Historical observances such as the Bicentennial celebration are designed to remind us of our heritage. The result, according to theories on the subject, should be a massive effort to preserve or recapture some of the best features of the past. Whether or not the Bicentennial will have the desired effect on American society remains to be seen, but there is evidence that it is working on at least one front.

When Federal agencies were asked several years ago to begin devising special programs for our 200th anniversary, the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports decided on an intensive campaign to increase adult participation in sport. Special advertising materials were developed, and cooperative projects involving sport governing bodies and private business were launched. The idea was that we would recapture some of our traditional energy and strength by engaging in vigorous physical exercise.

Americans obviously are responding to this idea. The number of joggers and cyclists one encounters, the fantastic growth of tennis, skiing and other sports, and the tremendous market for exercise attire and equipment of various kinds all indicate there is a genuine physical fitness revival in progress in this country.

Many of our newly-energetic citizens are wearing the Presidential Sports Award emblem, which is becoming recognized as the badge (there's also a pin and a certificate) of the participatory sports enthusiast. You don't have to be expert in your favorite sport to earn the Presidential Award, but you do have to participate approximately three times a week (requirements vary slightly for some sports) over a period of four months. In other words, you have to make a commitment to physical activity.

We think the Award is an excellent idea and hope the end of the Bicentennial year will find several million Americans wearing it. Anyone aged 15 years or older can get a free personal log book and qualifying standards for all 43 Award sports simply by writing to: Presidential Sports Award, P. O. Box 129, Radio City Station, New York, NY 10019. Upon fulfillment of the qualifying requirements and submission of a \$3.00 check or money order (this program doesn't use tax monies), you will receive your Presidential Sports Award.

Our enthusiasm for this program doesn't stem exclusively from our vested interest in sport. After 200 years, we think it's about time Americans realized that sport can make significant contributions to our physical and emotional health, and to our enjoyment and appreciation of life. What better birthday present could we give ourselves than a trim, fit citizenry filled with spirit of adventure which once was so closely identified with this country?

WHY MARCH IN STEP?

The following Guest Editorial is reprinted from Western Stamp Collector.

Is competitive exhibiting strangling topical collecting with its rules?

Does not the regimentation which is required to easily judge one topical exhibit against another tend towards an undesirable conformity, and is this not defeating the very purpose of this branch of philately?

We are inclined to think it is. One of the most important aspects of topical collecting is the expression of individuality it permits the collector; here he has complete freedom, and he can develop his chosen theme in any way he deems fit.

The only criterion for judging a topical exhibit should be how well the exhibitor has done what he set out to do, and the only requirement should be that he tell the judges, by means of an introductory page, just what that was.

Once he has done this he should be completely free, and the standards of traditional philately must be left behind. Here the emphasis should be on an imaginative expression of ideas through the medium of the postage stamp.

It may be held that this permissive attitude will lead to presentations considered undesirable, such as the inclusion of a reasonable amount of related material, or horror upon horror, related artwork!

And why not? Why should this form of collecting be forced into a steroty ped formula when it comes to be exhibited?

There is one excellent reason why it should not. It is a form of collecting which probably attracts more new blood into our hobby than any other; new blood which, as a result of this initial exposure, often develops other philatelic interests.

This introduction often takes place at stamp shows, where non-collector interest is almost exclusively directed at the topical exhibits.

One of the most pointless and foolish rulings we have encountered is that which states that a topical exhibit MUST consist of the stamps of more than one country or else it will be thrown into the single country section and judged against traditional presentations.

The asininity of this contention is made obvious by the fact that the format rather than the content determines whether a display is a topical collection or not. The use of a country's stamps to tell its history by means of the subjects depicted on those stamps can be classed as nothing other than a topical collection.

Introduce conformity and attempt to enforce rules such as this and fun is left in topical exhibiting? Much of the delight and entertainment derived by non-collecting visitors to stamp shows will vanish along with potential recruits to the hobby—recruits which are badly needed if it is to continue to grow and prosper.





SPI readers who can manage with relatively simple German may find the almost monthly catalog of Otto Volk indispensable for collecting Olympic Games, World Soccer Championships and Spot topicals. The Catalogs are rich not only in the basic sets but also postal history, picture postcards, and vignettes. The catalog also serves as a basis for trading among many collectors because it is so comprehensive. Although no illustrations are provided, the descriptions are usually ample. The listings arranged by Olympiad are strongest in Games held in Germany 1936 and Munich 1972. Listings change from month to month and not every Olympiad is listed every month. The current edition for September, 1976 has 59 pages of material listed and priced through the Canada 1976 Olympics. Although there is no price indicated for the catalog, it is suggested that sending a one dollar bill should bring you a copy by air mail. There is always some rare material offered but apparently no certificates of genuineness accompany. Readers should exercise appropriate caution. THE CLYMFIC GAMES IN THE VIEWPOINT OF PHILATELY AND ITS HELATED AREAS

Copyrighted 1976. 180 pages, printed on one side, 5 7/8 x 8½ inches, two-hole punched, in vinyl binder with rectangle rings. Profusely illustrated. Price DM 37.50 plus overseas/USA airmail postage DM 11.00. (About US\$20.37 at exchange rate of 420 per Deutschemark).

