## THE TOKYO OLYMPIC TORCH RELAY

At Olympia, Greece, on Aug. 21, 1964, for the sixth time in the history of the modern Summer Olympic Games, the sacred flame was lighted from the rays of the sun. This first official ceremony of the Games of the 18th Olympiad took place in the presence of King Constantine of Greece, himself an Olympic champion in the yachting events in the 1960 Olympic Games. Before the ceremony the king paid homage to Baron de Coubertin by laying a wreath at the foot of the monument containing de Coubertin's heart.

From then onward the ceremony unfolded according to the ancient rite. A high priestess, Aleka Kaselis--one of the great actresses of the Greek National Theatre--surrounded by fourteen vestals, prayed to Zeus to grant his blessing and his light to the Olympic Games at Tokyo and then lighted an amphora by means of a concave mirror reflecting the rays of the sun. The high priestess then lighted the torch from the flame of the amphora, holding it out to the king in the presence of Her Royal Highness, Princess Irene, and some hundred personalities in the world of sport and politics.

Two speeches were made, by Mr. Daigoro Yusakawa, President of the Organizing Committee of the Tokyo Games, and by Admiral Lappas, Secretary-General of the Greek Olympic Committee (it should be noted that the Olympic flag was hoisted for the first time that same Friday morning, Aug. 21st, at the Kishi Memorial Hall, the seat of the International Olympic Committee in the Japanese capital, so as to commemorate the ceremony which was taking place at the same moment at Olympia).

The torch was entrusted to the first runner of the relay, George Marcellos, champion of Greece for the 110-meter hurdles. Before starting on his way to Athens, Marcellos bowed before the marble monument containing the heart of de Coubertin. About 320 relay runners, each covering one thousand meters, carried the flame as far as the Stadium of Athens.

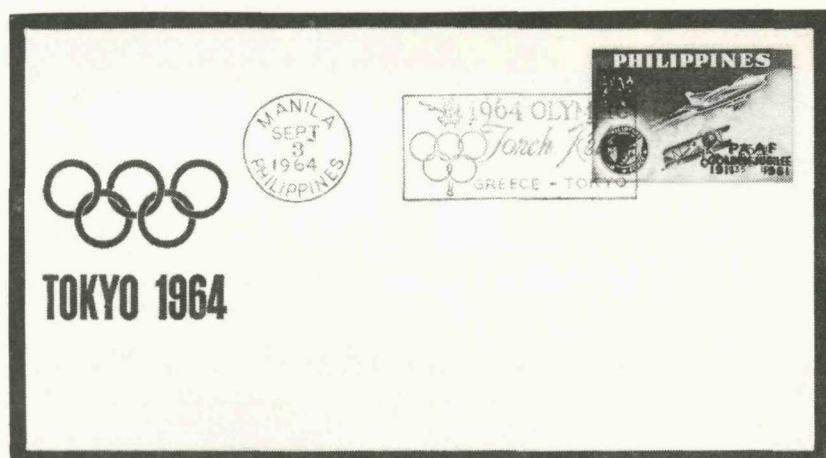
The card illustrated above was flown from Athens to Tokyo and shows a special pictorial cancellation of the torch being lighted from the amphora, dated at Olympia on Aug. 21, 1964, and a special oval cancellation for the fourth session of the International Olympic Academy at Olympia on Aug. 8-23, 1964.

The following day, August 22nd, the flame arrived in Athens and a ceremony was held that night at 9:00 P. M. at the stadium of that city. The torch was given to the Japanese delegation at 11:30 P. M. at the Athens airport.

At 3:15 P. M. the following day a specially chartered Japan Air Lines Douglas DC-6B1 departed from Athens for the first stop at Istanbul, Turkey. (Note: The original plan for an overland route from the Olympic torch relay had been discarded as impractical.) After Istanbul the plane made stops on August 24th at Beirut, Lebanon; August 26th, Teheran, Iran; August 27th, Lahore, Pakistan; August 28, New Delhi, India; August 29th, Calcutta, India; August 30th, Rangoon, Burma; August 31st, Bangkok, Thailand; September 2nd, Kuala Lumpur, Malaya; September 3rd, Manila, Philippines; September 4th, Hong Kong; September 5th, Taipei, Formosa; and September 6th, Naha, Okinawa. At Okinawa the torch changed aircraft for the final leg to Japan on September 9th.

