

THE CASE OF THE "DIRTY DOZEN"

Case 2: The Case of the Handsome Wallflower
Most stamp collectors have favorite stamps. By that I mean that they have a certain stamp, or stamps, which intrigue them more than others and for which they have a certain liking. Mine happen to be those stamps issued by Haiti in 1939 to honor Pierre de Coubertin, the founder of the modern Olympic Games. They are colorful, the Haitian and Olympic flags standing out on either side. The main portion of each stamp (red, purple, and gray) is a solid color. From within the oval between the draped flags Coubertin peers out, his eyes practically staring into the observer. The size itself is impressive, being nearly twice as large as a modern-day commemorative.

And yet the stamps were extremely poor sellers in their day. The printing order was for 75,000 of each, in itself not a very large quantity. The stamps were not valid for postage after December 31, 1940; when the remainders were destroyed in the early part of 1941, the following quantities had been distributed; ten centimes, 8,680 ; sixty centimes, 6,797; and 1.25 gourde, 6,296. Ira Seebacher, in his "Handbook of Sports Stamps), gives verification for the figures on the sixty centimes and the 1.25 gourde. The figure for the ten centimes comes from other handbooks and is not verified. However, based on the current market price the amount is probably close to being exact.

Several explanations help one to understand the situation. The postage was a hundred per cent semi-postal (ten centimes plus ten centimes). Conditions in 1939-1940 were not very good economically in Haiti--or in other parts of the world. As little as the extra ten centimes was, it might have been enough to discourage the use of this stamp in Haiti. The two airmail stamps were also semi-postals; the sixty centimes was plus forty centimes and the 1.25 groude was plus sixty centimes. The two airmail stamps were intended $p$ narily for overseas mail. The sixty centime was sufficient to send an airmail letter to the United States while the 1.25 gourde value was more than the double rate.

These reasons would apply primarily to used copies and to covers. Used sets are difficult to locate and covers are almost impossible to find, especially those with the 1.25 gourde value. However, these reasons do not explain the poor sale of mint copies to collectors around the world. Even with the world turmoil of 1939-40 and the depression still hanging on, it is difficult to see how only 6,296 sets were sold (this includes the copies sent to the Universal Postal Union, often as many as 500). Even though sports philately was in its infancy, weren't there more world-wide collectors than this? Weren't there collectors of Haiti, the West Indies, or other regions to buy more copies than this? Why was this issue neglected so much?

If the lack of popularity were the only feature about this set, I would not have included it in the "Dirty Dozen". But there is more to be solved about this stamp. Here are some of the questions yet to be answered:

1. Were the stamps sold only in Port-au-Prince, the capital of Haiti? I personally have not seen a used copy or a cover which indicates any other city in Haiti; yet there are at least half a dozen other major cities. I have examined about forty used copies and seven covers. Some of the copies, of course, do not have a legible cancellation; however, all indications point to Port-au-Prince as the only city in which the stamps were distributed.
2. Why weren't the stamps used well into 1940, since they would be demonetized by the end of the year anyway? The latest use I have noted is May 7 th. Does anyone have a copy with a later date?
3. Who was the designer and what do the dates 1900-1940 on the stamp signify? The name of the designer should not be too difficult to unearth, but the two dates seem to have little relation: they are hard to connect with Coubertin or with Haiti's participation in the Olympic Games. Perhaps they have some connection with the national sports stadium which was to be erected in Port-au-Prince since the surtax was to be used for this purpose.
4. Why was the date of issue postponed from August 29th to October 3rd? "Sanabria" and "Scott" both persist in using the August $29 t h$ date for the two airmail stamps although this is completely wrong.
5. This may seem to be a ridiculous question, but how many stamps were in one sheet (or pane)? The printers, the American Bank Note Company, politely refuse to answer any philatelic questions because the amount of work involved is large, the records are in storage, and (most important of all) such information is considered confidential and should be obtained from the Haitian government.

