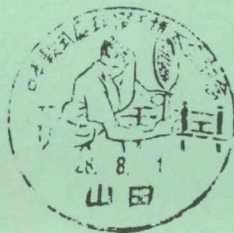

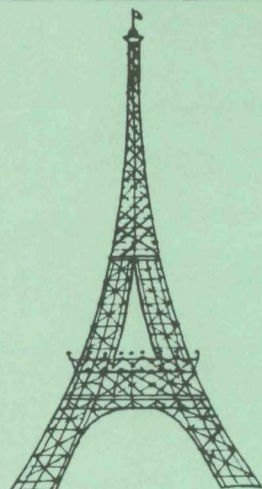

### BOOK REVIEW --- by Sherwin Podolsky

"OLYMPISCHE SPELEN MUNCHEN 1972 Postzegel Katalogus met Randgebieden" by Laurentz Jonker. Price US\$7.00 (includes postage). Obtainable from the author at Anjelierstraat 8, Zwolle, Netherlands. 145 pages, soft cover.

This profusely illustrated book illustrates all the postal issues including souvenir sheets for the Olympic Games at Munich 1972. Equal emphasis is given to the special cancellations. Quantities issued of many sets and covers are included. Illustrations appear large or actual size of the stamps. Cancellations and covers are equally sharp.

There is a complete list of the participating nations. An accounting of the distribution of Olympic medals and unofficial points is present-



ed for 47 nations. The postal history of the Olympic torch run is presented in complete detail showing the postmarks en route and some covers.

The numerous special postmarks for Germany for the Games and also pre-Olympic and auxiliary ones are well presented. Registered covers are touched on. A special feature is the chapter on Balloon and Olympic flight postmarks and covers.

The specialist will find this book an important visual guide. However, meters, booklets, registry labels and postal stationery are areas hardly explored. The many covers shown have interesting and informative cachets.

The language is Dutch but this is a minor handicap. The material is well presented, easy to follow and on high quality paper.