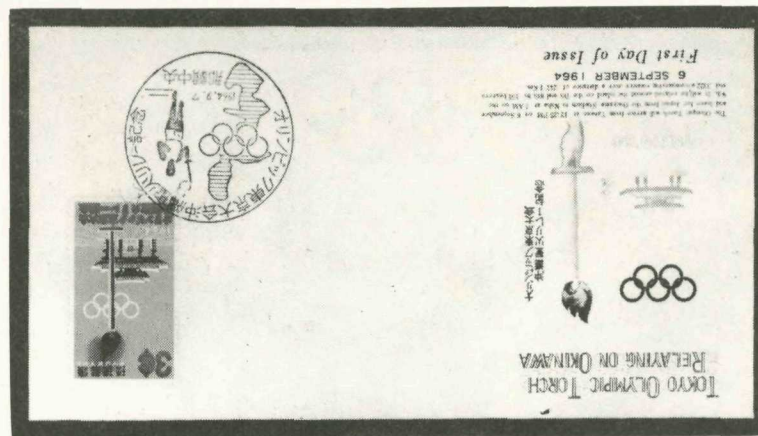
In Japan the torch was carried by young Japanese runners from sixteen to twenty years of age along four selected routes: Route 1, Kagoshima to Tokyo; Route 2, Miyazaki to Tokyo; Route 3, Aomori to Tokyo; and Route 4, Sapporo to Tokyo--a total of seven thousand kilometers with forty-six prefectures visited in thirty days. The Olympic flame arrived at the National Stadium in Tokyo for the opening ceremony on Oct. 10, 1964.

The National Olympic Committee of each country visited was responsible for carrying out the welcoming ceremonies. In Manila a special cancellation was used on Sept. 3, 1964, as shown on the Philippine cover illustrated below.

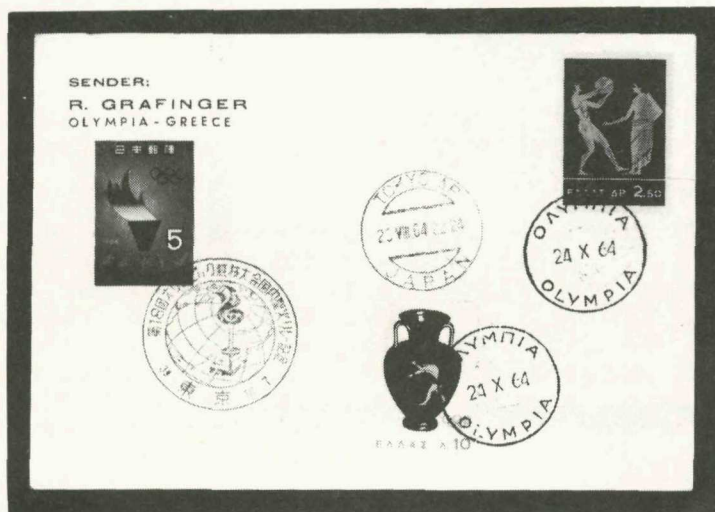


The Ryukyuku Islands Postal Administration issued a 3¢ stamp in commemoration of the Olympic torch relay on Sept. 7, 1964. The relay route in Okinawa was 247.1 kilometers, divided into 150 sections, with one major runner, two auxiliary runners, and twenty other runners following the first three. A first-day cover with special cancellation for the event is shown here.






The reverse of the card flown from Olympia to Tokyo shows an arrival date in Tokyo of August 23rd and, for return postage to Greece, bears the Japanese torch relay 5 yen commemorative stamp. Two types exist, each featuring different cancellations of the Japanese 5 yen stamp: (1) Olympic torch relay special cancellation and (2) Olympic Games opening at Tokyo Stadium.



The reverse of this same card also bears several Greek Olympic stamps with Olympia cancels dated Oct. 24, 1964, the closing date of the Olympic Games in Tokyo.

