I have enjoyed, and certainly benefitted from the articles on Sokol in JSP, but being somewhat of a specialist in Czechoslovakian sports material, I believe I am able to add additional information which may be of interest to other members. My modest bit follows, and I think that many of our members can send additions to almost everything which has been written. It is through this cooperation that we will all be better sports philatelists.

Although the first Sokol meet was held in Prague in 1882, there is little to commemorate the event philatelically. Most material suitable to a collection would be in the form of post cards with Sokol themes or various labels issued by C O S (Bohemian Sokol Community).

In 1887, the Prague Sokol issued postcards to publicize the Sokol movement. The cards are unusual in that the designation in small German lettering reads 'Correspondence-Karte' and in larger lettering the Czech 'Korespondencni Listek'. In the place for franking, an excerpt from the Human Rights law is quoted in which in essence states that in all lands its language is used in schools, in official places, as well as in everyday life, is recognized and sacnctioned by the State. At this time, Bohemia was under the Austro-Hungarian Empire government. It was the idea of Sokol to keep the national spirit alive and for a time it was done successfully. The postal authority finally realized that by permitting the use of such propaganda, it was furthering the Sokol idea so it passed regulations against the use of such cards. It appears nothing was done about the artwork on the face side of the cards since even after the legends were forbidden, cards continued to be issued with view cards showing busts of leading Sokol personalities such as Dr. Tyrs, Jindrich Fugner and Dr. Gregr. Some showed the emblem of Bohemia and many carried various slogans. (Figs 1 & 2)



Perhaps the most interesting of all items is the label-framer. These must be the most unusual of all labels. The Sokol Smichov in Prague, while honoring the Austrian commemorative stamps in 1908, cleverly stole the show. The labels were printed in very large format and in various colors. The center of the labels measuring exactly the size of the issued stamps were left blank; the labels also carried denomination designations for all values of the printed stamps. Thus, the labels formed a 'framer' for a stamp of a given value. In use, the labels were first affixed to the cover or card in the proper place, then the correct value postage was affixed to the blank space in the label. This was probably the forerunner of the Stamp on Stamp specialty - except of course - here it was stamp on label. (Fig. 3)


You can imagine the propaganda value of this little device. The mails were properly franked and therefore received service and yet around each of the stamps was a publicity item for Sokol. The labels read 'NA TELCOVICNU SOKOLA II TYRS na SMICHOVE' (To Tyrs Sokol Hall II in Smichov). Thanks to publicity given the labels by the German press and to the intervention of higher politicians, these labels were soon used up. In the beginning, the postal authority had inadvertently aided the Sokol cause but soon afterwards realized its mistake and the use of such labels were forbidden. These items, postally used, are rarities now.

There was only one commemorative cancel used during the Austro-Hungarian Empire and that was 'VI Sokol Meet in Prague 1912'. The first cancel after the birth of the Czechoslovakian Republic in 1919 was for a meet in the city of Znojmo. It reads 'SOKOLSKI SLET VA ZNOJME C.S.P. 24.8.1919'.

In 1926 a label was issued depicting Trys' home. It was sold for 10 Haleru and was in commemoration of the VIII Sokol meet in 1926. The illustration shows the label with a postal cancellation bearing the legend 'Praha 6.VII, 1926 VIII SLET VSESOKOLSKY' (VIII SOKOL MEET) (Fig. 4)





In all, there are about 80 different special cancellations relating to the Sokol meets, and an undetermined number of special publicity labels. Specialists are always on the alert for such items and perhaps the information here will be of value to those who collect such material.

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The Kear of Glasgow Celtic

Next to the World Cup - the European Cup for national club champions is the most important honour on the Soccer calendar. Indeed, such is the passion and the reward in winning it-clubs think nothing of withdrawing their key players from the national side, who may be playing for a place in the World Cup.


Initiated more than ten years ago by the French sports paper L'Equipe, the tournament was quickly taken over by FIFA and under their jurisdiction it has become the world's greatest money spinning tournament of all.

The first five years, Real Madrid, the famous Spanish club of Puskas, De Stefano, Kopa etc. held a tight grip on this trophy and became world renowned. As these stars who were recruited from all over the world mellowed with age, their great rivals Benfica, from Lisbon known as the Portuguese Red Eagles took over the mantle of greatness. For the next two years they reigned as champions. It seemed that no nation could break this Iberian domination. By 1963, the Milanese clubs from Italy, A.C. Milan and Inter broke the strangle hold of the Iberians and the Cup went to Italy. Again in order to do this, great names were recruited at fabulous sums from all over the world.

