenir sheet for the so-called "Girl Scouts" set (limited printing and intentional inclusion of oddities).

In October the pace slowed down, with only one accusation -- Togo's five - stamp perforate set and souvenir sheet to commemorate the 18th Olympic Games. The reasons here were an excessively extended issue, unwarranted inclusion of high values, and intentional inclusion of oddities.

In November a new high was reached, including Dahomey's three diamond-shaped stamps with the Olympic Motif in the designs (no direct relationship to the issuing country), Haiti's overprinted set for the Winter Olympic Games (no direct relationship to the issuing country), Honduras' set of five overprinted stamps for the 18th Olympic Games (no direct relationship to the issuing country), Maldive Islands' eight-stamp set and large souvenir sheet for the Olympic Games (excessively extended issue, no direct relationship to the issuing country, and intentional inclusion of oddities), Mauritania's four-stamp set for the 18th Olympic Games (no direct relationship to the issuing country), Romania's sets of eight perforate and eight imperforate stamps and a souvenir sheet for the Olympic Games (excessively extended issue and intentional inclusion of oddities), and Togo's four-stamp set and souvenir sheet for the 18th Olympic Games (no direct relationship to the issuing country and intentionally included oddities).

December was another big month with the following getting hit: Gabon's high-value set and souvenir sheet for the Tokyo Olympic Games (excessively extended issue, no direct relationship to the issuing country, and intentional inclusion of oddities), Guinea's six overprints (three in red and three in orange) for the Olympic Games (excessively extended issue, no direct relationship to the issuing country, and intentional inclusion of oddities), Middle Congo's high-value set and souvenir sheet to commemorate the Olympic Games (excessively extended issue and oddities intentionally included), Panama's stamps and other oddities associated with the Tokyo Olympic Game issue (limited printing, excessively extended issue, and intentional inclusion of oddities), and Yemen's Boy Scout airpost set (excessively extended issue and inclusion of unwarranted high values).

The December issue also contained an editorial ripping Dubai's entire Olympic "package" of ten perforate stamps, ten imperforate stamps, and an imperforate souvenir sheet. All items were black-listed.

It would appear that we are suckers of the most gullible variety. And the judgments are not all in yet!

More current black blots. In the December issue the APS program hit the Trucial State of Ajman for its Kennedy and Olympic Games commemoratives. The Kennedy set consists

of eight stamps and a souvenir sheet; three of these stamps depict sports. The set is faulted for restricted sale, excessive length, unwarranted high values, and intentional inclusion of oddities. The Olympic set hit the jack-pot, running counter to all five criteria--restricted sale, excessive length, unwarranted high values, no direct relationship to the issuing country, and intentional inclusion of oddities. to the issuing country, and intentional inclusion of oddities.

The Commission Against the Issuance of Undesirable Stamps of the Federation International de Philatelic (FIP) warns against the following debatable items: (1) Blocks of Chilean stamps overprinted "Para Que Chile competa en Tokio" or "Homenache a los sportistas Chileans". These were neither authorized nor issued by the Post Office Department of Chile.

(2) Privately perforated "Europa" stamps of Germany. 1964" and were applied after official sale of the stamps. The perforations read "Tokyo



Just as a matter of interest and to make stronger my previous point, I cannot resist the opportunity of displaying the Artopages first-day cover for the Sokol stamp:




It isn't the stamps or the cancellation which counts here, but rather the small drawings in the special cachet. Note the wide range of vigorous physical fitness and recreational activities which have been included. This is what physical fitness is all about. Thanks to Artopages' cover designer for giving the whole view. What a pity that someone else in the appropriate position in the Post Office Department didn't get the word!

Of late our good secretary-treasurer has had a few mild complaints from new members and especially re-instated members concerning the delay in receipt of first copies of "JSP". Please be patient; we are doing our best as amateur hobbyists.