Shown below are both sides of a New Year's greeting card from George Papastefanou, Director of the Philatelic Museum of the International Olympic Academy at Olympia, Greece. The front side illustrates quite dramatically the story of the Olympic torch relay and carries a cancel of Olympic rings and laurel branch from ancient Olympia. On the reverse side beneath Papastefanou's signature is the official cancel of the Olympic Museum.

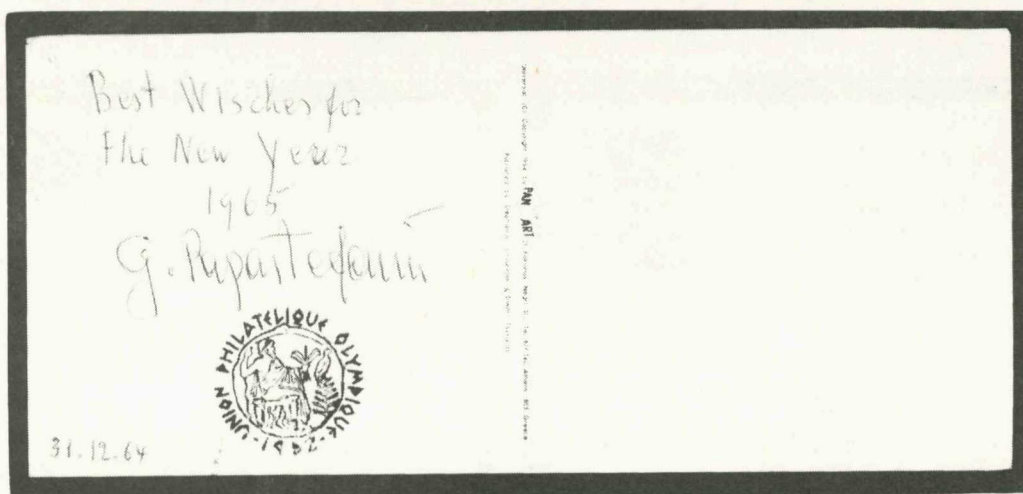
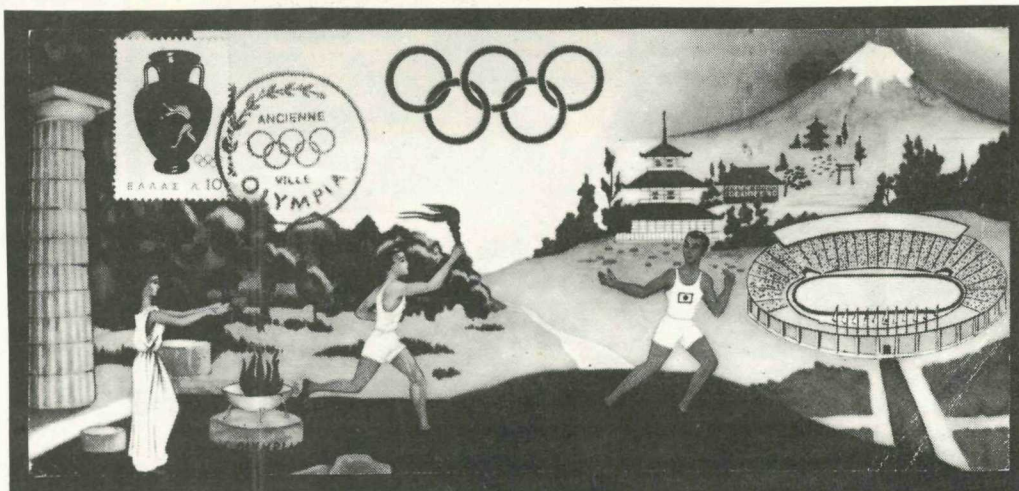

## A FRESH LOOK AT SPORTS STAMPS

A few months ago my youngest son brought home a book entitled "A Fresh Look at Cats". That is just what the book did; it took a new look at an old subject and came up with some fresh ideas. The book got me to thinking too--about my collection of sports stamps.

The past few years I suppose I've grumbled as much as any sports collector. I grumbled when the Olympic issues came and came and came. And I grumbled more when the imperfs, color changes, and souvenir sheets followed. The more I read in "JSP" how unhappy others were, the unhappier I became. At one time I was so discouraged that I almost wrote an article for "JSP" myself!