In England and Scotland for that matter, the wealthy clubs cast covetous eyes in the direction of the European Cup as they vied with one another to capture and be the FIRST British club to achieve this honour. Year in, year out, into the melting pot of Europe they went only to be fried, sizzled and tossed out to fight another day. But first they had to win their respective national championship - no mean this in itself. In Scotland, the powerful Glasgow Rangers were the nation's representives on merit. Year in, year out, as Scottish champions they had failed time and again. By 1966, Celtic on the other hand having nursed and wielded their 'Babes' who had now grown in stature emerged with a powerful pool of home bred players. No foreign players were considered. At their very first attempt they swept all before them and became the first British team ever to win the European Cup, when they defeated the Italian club Inter Milan in the final at Lisbon.


To be Scotland's representitives, they first had to win the national championship. They did more than this; they won everything in sight. The four major Scottish honours were won. The signed card postmarked commemorating the four major honours was franked on the day during the actual times these matches were played - the time and date stamp shows the start and termination of each of these games.

The Grand Slam of Scottish football included Scottish League Cup (Rangers) - Glasgow Cup (Partick Thistle) - Scottish Cup (Aberdeen) - Scottish League Championship (Rangers) - Runners up. Autographed by Celtic pool of players and President, General Secretary of UEFA (European Football Association). Postmarks record the commencement and the termination of each of the honours. 









Uruguay issued a stamp to commemorate the Victory of the Penarole Club in the Intercontinental Soccer Championships of 1966 (Scott 758) which is affixed to the card and is autographed by the Penaroid players pool. (Fig. 12)





On the same day the launching of the Q4 at Clydebank called for an additional handstamp upon the cover. Autographed by the Kiev player pool. The cover is addressed to Kniga U.S.S.R. REVIEWS

Bateman, Robert, The Encyclopedia of Sports Stamps. London: Stanley Paul, 1969, 193pp. (available in this country from the American Topical Association, 3308 N. 50th St., Milwaukee, Wisc. 53216 @ \$6.00 postpaid)

This interesting little volume is printed on glossy paper with quite respectable black-and-white illustrations. It is hard bound, but is rather small in format (5 1/4 x 8 1/4"). "Gibbons" catalogue numbers are used throughout with a further arrangement according to the three standard "Gibbons" volumes.

The indexing is (1) by country with background notes on its sports activities, (2) major and minor sports and sports sub-topics, (3) sports personalities, and (4) Olympic, world, and regional championships. Sample entries include: Abu Dhabi, acrobatics, Aden, Aegean Islands, Afghanistan, air sport, Ajman, Albania, Albright (Tenley), Algeria, American football, American Topical Association, etc.

A rough analysis indicates that sixty-four pages are devoted to illustrations while ninety-eight involve descriptive text. Therein lies a sympton of the weakness of this publication. The author has tried to cover the entire area of sports philately in less than one hundred pages and, in so doing, has spread himself disastrously thin. It just can't be done!

The volume suffers further (particularly for readers in North America and Europe) from the "Gibbons" base of reference with its unfamiliar catalogue numbers, its own set of definitions, and thus its limitations. No truly philatelic date is included. Significant omissions include the International Peace Bicycle Races and the World University Games; undoubtedly, careful study would locate others. In attempting to highlight the occasional difficulty of classifying a given stamp by sport, the author lists Jugoslavia 363 (Gi735) under basketball only; but its overprint, Trieste--Zone B 55 (GiJ69), is classified under both basketball and netball!

In summary, this publication sets broad definitions and goals for itself in the field of sports philately, but it cannot do justice to the assignment. Like so many other publications and periodical articles of its type, it will provide interesting reading, likely stimulate thought, and possibly engender new ideas, particularly for the novice sports collector; but in no sense of the word can it be regarded as a definitive reference work on sports philately.

Tomassini, Elio, La Pallacanestro Nei Francobolli (Basketball on Stamps). Porto San Giorgio, Italy: Author, 1969, 119 pp. (available from the author, Viale N. Sauro, 139, 63017, Porto San Giorgio, Italy, @ \$2.00 for surface delivery and \$2.50 by air mail).

This highly specialized publication will be of general interest to all sports collectors and of particular appeal to those who concentrate on basketball philately. Written entirely in Italian and using Yvert catalogue numbers for reference, it is divided into two distinct parts.