I have sent three letters (in French!) to the Minister of Posts in Haiti, one to the Haitian representative to the United Nations, and three additional letters via the Haitian consul, Raoul Cayard, in Los Angeles. In two years not a single response has been forthcoming. Monsieur Cayard is presently revisiting his native country and is hopeful that he may bring some information on his return.

Until they, can you help clean up this member of the "Dirty Dozen"?
PHILATELIC MARKET REPORT

Tip of the month--Russia 678-86. The reader with a long memory will recognize this set as having been tipped in the April, 1964, issue of this journal. At that time, just two years ago, you could have bought a mint set for just $\$ 3.50$ and a used set for perhaps 75\%. I hope you won't ignore my advice this time because any further delay on your part may see these stamps sky-rocket!

Today a mint set will set you back about $\$ 5.00$ or so, but this is chicken feed compared to what it is really worth! Two years ago wholesalers offered this set for $\$ 4.00$ (above retail quotations at that time) and the same wholesalers offered to buy for $\$ 3.00$. But this doesn't tell the real story because the wholesalers can no longer supply this set, Which means that dealers can offer it only when they purchase a collection.

However, tremendous increases in the European stamp market have not yet been felt here in the United States. In 1964 "Michel" quoted a mint set for \$18.50; today "Michel" quotes a price of $\$ 65.001$ Compare these quotations with those of "Scott"--1964, \$6.50, 1966, \$16.00. Retail prices in Europe are still climbing for this elusive set and six months ago dealers in Paris asked $\$ 9.00$ although I would bet that this set is no longer available for such a reasonable price. These facts should be your tip-off to make darn sure that these stamps are in your collection now, even if you have to pay a lot more than that ridiculous $\$ 5.00$ retail price.

Incidentally, used sets are also worth picking up. In 1964 "Michel" quoted a valuation of $\$ 5.50$, although today the quotation is $\$ 11.25$. During this two-year interim "Scott" has raised its valuation for a used set by $45 \phi--f r o m ~ \$ 2.17$ to $\$ 2.62$. If you can find a used set at full "Scott" valuation, you will have made a good buy.

Russia 698-705. Issued on December 28, 1938, this set honors Soviet sportsmen and depicts Russian athletes engaged in eight different sports. This attractive set includes track and field as well as swimming, tennis, skilng, football, motorcycle racing (a big Soviet sport), and marching gymnasts. Long neglected by sports philatelists, this set has suddenly come alive and spurted in cost.

The wholesale price in New York City is a tip-off as to which way this set is going-1963, \$6.50; 1964, \$7.50; 1965, \$9.00; and 1966, \$14.00. The wholesalers will buy your mint set for $\$ 12.00$.

Retail prices are equally interesting. Available four years ago for $\$ 4.25$, this set has climbed to its current quotation of $\$ 13.00$ and up. Dealers in Paris get $\$ 15.00$ for it and, frankly, I can't foresee anything but a steady rise.

It is interesting to note that "Michel" quotes this set at $\$ 75.00$ although "Scott" values it at a mere $\$ 25.00$. That $\$ 75.00$ valuation in Europe can only drive up the price of the few sets still left on the American market. If you can't afford to buy a mint set, try to get it used--valued by "Michel" at $\$ 10.50$ and by "Scott" at $\$ 3.35$. However, if you can possibly afford it, get the mint set-and do it today.

Russia 784-88. This set honors the Second All-Union (National) Physical Oulture Day and depicts a relay race, marching sportswomen, the sports badge awarded to children, a cross-country skier, and an athlete throwing the grenade (some sporti). It is another excellent purchase at today's prices.

This set retails in New York City for $\$ 5.00$, compared with $\$ 2.25$ in 1962 and $\$ 3.40$ in 1964. However, dealers in Europe ask $\$ 7.00$ or more for this set. Wholesalers in the U.S. ask $\$ 4.00$, although I do not know if they can actually deliver at this price. "Michel" quotes it at $\$ 19.25$; compared with "Scott's" valuation of $\$ 9.40$. It is plain to see, therefore, that this set is greatly undervalued on the American market today. That's a big hint, isn't it?