Then I got to thinking that perhaps, instead of grumbling, it was time to take a fresh look at my sports collection. This I proceeded to do. I got out my collection and gave it a good inspection. There are a lot of stamps--some pretty and some homely, some rare and some common, some I've always enjoyed and some I've always wondered why I bought. Of course at one time I was naive enough to think I'd get them all.

The second thing I did was to get out an article I wrote in 1949 entitled "Why I Collect Sports Stamps". I have given that talk several times and most of what I said then is still true today. I collected sports stamps because they related to a subject that is interesting to me. After all, what man doesn't read the sports page of the newspaper first? I have always enjoyed and been good at winter sports--skiing, skating, hockey--so they are of a special interest to me. My interest in track and field and in yachting is almost as great; this combination of sporting events accounted for a good percentage of the early sports stamps (before 1950).

Initially I started out keeping my stamps mounted strictly by sport and I'm still not convinced that this is not the best way. In fact, I still have thirty-six pages of stamps



mounted this way and intend to keep them so until I can get some good colored slides made.

By 1960 two things had happened to change my collecting ways. First, there were a lot of sports stamps by then. And secondly, I had a chance to work with George Kobyłka when he first planned his sports and Olympic albums. With a good album available and lots of stamps it was a lot easier to mount them by country; that's where most of mine are today.

But with lots of sports stamps already issued and a lot more on the way, my sports collection is now where my world-wide collection was a few years ago--getting a bit too big to enjoy.

As I looked at my collection recently some new ways to collect sports stamps occurred to me. First, why not just collect the stamps or sets that appeal particularly to me personally? If one would select ten or a dozen attractive sets each year, he could have quite an impressive collection. It could be a truly beautiful collection if design and color were his standards or it could be an historically interesting collection if just stamps issued to recognize special sporting events were selected.

Each year there are a good number of sports stamps or sets that could qualify as beautiful stamps by most standards. I was disappointed personally to see the Bonacossa Award for the most attractive sports stamp of the year given up. To me this would be a good subject for SPI. Let members nominate each year what they think is the most attractive sports issue. It could be done as a fun project or it could be made into a significant recognition. Just to start the pot boiling, I'll nominate the following sets:

1960--no nominations

1961--(1) Poland 1006-08; (2) Romania C96-102; (3) Hungary 1403-05 and B219

1962--(1) Poland 1079-86; (2) Yugoslavia C72-9; (3) France 1019

1963--(1) Bulgaria 1284-88; (2) Hungary 1484-89; (3) Japan 801

1964--(1) Jamaica 226; (2) Hungary 1578; (3) Ghana 179-85; (4) Japan 821-25

Another possibility would be to collect sports stamps strictly by the competition they were issued to honor. I've started this list of major competitions several times, but like lots of other collectors have never quite gotten the job done. I'll certainly be deflated if such a list appears in the next issue of our "JSP".

It's been a natural to separate the sports issued honoring the Olympic Games from other sports issues. There have been plenty of Olympic issues (putting it mildly), K-Line albums make the job easy and fun, and the Olympics are the granddaddy of them all and probably deserve to be collected by themselves. I am looking forward to George Kobyłka's development soon of separate albums for summer and winter Olympic issues, at least separate title pages so we could split our present holdings conveniently.

To me, though, some other special athletic events which are held on an annual or biennial basis and have stamps issued regularly in their honor would make fine individual collections. I am partial to:

World Ski Championship (FIS)--my favorite because I like the sport involved, the event is held regularly, and in most cases the host country has issued special stamps  
Japanese National Athletic Meet

August 31st of this year will mark the end of SPI's fourth year and the completion of the term of the present officers. So that our election of new officers may occur in sufficient time to permit a smooth transition from the old to the new, I have appointed the following members as our Nominating Committee: Helen Turner (SPI 17), Chairman, George C. Kobylka (SPI 11), William D. Stoms (SPI 181), and Barbara T. Williams (SPI 69). It is my hope that their slate of nominees and the official ballot can be included in the March issue of "JSP".