The first section traces basketball on stamps chronologically, from the Philippines' issue of 1934 to early 1969, indicating, where appropriate, the competition commemorated. In some cases, particularly where Italian teams have been involved, the results of the competition and the names of the individuals on the Italian squads have been included. For a few competitions, usually those held in Italy, special cancellations are described and illustrated; no illustrations of basketball stamps, per se, are included in this section.

The second section lists alphabetically by country all known basketball stamps; most are illustrated in black-and-white. The data includes the year (but not the month and day) of issue, the event commemorated, and the perforation of each set, as well as the Yvert catalogue number, face value, and the color of the stamp. Where the basketball stamp is only one of a set, all numbers of the set are so listed and described. Monetary value for both mint and used copies, expressed in Italian lira, are given for each set and for each basketball stamp; these values are based on the 1969 editions of the major catalogues.

The omission of Bulgaria 1161 (Yt1072), Italy 804 and 806 (Yt817 and 819), Japan 824 (Yt874), and Mexico 999 (Yt752) is especially noticeable; these five stamps depict buildings in which major championship basketball has been played and would seem worthy of inclusion in a basketball collection. Also Khor Fakkan Mi33 has been overprinted for new currency under the catalogue number, Mi97. Catalogue descriptions of Jugoslavia 363 (Yt615) and Trieste--Zone B 55 (Yt63) vary (some describe the subject matter as "basketball", others as "handball"), but these stamps seem to be generally accepted as depicting basketball; yet they are not included in Tomassini's tract. Conversely, Wallis and Futuna C28 (YtA30) is nowhere described as depicting "basketball" and the design appears far more appropriate for volleyball. Romania 2032 (Yt2448) semms to fall into the same category.

The reader unaccustomed to the Italian language will have difficulty in understanding and using the first section of the volume; however, with a little practice (and perhaps the judicious use of a simple Italian-English dictionary), the second section will be quite comprehensible and, thus, quite useful. For the reader bothered by "Yvert" catalogue numbers, the research projects published in the March-April, 1969 (pp. 15-7), and July-August, 1969 (p. 3), issues of "JSP" should make transformation to "Scott", "Gibbons", or "Michel" numbers quite easy. Thus this publication is a solid contribution to sports philately and a worthwhile reference, especially to the basketball philatelist.

MOUNTAIN CLIMBING CARDS AVAILABLE

Mountain climbing enthusiasts have the opportunity to acquire a special card to be mailed by the Annapurna South Face Expedition in March. The card will be illustrated with a photograph of Annapurna and will be stamped with a special 'Base Camp' symbol. It will also be autographed by the members of the expedition.

Annapurna is one of the most formidable unclimbed mountains in the world with a summit of 26,545 feet in Nepal. The expedition is led by Christian Bonington and the team consists of Kelvin Kent, Dr. David Lambert, Michael Thompson, Dougal Haston, Tom Frost, Nick Estcourt, Ian Clough, Mick Burke, Martin Boysen and Don Whillans.

OLYMPIC DAY by Helen Turner

After much thought, the Greek Olympic Committee decided in 1966 to celebrate Olympic Day annually on a fixed day throughout the country.

The purpose of the celebration is to arouse public interest, in particular among the youth of the country, in the Olympic Movement, its philosophy and its ideals, in the most effective way possible, making full use of modern means of communication, press, radio, and television.

Why April 6th? April 6th was chosen as the fixed date since it is the date when the first modern Olympic Games started in Athens in 1896. Ever since it has marked the start of modern Olympiads.

Many events take place during the celebration, but the one of interest to philatelists is the special postage stamp issued representing the Olympic Day emblem (a map of the world with the five Olympic Rings). A postmark is designed for use only on April 6th on all correspondence leaving Greece.

Many other countries of the world celebrate an Olympic Day, but none have officially designated a particular day each year for the event.

Although Greece has designated April 6th as its national Olympic Day, because of the historic nature of that particular day, it could have been March 25 because at the time of the first modern Olympic Games in 1896 Greece was still using the Julian calendar, which was twelve days behind the Gregorian calendar in use at that time throughout much of the world. In fact, Greece did not adopt the Gregorian calendar until 1923. No doubt because of the unification of the entire world to the Gregorian calendar, it is much simplier to use April 6th.

Since the official decision of celebrating April 6th as Olympic Day, Greece has issued two stamps in its honor - Scott's Nos. 886 (1967) and 913 (1968). No stamp was issued for 1969, or did I miss noting it on my records?

The Olympiana column will again become a regular part of each journal, however the length and scope of the articles can only be continued with the help of the members. Articles, long or short, are welcome, also questions and suggestions of specific areas of interest to collectors individually and collectively.
