

A set of 5 cacheted envelopes, each imprinted with the 4k red coat of arms pattern stamp (Scott type 2443), at left, each has Olympic Rings and Olympic Torch and year 1964. The cachets are as follows:

- (A) Cross country skiing, imprint date on envelope flap - 4/I-64r
 - (B) Ice hockey, imprint date on envelope flap - 8/I-64r Moscow.
 - (C) Skier in flight, imprint date on envel. flap - 8/I-64r Moscow.
 - (D) Ice skater racing, Imprint on flap - 4/I-64r Moscow.
 - (E) Innsbruck Games Emblem, imprint date on flap - 30/XII-63r Moscow.
- In addition to the date on the flap is also the name of the designer.

24. Japan 1964 commemorating XVIII Olympic Summer Games, Tokyo.

Aerogram with 50 yen carmine, wings enclosing Olympic Rings, imprinted stamp. Issued Sept. 9, 1964. This design was not issued as a regular stamp. Designer Minoru Hisano. Quantity 2.5 million. H&G #F26. Kessler's #25. Godinas #A25.

27 Mexico 1967 commemorating XIX Olympic Summer Games Mexico City 1968

(A) Envelope with 40¢ orange, stone head of colossus Tabasco Arqueologia imprinted stamp (type Scott 862). H&G #B86.

(B) Envelope - same as (A) with additional text in blue: Use Y colección estampillas postales Olímpicas (Use and collect the postage stamps of the Olympics). H&G #B87.

(C) Envelope - same as (B) with assitional text in blue: Esta forma tiene un valor adicional de \$0.10. H&G #B87a. Size of all three envelopes: 166:93mm.

28 Russia 1967 in connection with 10th Olympic Winter Games, Grenoble, France.

Five (5) cacheted envelopes with 4k-different colors-coat of arms pattern & year 1966 imprinted stamp (type Scott 3260). Each envelope has a 4 line imprint notation in the same color as the stamp thereon (color given below in brackets) with same date 7/XII-67r. On the other side, right under imprint lines, on the front, at the left, picture cachets (in the same designs as the Russia Olympic set, Scott 3360-70)

- (A) Two figure skaters (dark gray).
- (B) Ski jumping (yellow).
- (C) Grenoble Emblem of Olympic Games (light gray).
- (D) Ice hockey (ochre).
- (E) Cross country ski race (dark green).

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A REVIEW OF THE LATEST SPORT COINS & MEDALS

WESTERN SAMOA

The Western Samoa government recently released a 1974-dated silver one-tala (dollar) coin with the same design and specifications as the 1974-dated one-tala cupronickel coin released earlier this year in commemoration of the 10th British Commonwealth Games held Jan. 24 to Feb. 2 in Christchurch, New Zealand.

The coin measures 39 millimeters with a total mintage of 1,500 silver specimens.

The asking price was \$22.50 US with offers of up to \$60 US per coin being made by Australian dealers.

WEST GERMANY

A set of 10 silver medals was issued commemorating the 1974 World Championship Soccer Games. The games will be held in nine major West German cities.

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

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

OFFICIAL MEDAL OF THE XII CENTRAL AMERICAN AND CARIBBEAN SPORT GAMES OF 1974



A crown size medal has been struck to commemorate the XII Central American and Caribbean Sport Games of 1974. The games took place in the Dominican Republic starting Feb. 27th.

A total of 20,000 medals were struck, all in .925 fine (sterling silver). The medal was designed by Marcial Schotborgh, assisted by Jose Antonio Caro Alvarez, director of the Museum of Dominican People and Dr. Marcio Veloz Maggiolo.

The medals are available from Almanzar's, Bank of San Antonio, Bldg., Suite 208, One Romana Plaza, San Antonio, TX 78205, for \$12.50 each.

The obverse of the medal depicts the adopted symbol for the games. On the reverse, it shows three scantily clothed Indians playing Batey which was a game played by the Indians from the VIII to XVI century and was their favorite pastime when Columbus discovered America. This is in fact believed to have become the baseball of today.