### PHILATELIC MARKET REPORT

- Fred Farr -

Tip of the month--Ireland 90. This stamp was first "tipped" here in the April, 1965, issue of "JSP". My source at that time was Martin Levin, noted New York stamp dealer and booster of SPI. I mentioned my surprise to find this stamp on Mr. Levin's list of undervalued sports stamps, but I also noted that "Mr. Levin must know what he is talking about".

How true! The latest supplement of "Stanley Gibbons! Stamp Catalogue" has raised the price of this stamp from 4d (5¢) to 2/6 (35¢). When a stamp increases in value by six hundred per cent at one jump, it's time you made sure that this stamp is in your collection NOW. Remember, this stamp is still freely available for ten cents a copy, but don't be so sure you will be able to pick it up at the same price a year from now.

Portugal 749-50. This ever-popular set was issued in honor of the 8th World Roller Hockey Championships, held in Oporto in 1952. Only 500,000 sets were issued and these seem to have completely disappeared from the market. I mentioned this set in my column in June of 1962, when the set was selling for \$2.00 retail. At that time I said: "Pay whatever your dealer asks and consider yourself lucky". This is still good advice--retailers ask \$4.50 for this set and the latest wholesale quotation is now \$6.00 in New York. If you neglected to add this set to your collection before, get it now before you are paying a ten-dollar bill for it.

France 883-86. Although I have said it before (July, 1964), I will say it again: "I like this set". Issued in 1958, these stamps depict various regional sports which are all native to France. Only 2,350,000 sets were issued, which is very small for France's postal needs. In the past year and a half American dealers have increased their prices from 50¢ to 75¢, which compares quite favorably with the current Paris quotation of 80¢. New York wholesalers, however, are now asking 75¢, which is the current retail price today. How long do you think that dealers can afford to sell stamps to you at the same price which they must pay themselves?

Persia 1159-60. Issued to commemorate the 17th Olympiad at Rome in 1960, this set is an attractive example of Persian art. Only 50,000 sets were issued, according to Henri Trachtenberg, although Ira Seebacher and Dr. Gerhard Schmidt stated 80,000 sets. Take your choice, but remember that it is still a small edition. New York wholesalers are asking 50¢ per set, while American retailers ask only 40¢. Dealers in Paris ask 90¢ retail, so you can see which way American prices are headed. If you still need this set, pay the 40¢ and be glad that you got a bargain.

Romania B77-81. This is an old set as sports stamps go, being issued back in 1937, when there were almost no sports stamps at all! Commemorating the 25th anniversary of the Federation of Romanian Sports Clubs, these handsome stamps show athletes engaged in various sports. Although some 100,000 sets were issued, these stamps have been either destroyed in the war or dispersed in collectors' holdings all over the world. Retailers are now asking \$2.75 in New York and wholesalers ask \$2.50. It won't be long before retailers are adding a dollar to their price, so fill those blank spaces now.

Philippines 610-12. Dynamic action is the only way to describe these three stamps, issued in 1954 to honor the 2nd Asian Games, held in Manila. Boxers, a diver, and a discus thrower are all shown on these stamps, which were mentioned in this column back in August of 1963. In those days you could buy a set for 85¢ retail; today it will cost you at least \$1.50 retail. Interestingly enough, however, the latest wholesale quotations in New York are \$2.00 per set, which makes the retail price look like quite a bargain indeed. The current price in London is \$1.80 retail and dealers in Paris get \$2.80 per set. If your stamp budget is limited, why not spend it on a set like this, which is always rising steadily? Forget the latest garbage from Afghanistan and Paraguay!

German Democratic Republic 51-2. Certainly no prize winner for its designs, this set was issued during the post World War II "austerity period", when ugly Spartan-like designs spewed forth from the East German stamp presses. Some 2,000,000 sets were issued, but these were rigidly controlled and few now exist on the wholesale market. American retailers now ask 70¢ for this set although wholesalers in New York quote prices ranging from 75¢ to 90¢. Dealers in Paris ask \$1.30 retail, up from 70¢ just two years ago. No, this



set won't sky-rocket, but it is a nice "buy" at today's retail prices. Incidentally, FDCs exist, but I have never seen them in pristine, unaddressed condition--yes, they actually were sent through the mails way back in 1950!

