Continued from the last issue---
11. 1963 Fiji (Scott 201) First South Pacific Games - Hockey, 1 Shilling, brown, green and black.

The first South Pacific Games were held at Suva in 1963. Hockey enjoys considerable popularity in Fiji and the models for the stamp are identified as two well-known players, Adhavji Bhai and M. M. Maharaj.
12. 1964 Albania (Scott 759) Olympic Games Tokyo 1964 Hockey and Pentathlon. 6L ultramarine, light blue and orange.

In a surprize appearance in 1964 hockey shared a stamp with the pentathlon on one of Albania's Olympic Games series. Whether hockey has ever been seriously precticed in Albania is not known and, as for the stamp itself - well, any publicity is said to be good publicity!
13. 1966 India (Scott 443) 5th Asian Games - Hockey Champions 15p blue.

It is indeed surprizing that India waited until 1966 before issueing a hockey stamp for, although she has lost ground of late, India is the acknowledged center of the hockey world. India's decline started with partition in 1947 but the strength of the game on the Indo-Pak subcontinent is borne out by the fact that any contest for the world hockey crown invariably devolves into a confrontation between India and Pakistan. The game was introduced to British India by the Imperial units at the turn of the century, with notable contributions from the Irish contingents, and by the midile twenties Indian players amazing aptitude for the game was already a byword in sporting circles. India entered the Olympic Games hockey competition at Amsterdam in 1928, swept all before her and repeated the performance in 1932, 1936, 1948, 1952 and 1956. At Melbourne in 1956 Pakistan challenged strongly, losine by the only goal of the match and in 1960 the roles were reversed.

In 1964 India again won by the only goal, a pentalty goal at that, but in 1968 the gold medal went to Pakistan, Australia claiming the silver medal and India had to be content with the bronze medal.

In the meantime . . . . .
In the meantime the Asian Games had been called into being and hockey was first introduced in the third games in Tokyo, 1958. India and Pakistan drew no score in the final and there was a near-riot when the latter were declared the winners on goal average, there having been no prior declaration that such a decision could be reached. The debacle of the fourth Games in Djakarta saw Pakistan again triumphant by $2-0$ acainst an Indian team reduced to 10 men in the first ten minutes but in 1966 in Bangkok India gained revenge over Fakistan by scoring the only goal of the final in extra time. This victory, following on the winning of the Olympic gold medal in Tokyo in 1964, led to the issue of this attractive blue stamp which is marred only by the unfortunate fuxtaposition of the sticks of the two players in the foreground and that bugbear of draughtsmen, the obviously oversize ball!

14. 1967 Mexico (Scott 983) Mexico'68 - Hockey $50 \not 0$ green and black.

A striking green stamp with black figures in silouette was but one aspect of the amazing publicity that heralded the Mexico City Olympic Games. When the stamp appeared in 1967 the Mexicans were hard at work whipping into shape a team to participate in the hockey competition and, under the guidance of former Indian Olympian Rex Norris, they came to perform creditably.
15. 1968 Monaco (Scott C74) XIX Olympiade Mexico 1968-Hockey 3.00F Air Mail green and indigo.

It is almost a pity that Monaco included hockey in its Mexico Olympic Games series for this is an extremely poor stamp. The muscle-bound athlete of aggressive countanance would doubtless have difficulty in controlling the bouncing ball on the sparsely and unevenly grassed field with his miserably undersized stick but he would have a better chance if he used both hands! And as for the goalkeeper in the backsround inviting all and sundry to place the ball between his pads! But of course no international umpire would have permitted the game to commence until the hopelessly disproportionate goals had been replaced.
16. 1968 Rwanda (Scott 254) Mexico'68 - Hockey l2F green, black, blue and plum. Part of a souvenir sheet containing 6 stamps.

Rwanda, like Monaco, is not renowned for any hockey-playing prowness but unlike the latter country, when removing hard cash from the poc-
kets of the sports philatelist it at least offers in return an acceptable portrayal of the game.
17. 1969 Pakistan (Scott 267) Hockey Champions - Mexico Olympics 196815 Paisa green, black, blue and gold.
18. 1969 Pakistan (Scott 268) Hockey Champions - Mexico Olympics 19681 Rupee green, black, pink and gold.

Pakistan's success in the 1968 Olympic Hockey tournament was clearcut and well deserved although they had grinding battles, in the semifinal against West Germany ( $W:-0$ ) and the final against Australia (W $2-1)$. It was the first time since Melbourne that the final was not a contest between India and Pakistan. That Pakistan should honor this victory by issueing two identical stamps--differing only in background color and denomination is not surprizing.

19. 1969 West Germany (Scott B447) Hockey - Munich 197220 pf +10 pf green.

With Munich the venue for the 1972 Olympic Games and West Germany the strongest and oldest established European hockey-playing nation the appearance in 1969 of an attractive symbolic hockey stamp in two shades of green and white was not unexpected.
20. 1970 Belgium European Cup - Brussels $19709 F+4 \mathrm{~F}$ green, brown, and red.

Brussels, venue of the first European Hockey Cup competition in Sept. 1970, long the headquarters of the Federation Internationale de Hockey is the home of M. Rene Frank the moving spirit in the world body as well as in his own country.

Hockey was introduced to Belgium in 1900 by Mr. Pitcairn Knowles and a group of Englishmen and at first the game was played under Dutch rules. The game is centered around Brussels, Antwerp and Ghent. Regular competition with their European neighbors Holland and Germany ensures a high standard of play and especially the men have an enviable international record.