In a book entitled Historia General y Natural de Indias, by Gonzalo Fernandez de Oviedo 1526, chapter 11 describes this game in great detail. A brief summary of the translation is as follows:

In each town, there was a gathering place where their ballgame was played. In this place, the chieftain, and leaders of the tribe sat on beautiful and elaborate wooden benches. The remainder of the tribe

sat on large stones. The ball, unlike the inflated ball used in Spain was constructed of a substance resembling a black paste made from a mixture of a substance obtained from the trunk of a tree and certain herbs. They rounded this black substance into a ball of a similar size to the inflated balls used in Spain, except that these balls were able to bounce higher than those then used in Spain. The ball was so heavy that they were unable to hit it with their hands, so they used their shoulders, forearms, head, hips and more often the knees, and with a great deal of ease. (The author goes into great detail and description of the methods used to play this game.) This game was played not only by the men, but the women as well; men against men, women against women, and sometimes mixed groups. He noted that the married women arrived with attire wrapped around from the waist, midway around the thighs, and that the virgins were always in the nude, regardless whether they were playing or not. Their nudity was indicative of the fact that they had no carnal knowledge of man. The velocity and ability in which they moved and played this game was really amazing. All the men were in the nude; however, when they were playing before the Spaniards, they wore a loincloth of cotton, no larger than the hand, in order to cover their private parts, which was held only by a string around the waist.


WEST GERMANY

NEW ZEALAND

Maori carving is featured on New Zealand medals sold individually by Pacific Commemorative Society, Box 15-118, Auckland, New Zealand.

Medals measure 42-mm, available in aluminum, copper, silver and gold. The medals were struck to commemorate the 1974 Commonwealth Games and the Royal Visit, struck by the Waitangi Mint. No price given.



CANADIAN OLYMPIC COINS

Andre Ouellet, Postmaster General of Canada and official in charge of the 1976 Montreal Olympic Games coin and stamp issues, announced plans for the issuance of the first four coins in a total series of 28 pieces.

The first commemorative coins for the Games were distributed in early Dec. This is the initial minting in an overall program of seven separate series of sterling silver coins.

Each series will consist of four coins, two \$5 pieces and two \$10 pieces, each with a different design. Coins are struck in sterling silver (.925 silver, .075 copper) and minted in both proof-like and uncirculated condition. All coins are to be legal tender in Canada.

The \$5 coins measure 38 millimeters and feature map of North America and skyline of Kingston, while the 45 millimeter \$10 pieces feature map of world and skyline of Montreal.

Tentative issue dates and general themes for the other six series issues, each to consist of two \$5 and two \$10 sterling silver coins, is as follows:

Second series, issued in spring of 1974, features Olympic Torch, Olympic Flame, laurel wreath and olive branch. Third series, fall 1974 issue, consists of scenes of early Canadian sports such as lacrosse, archery, boat races and horsemanship. Fourth series, scheduled for spring 1975, covers Olympic track and field sports. Fifth series, fall 1975, illustrates Olympic water sports and sixth issue, spring 1976, depicts team and body contact sports.

The seventh series is to be a souvenir issue scheduled for June or July, 1976 release. Olympic sites at Montreal and Kingston (site of some water sports), possibly including aerial view of Olympic stadium will be the theme.

Altho the coins will be legal tender in Canada, only @10% will be sold at face value to the general public. The balance will be sold at a premium over face value. Depending upon the type of packaging, the sets will sell from \$45 to \$50 each, plus shipping costs. The proof coins will sell for \$70 per set plus \$2.50 shipping. All are available from the Mint, PO Box 476, Station A, Ottawa, Canada K1N 8V5.

These sets will also be available from various banks and private coin dealers. Please note the total costs will run several hundred dollars for the complete series. This is the latest information available on the prices of the coins and undoubtedly will be higher by the time you read this article.



SINGAPORE

Late in 1973, Singapore minted two coins for the South East Asia Games. The \$5 coin was struck in 5,000 pieces, .500 silver and measuring 38-mm. The \$10 coin was struck in 5,000 pieces, .900 fine silver and measuring 40-mm. The mint price was \$20 and \$30 each.

THE AUCTION OF THE ERNEST TRORY OLYMPIC COLLECTION

On October 26, 1973 the well-known Ernest Trory Olympic Games collection was sold by Robson Lowe Ltd. at Basle, Switzerland. A luxuriously illustrated catalog of 167 lots was prepared. Unfortunately, advance publicity in the American philatelic press was nil or inadequately considered. That the auction was held in continental Europe rather than in Robson Lowe's London headquarters seems to have been based on two factors: (1) the strength of the Swiss franc against the dollar and sterling currencies, and (2) the possibly more intense popularity of topical collecting in Europe than elsewhere.