Announced last vear in JSF, this book was finally published in September, 1076 and what a fantastic book it is! It is THE definitive reference on Clympic material from 1804 through 1944. It is impossible to convey here the true depth and breadth of coverage. Instead of a Table of Contents, there is a well organized classification scheme in outline form. This classification has been applied to material for each Clympiat. It is thus possible to use Volk's numbers as catalog numbers for the most minute variety.

of varieties, there are plenty -- such as original designs, essays,

proofs, perforation, watermarks, paper, gum, revenues, postal stationery, postcards, postmarks and meters, and much more. There is information on quantities issued, sheet details, plate numbers, forgeries and their characteristics, cachets (including rubberstamps), Olympic committee stationery and covers. There is a vast amount of material illustrated, much never shown before. Forgeries mentioned include the stamps, overprints and special postmarks.

The strength of Volk's work is in the European material. Only 10 pages are devoted to the 1932 Olympics in the USA. SPI's handbook on the 1932 Olympics has over 200 pages. Thus the two books would be complementary.

There are no valuations but comments on scarcity or rarity are given in occasional narrative explanations. Language should be a minimal problem if one has a Michel catalog which has German-English translations of key philatelic works.

What are some of the surprises (to me, at least) in this book? They include: 1896 2 drachma on postal card proofs; three colors of the 1896 Olympic Committee cachet; the souvenir postcard for 1904 St. Louis 3 varieties of each of the three 1906 special cancels; illustrations of many postcards and vignettes never seen before; cover of First Olympic Winter Games, Chamonix 1924 with special cancel; watermark and perforation varieties of the 1925 Czech Olympic Congress stamps; varieties of cacheted postal cards for the 1928 Amsterdam Games; details on the 1936 Teppelin Olympic flight; the variety of rubberstamp cachets for 1936 Berlin Games; unissued designs for 1940 Germany Winter Games; 1940 Clympic Committee covers; unissued designs for the 1940 Finland Games; varieties of the Finland 1940 slogan cancel.

The shortcomings of this book are minimal. The 1940 Haiti de Coubertin semi-postals are omitted. For some reason, the author abandoned his classification scheme for the 1944 Polish Concentration Camp Olympic material, relying instead on considerable narration and profuse illustrations. There is no mention that the 1906 special cancellation devices are in private hands and have been applied to unused commemorative picture postcards left over from that time. Thus the postmarks and the cards are genuine but the articles were created only recently. This book should be in the library of every Olympic and sports collector.

Bob Paul, Jr., Press Officer for the US Olympic Committee reports that it would be almost impossible to determine $\underline{\rm THE}$

YOUNGEST OLYMPIC COMFETITOR. "The problem" according to Mr.

- "is that usually the only Clympic competitors that are publicized are the winners. Imagine how many competitors never make it to the finals but are eliminated in the quater and sirifinal heats. One would have to canvas each national Olympic Committee, and even then it is doubtful if an accurate age accounting is possible." The self-publicized "Youngest Olympic Competitor" is Cecilia Colledge (written in her own hand under her signature on a 1932 Lake Placid F.D.C.) Thanks to Mrs. J. Halsey Gulick, the following information about Miss Colledge appeared in the New York Times (January 14, 1932 edition, pg. 27, column 4)... "The English delegation (to the Lake Flacid Games) was a small one, both in point of numbers and in size. Two ll-vear-old girls, the petite Miss Megan Taylor, the British figure-skating champion, and her runner-up, the equally petite Miss Cecilia Colledge, arrived." The New York Times story went on to report that "Miss Taylor started skating when she was 5 years old Miss Colledge began her career a year later. They are the youngest contestants in the Olympics." Benjamin T. Wright, Museum Committee for the US Figure Skating Association reports, "It is true that Cecilia Colledge was the voungest competitor in the Olympic Winter Games, being in 1932 eleven years and two months of age. It is also probable that she still remains the youngest, since International Skating
 - and went on to be the silver medallist in 1936. She also was World Champion in 1937, as well as three times European Champion and eight times British Champion. Since 1952 she has been a successful teacher of figure skating in Boston." Editor's Note: The above explanation accounts for the sport of figure skating. But it does not, however, account for the other six sports of the Olympic Winter Games, or the twenty-one sports of the Olympic Summer Games.