Austria B277. Here is an Olympiana item which is really hot and on the move! Don't let current quotations (retail or wholesale) fool you. A masterpiece of the engraver's art, this stamp was issued in 1952 in an edition of 350,000 copies and depicted a laurel branch and the five circles of the Olympic Games symbol. "Scott" values this stamp at \$11.00 (mint or used), but "Michel" lists it at \$18.75 mint and \$17.50 used. One New York wholesaler asks \$4.50 per mint copy, while another equally reputable wholesaler asks a more realistic \$7.80 (and guarantees delivery at this price). Retailers in New York ask anything from \$4.25 upwards, which is double what they asked just one year ago. Especially desirable are covers, both FDCs and commercially used, bearing this stamp.

Hungary 1336. This item is the souvenir sheet which accompanies #1326-35 and B218, written up in this column in March of 1964. This sheet, depicting a statue of Romulus and Remus (and the wolf, of course) and a bowl with the Olympic flame, was issued in an edition of 70,000 sheets (perforated). The wholesale price on this item has increased from approximately \$1.40 (as a new issue) to the current wholesale quotation of \$3.00. The retail price has likewise climbed from \$2.00 (two years ago) to the current asking price of \$3.00--exactly equal to wholesale quotations in New York. Dealers in Paris ask \$4.50 retail, up from \$3.00 one year ago. Dealers in London ask \$4.20 retail. If you need this souvenir sheet for your collection of Olympic Games stamps, then you had better buy now at the current retail quotation; it certainly isn't going to be any cheaper.

Jugoslavia C45-7. Although this set is attractive, there is nothing in the designs to indicate that these stamps have anything to do with sports. Each stamp depicts an alpine hospice on a renowned mountain peak of the Dinaric Alps, which is quite appropriate for a set issued to honor the 125th meeting of the International Union of Mountaineers (or Alpinists). The key stamp of this set is C47, issued in an edition of 30,000 copies, compared with "Scott's" more modest valuation of \$6.65. Wholesalers ask a minimum of \$2.50, although I am not certain if they can actually supply this set at this price. Retailers in New York ask \$5.00, up from \$3.50 just two years ago. French retailers ask \$8.00, up from \$4.50 just two years ago. Most dealers, both retailers and wholesalers, would rather buy this set than sell it--you will find it listed in almost all of the buying ads published today. By now you must have gotten the message--buy this set immediately while you can still afford it.

## REVIEWS

K-Line Part 5 for the 18th Olympic Games. The K-Line Publishing Company has closed out its preparation of album pages for the issues of the 18th Olympic Games with Part 5. This section covers the late perforate issues from Ajman (also souvenir sheet), Argentina, Bahamas, Bermuda, Cambodia, Comoros Islands, Cuba, Dahomey, Ecuador, Fujeira, Germany, Guatemala, British Guiana, Iceland, Iran, Israel (also tabs), Jordan (also souvenir sheet), Leichtenstein, Nicaragua, North Korea (Winter and Summer), Panama winners (also souvenir sheet), Poland winners (also four souvenir sheets), Qatar, Ryukyus, Somalia (also souvenir sheet), Somali Coast, United Arab Republic, Umm Al Qiwain (also souvenir sheet), Uruguay (also souvenir sheet), Wallis and Fatuna, Kenya, and Yemen (both governments)(also souvenir sheet). Two blank pages are included in each packet. For those who insist upon collecting them, a special section is prepared for the imperforate issues which correspond to the more legitimate items.

K-Line's usual quality and clarity continue. Purchasers can expect that the last sheets will match the first of the series for these Olympic Games. The perforate set (including the souvenir sheets) is priced at \$3.25 plus 65¢ postage. The imperforate set costs \$1.30 (postpaid).

Also included is a statement of policy regarding the preparation of album pages for the forthcoming 19th Olympic Games in Mexico City and their counterparts, the 10th Winter Olympic Games. K-Line will prepare pages for commemorative stamps issued by those countries which have a National Olympic Committee officially recognized by the International Olympic Committee. The stamps of non-affiliated countries will be ignored. R.M.B.