Comparison of the auction catalog with Trory's Philatelic Histories of the Olympic Games publications suggests that several items from Trory's collection illustrated those publications were privately sold prior to the auction. Nevertheless, the auction is rich not only in the issued stamps, but also in postal history, vignettes, forgeries, proofs, color trials, fiscal overprints, essays, picture postcards, pre-cancels, and much other unusual material.

Robson Lowe's total valuation was 36,675 Swiss Francs (hereafter SF.) The auction realization was 58,415 SF to which must be added 10%

commission to be paid by purchasers for a total of 64,257 SF. Using 31¢ as the dollar value per franc based on Feb. 1974 exchange rates, the results are:

Total Valuation	\$11,369
Total realization including 10% commission	\$19,920

Percentagewise, total realization including commission exceeded total valuation by over 75%!

The most startling realization was for a 1948 card from Olympia to Pyrgos bearing two Greek pictorial definitives cancelled with the torch circular date stamp used during the Olympic Torch ceremony. Reportedly, less than six such items exist. Valued at 125SF, this card realized 1320 SF (\$409) including commission. Realizations that follow also include commissions.

The highest realization was 4950 SF (\$1,535) for a complete sheet of 60 of the 60 lepta 1896 Athens Olympic stamp, despite a few severed perforations. The sheet was split into three sections each consisting of two panes of 10 stamps. This compared with Robson Lowe's valuation of 1200 SF (\$372).

Another outstanding realization was 2750 SF (\$853) for a first day cover of the 1896 Greek Olympic stamps from 1 lepta to 1 drachma with the rare "8 Athens 8" postmarks. Valuation was only 450 SF (\$140).

The auction covered Olympic Games material from 1894 to 1960. The following is a schedule of some of the more significant realizations in the sale.

Almost without exception, anything unusual in early material did well in the realizations. Yet there are surprises in the later material. The Trory auction is an important milestone in the Olympic philatelic market. This writer knows that some of these items were purchased by a European specialist dealer, no doubt for resale. One item he acquired is the 1906 Greeting Card, as described above. All in all, this was an eye opener auction.

Fishing Is The Theme Of Austrian Stamp

Issued on November 8, 1971 with postal validity from November 15, 1971, this single 2s Austrian stamp is another in the continuing series of stamps with a sports motif.

Sport fishing is the subject of this stamp, which was designed by Otto Stefferl, and engraved by Werner Pfeiler. Recess printing was by the Austrian State Printing Office in an edition of 3,200,000 copies.

History relates that in the primeval times, the first inhabitants of the earth were hunters and fisherman. Claudius Aelinaus, a Roman rhetorician, described in his book "De animalium natura" how the Macedonians captured a certain spotted fish in the river Astraeus by means of a lure composed of colored wool together with a rod, line and hook. These Macedonians seemed to have been the first to catch fish for pleasure, because others who earned their livelihood by fishing - like Simon of Galilee - used nets, weirs and hand-lines.

Almost every nation treats in its mythology the fish and the taking of fish in a particular way; so the fisherman is very prominent as a subject in painting, sculpture and music.

In Austria legal provisions and regulations have controlled the capture and sale of fish for centuries. Many Austrian fish-breeders make great efforts to promote and intensify breeding of freshwater fish. New fishing areas are made accessible to those for whom angling has become a favorite pastime, by restocking waters which are otherwise regarded as too polluted for fish-breeding. The principle of "more health through clean water" has ceased to be a simple motto only; it has become an issue of vital interest to the whole world, including Austria, although that country seems to be luckier than its neighbors, as its waters are comparatively rich in fish.

In Austria the following methods of fishing are used, depending on whether it is in pools or streams: bottom fishing, spinning, trolling, seining and netting, and fly-fishing.


Fishing outfits have become very elaborate and complex with excellent gear for the sport being offered on the market.

There are about 60 species of fish in Austria, favorites being the different kinds of trout, huchen, char, grayling, all species of bleak, carp, barbel, bream and the fish of prey, like pike, pike-perch and wels, etc.

Visitors to Austria may obtain a temporary fishing license at the two big fishing associations: the Austrian Fishing Society and the Association of Austrian Workmen's Fishing Clubs which is also a member of the international committee of fishing clubs; also the competent local authorities issue temporary fishing licenses.

The Austrian Tourist Center in Vienna publishes an annual booklet in English and French with the title "Angling in Austria."

The many fishing associations organize fishing competitions in line with the rules issued by the international committee of fishing clubs. The number of competitors is ever increasing. The "tournament competitors" are united in the Casting Association and participate successfully in the various events of the organization. Maja Schulze has been world champion in various disciplines for several years.





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
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