Russia 1284-88. Some sports philatelists may not consider this set worthy of inclusion in their collection because it honors the Young Pioneers, Russia's answer to the Hitler Youth, the American Boy Scouts, etc. However, several values of this set depict these children flying model airplanes, marching, and assembled around a campfire.

Retail prices have been climbing for several years--1962, \$1.75; 1964, \$2.50; today, \$3.50. It is noteworthy that no wholesaler can supply mint sets of this issue, so no large stocks are held by anyone. This means that this set can only go upwards in price, so you know what to do.

Russia 1334-40. This set honors International Women's Day, an event celebrated in Russia on March 8, 1949. Actually only the top value (1340), the one-ruble denomination, is an item of sports philately. This lone stamp depicts women athletes and is a very necessary item for your collection.

This set currently retails for $\$ 3.00$ in New York, although "Scott" gives it a valuation of $\$ 3.60$. "Michel" is more realistic, quoting it at $\$ 7.50$. Wholesale stocks don't exist, hence this set is now firming up in price. It's noteworthy that "Michel" quotes this one-ruble denomination at $\$ 2.50$, which is almost what you pay for the whole set on the American market.

A terse announcement from my local Postmaster (concerning another matter) makes it quite obvious that the Post office Department really means business in requiring individual zip code entries on second and third class mailings as of January 1, 1967. Our January issue is always a problem because of the volume of Christmas mail so it is probably safe to suggest that the December, 1966, issue of "JSP" will be the last mailing prior to the enforcement of the new regulation.

I can think of no better method to solve our likely problem than for our mailers to simply destroy those mailing tabs which do not include zip code numbers (for all addresses in the fifty state). This would be harsh medicine and would cause any number of protests when it happened. But there is one way to prevent it in your personal case: Check the current mailing of "JSP"--the one you are reading right now. If the zio code number is included, you are sitting pretty. If it doesn't show up, get it to Secretary-Treasurer Len Eichorn NOW. The last date for changes in mailing tabs for our December issue go from his office on November lst. Don't let it happen to you.

With this issue of "JSP" we wrap up Volume 4 of our periodical and the fourth year of SPI. Add two badly-starred years as an ATA unit and we find that our organization is really six years old. Much has happened in those six years--much to be proud of and some of the opposite. Many of the issues of "JSP" during the last year fall in that latter category. Let us simply hope that the next SPI year will be a little more kind to "JSP" and that our members will be a little more cooperative with its editor.

## Answers:

47. San Marino 327 does exist in a variety showing a white line above the name panel "Republica di San Marino". However, this is merely a printing variety, caused by the poor alignment of the two separate printings--the bottom panel was printed in brown and the rest of the stamp in black. As often happens when stamps have to go through the printing press twice, the two colors will either overlap, giving a weird shade to the area where they touch, or they may be out of alignment by a fraction of a millimeter, giving the appearance of a white line (no ink) in the area where the two colors do not meet. It is this latter condition which prevails on the variety. (Fred Farr, SPI \#2)
48. Cliff Jeger (SPI 147) quotes a release from the October 27, 1957, issue of "The New York Times" as the authority for the following women's basketball results: An A.A.U.sponsored team from the United States won the Second Women's World Basketball Championship by defeating Russia 5l-48. The U. S. team was undefeated in six games while Russia lost only once.
49. Again Fred Farr comes through. Colombia $0297-98$ commemorated a bicycle race from Barranquilia to Bogota, entirely within Colombia. Obviously this was not an international event. The winner is still unidentified.
(Editor's note: I just can't believe that the entire membership of SPI is so lacking in knowledge that we cannot, as a group, answer every one of these questions as they appear. The point is that we don't. Within the first twenty questions let's concentrate on Nos. 8, 13, 14, 16, and 17 and wipe clean that part of the slate. This is a challenge to you individually and collectively. R.M.B.)