Union rules have for some vears prohibited participation below the age of 12. The closest likely competitor to Miss Colledge in age is believed to be Beatrice Hustiu of Romania, 29th in the ladies figure skating event in 1968, who is described in the press reports as being eleven, but her exact age in years, months, and days at the time of competition is not known to the writer. Cecilia Colledge was 8th in the ladies figure skating in 1932

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


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A Polish Set That Did Not Please Everybody

During the opening months of each year, the winter sports season begins in earnest. The enthusiasts who can afford it desend on St. Moritz and other Alpine centers to pursue their energetic pastime in the bracing wintry sunshine. For the majority, such luxuries are beyond their means and the daily trek to and from work remains their main exercise. However, those who are collectors can still savour the delights of winter sports in stamp albums, for many countries have issued stamps devoted to this theme.

In such a collection, a pre-war Polish set is certain of inclusion. The four stamps (Scott 335—338) that make up the set were issued in February 1939 to commemorate the World Ski-ing Championships. Each stamp bore the same design featuring a local skier outlined against a background of the Tatra Mountains.

These mountains which are the highest in Europe east of the Alps are a favorite winter sporting center in Poland. The higher peaks are snow-capped all year round and at high altitudes, large lakes add to the scenic charm. One of the most famous lakes in the region, the Morskie Oko, was featured on one value of the 1938 Polish pictorial series (Scott 295), and later in the 1953 Tourist set (Scott 609).

The World Ski-ing Championships were held at the village of Zakopane. This center became a pre-war winter holiday attraction, catering for 200,000 tourists each season. Nearby, one of the largest cable railways in Europe carried vistors to the summit of Mt. Kasprowy Wierch, which was pictured on the 1957 airmail stamp (Scott C49).

The 1939 Championships were the cause of considerable postal activity in the Zakopane area. The authorities opened fourteen temporary post offices to handle the extra mail. In addition,50 exta pillar boxes were erected around the Championship site, and six special mobile post offices were provided to serve the spectators.

These six mobile post offices were made from converted buses and were specially designed. The interior had space for two telephone kioks as well as for the counter clerks. Shutters over the windows folded back to make seats for those customers waiting to be served. In spite of these modifications, each bus could still travel at 70 mph, if required.

From a philatelic point of view, the stamps were the chief interest. One million copies of each value were issued, recess printed on smooth, white wove paper without watermark. The mountaineer pictured in the design can be seen wearing the richly hand-embroidered costume for which this region of Poland is noted.

The stamps were placed on general sale throughout the country on February 6th, 1939, five days before the actual Championships began. When the event started, however, a special commemorative cancellation was applied at the Zakopane main office, and this



continued throughout the Championships which lasted nine days.

This postmark showed the Championship emblem of a pair of skis and a "shield inscribed with the letters F. I. S.," together with the Polish flag in the form of a ribbon. The letters "F. I. S." in the emblem, which also appears at the lower left-hand corner of the stamp, are the abbreviation for "Federation Internationale de Ski," the governing body who organized the World Championships each year.

A small number of souvenir sheets were also produced in connection with the event. At the head of these sheets and enlarged illustration of the 25 groszy stamp was printed against a backgroung of the letters "F. I. S." Below this design, the four stamps in the set were affixed, and each cancelled with the special Zakopane postmark dated on the first day of the championship.

The most interesting feature of this set of stamps was the reaction of a small minority of Polish philatelists, who published a series of attacks on it through the columns of the leading stamp journals in the country. One correspondent wrote to express the views of a group of dissatisfied collectors by saying "... we hesitate to believe that there is a shortage of artists capable of recognizing the bonds between sketching and philately. It is time to break the tradition that Poland must be out-distanced by other nations. Prompt action without prolonged meditation should be undertaken to assure the adoption of reforms which will place the Postal Department at least on a par with other nations."

Another journal ran an editorial saying "...the F. I. S. stamps are inappropriate for any propaganda scheme. This issue is not in keeping with the trend of times." This editorial concluded with an attack on the designer of the stamps, W. Bor atynski, who had been the artist who designed the four previous Polish issues. This rebuke said of the stamps, "... coming steadily from the hands of the same artist, what more is to be expected."

Naturally, these criticisms did not pass unheeded, and many Polish collectors announced their complete satisfaction with the design and their confidence in the artist. The editor of one newspaper summed up their views by writing "...the criticisms are unwarranted, as we all know that Boratynski is one of our leading artists, famous for his unlimited talent, and his past creations attest to his artistic qualifications."

It is obvious that Boratynski's opponents were not listened to by the postal authorities, since in August 1939 they used another of his designs when they issued the single value to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the Polish Legion. This latter stamp, of course, was the last produced by Poland before World War II began.

(Editor's note: The Seebacher Handbook states that there were 500,000 sets printed. The engraver was M. Dutczynski for this set. The stamps were printed on unwatermarked paper and perforated 12%.)