21. 1970 Republic of Korea - 5lst National Athletic Meet. Oct. l, 1970. 10 Won yellow, green and blue.

It is not generally realized that hockey is played in Korea and the historical background of the game there is not clear. While matches against near neighbors Japan and Hong Kong are not infrequent, Korea participates regularly in Eastern tournaments and can boast extending the world's hockey giants, India, on two occasions in the Asian Games. In 1958 (Toyko) Korea lost l-2 and in 1966 (Bangkok) 0-1 to India, remarkable results in an otherwise not too distinguished international record.

22. 1971 New Zealand - Hockey Health Stamps.

New Zealand issued two hockey stamps on August 4,1971 in the values of $3+1 \varnothing$, girls blaying hockey and $4+1 \varnothing$ boys playing hockey. This was one of the yearly series of children's health stamps which usually depict sports.
23. 1971 Pakistan - Hockey Championships. 20 Paisa multicolored.

Pakistan issued on December 31, 1971 a single stamp to mark their winning the World Hockey Championships. The design incorporates the emblem of the Pakistan Hockey Federation and the wording "World Hockey Champions/(Barcelona)-1971)" in the left-hand portion of the stamp, and the World Hockey Cup in the remaining portion.
24. 1972 India - Hockey - 20th Olympic Games.

The 20 p stamp depicts a hockey player in action and the 1.45 p shows a stylizeत verison of a hockey player in the right-hand side.

## LET'S POOL OUR OLYMPIC AND SPORTS KNOWLEDGE

Edited by Edward B. Epstein
Sports and Olympic philatelists have, collectively, a great deal of knowledge which, when pooled, can be of mutual benefit. Questions concerning sports and 07ympic philately will be assigned a number and published in JSP. Responses to questions will be printed in subsequent issues. Address all questions and answers to your editor; Edward B. Epstein, Paterson Board of Education, 33 Church St., Paterson, NJ 07505. Please cite your source of information.

Q-1. Were funds collected from the emission of the Greek 1896 Olympic issued used for the 1896 Olympic Games:

A-1. The Official Report of the 1896 Greek Organizing Committee written by Timoleon Philemps, mentions the intent of the first Olympic stamp issue: "Although the committee had not the necessary funds in hand for the erection of two constructions, the rifle range and the cycle track, placed its expentations on the revenue that would be forthcomming from the sale of tickets of the seats of the games, the sale of commemorative medallions and the assurance through the passage of two laws that the sum of 40,000 drachmas would be available from the receipts of the commemorative (postage) stamps."

Q-2. Were any Olympic stamps issued for the 1940 Helsinki Games that were nostponed due to World War II?

A-2. Carl-olof Enhagen's book "sports Stamps" reports, "The Finns who,
at short notice, had made excellant preparations for the games at Helsinki in 1940, had not forgotten the philatelist. An Olympic stamp was printed but never issued. A photograph of the American Discus thrower and Olympic champion of 1936, Carpenter, inspired the 1940 stamp." It is assumed that the issue was destroyed.

Q-3. It is believed that the first Olympic Village was instituted for the 1932 Los Angeles Games. However, Ernest Trory's "Philatelic History of the Olympic Games" pictures a handstamp which reads "Columbes Village Olympique". Information wanted about this village handstamp of the 1924 Paris Games.

Q-4. The Italian June 23, 1959 issue pictures five values depicting Roman remains connected with the 1960 Olympic Games. The 35L value shows the Ruins of the Thermae of Caracalla (venue for the g.vmnastic events) the 60L pictures Constantine's Triumphal Arch (finish of the Marathon), and the lloL illustrates the Basilica Constantine (site of the wrestling events). What events were held in connection with the Obelisk of Quirnal \& Statue of the Horse Tamer (15L) and the Tower of the Senator's Palace (25L)?

Q-5. The Iranian Olympic issue of June 9, 1960 features the traditional sports of polo and archery. What is pictured in the background of these two stamps?

Q-6. I have a cover, unaddressed, franked with a common Brazilian stamp which has no sports connotations. Its stamped cachet (two imprints) reads: "Fifth (or Fifteenth or Fiftieth) Centenary of the C.B.D/8-17 June, 1964/Sao Paulo-S.P." It also displays a shield-like emblem and a soccer or basketball (in 1964 part of the world still used the old international basketball with sections and seams like the then-soccer ball). The question is, what does the "C.B.D." mean?

Ghana: Souvenir sheet released with regularly perforated set for the 1974 World Soccer Championships.

Uruguay: The first editorial "Black Blots" are assessed against Uruguay for the recent release of a miniature sheet, value of 1,000 pesos noting "Uruguay: Lands of Tourism". The sheet contains a perf stamp depicting a girl in a bikini, emblems of airlines and symbols of the World Soccer Championships. It is reported 50,000 sheets were printed and $90 \%$ sold to a European dealer.

From the October issue of the American Philatelist:

Antigua: The souvenir sheet repeated from the World Soccer Championships from Munich. Values of 5ф, 35申, 75申 and \$1 plus two labels.

Grenadines of Grenada: All stamps issued by the Grenada Fost Office bearing the designation "Grenadines of Grenada" draw automatic "Black Blots" as unnecessary issues.

Togo: A souvenir sheet of $50 f$ and $90 f$ values overprinted for West Germany's victory in the World Soccer Cup Championships in Munich.
