

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-OLYMPIC NOTES-

One of the things I will try to do in this column is to report possible sources of material that may be of interest to readers.

Jay Smith & Associates, P.O. Box 9630, Madison, Wisconsin 52715 publishes a magnificent Scandinavia price list which includes some elusive Olympic and sport labels, covers and cancels, as well as the basic stamps in mint and used condition. Some rather difficult material is listed, too.

The contract for the philatelic paper of the Cook Islands is held by Kenny International Corporation of New York. According to Stamp News (Australia), editor Bill Hornadge reports that the current contract has a clause allowing the agency to obtain cancelled-to-order stamps for the cost of printing. He speculates that this could lead to discount selling of CTO stamps which could drastically depreciate the value and reputation of the stamps of the Cook Islands. Cook Islands has issued a fair number of sport and Olympic stamps. Readers might want to exercise caution in view of this information.

At hand is the part 5 of the David Feldman, S. A. auction catalog containing 621 lots of the finest Olympic material ever, surpassing in breadth and depth much of the material in the Ernest Trory auction several years ago. The auction is scheduled in Zurich, Switzerland at 2 p.m., November 8, 1980. The superior catalog has a full color page of great Olympic rarities with the most comprehensive group of proofs and essays ever offered at one time. There is also a profusion of cancellations, covers, vignettes, registered covers, etc.. Some of the highlights include no less than three 1896 color proofs plus two Sperati proof forgeries. Interested readers should write to David Feldman, S. A., Case Postale 81, 1213 Onex, Geneva, Switzerland and try to obtain a copy of the catalog with prices realized. It is bound to be a standard reference for Olympic specialists for years to come. I will report highlights of prices realized when available.

Many collectors are already busy actively collecting cachets of FDCs of the US 1980 Olympic postal paper, including postal stationery. Some are limiting their scope to the Winter Olympics only. SPI has offered a limited, interesting range of cachets for FDC's and other Olympic event covers over the past few years. A considerable portion of the production has been sold to European collectors. John La Porta also made some interesting cachet varieties under his own label, JLP Cachets. I have made cachets featuring past Winter Olympic special cancellations and also cachets uniquely made out of photographs featuring rejected stamp designs of 1932 Olympic stamps.

Nevertheless, the main source for a wide range of cacheted FDCs is through the American First Day Cover Society. Through its magazine, FIRST DAYS, many small cachetmakers advertise their limited, often very attractive and most unusual output. For them, like it is for SPI, the work is largely an effort of creative love with little, often no profits. Readers interested in learning more about AFDCS can send me a self-addressed, stamped envelope for an informative membership application.

Rampacher's catalog of Olympic Vignettes was originally published as a series in a magazine in the 1950s. The series was put together into a paper booklet published approximately 1960. However,

there was a magazine supplement on pseudo-Olympic labels that did not appear in the booklet. These labels publicize local, national or regional Olympics which were actually a usurpation of the Olympic name. Here are two listings from the Rampacher supplement:

- a. Shadows of riders with lances, sun in background, green lawn below with text in white: FAR EASTERN OLYMPIC/GAMES OSAKA JAPAN 1923. Size 46 x 67 mm. multicolored. Valued as rare. Imperforated.
- b. OLIMPIADA/POPULAR/ on a flag held by three men, heraldic arms below. At bottom left: Barcelona/ JULIOL 1936. At right side: 10/CTS/, above left: LY Signum. Rectangle shape, 54 x 37 mm. Perforated. Multicolored. Valued as rare.

Who has these labels available for illustration and can tell us the history about them?

Has anyone ever attempted to make a study of the various proofs of the 1906 Olympic issue of Greece? Here is my tentative classification of these interesting, often puzzling, and now, unfortunately, very expensive items.

- I. Proofs on thick carton paper found imperforated and in a very large range of colors, shades and hues. Incomplete or poor impressions exist. The low value also exists bi-colored with blurred impression. Paper often has same hue as printing.
- II. Same as Type I, perforated 14 x 14.
- III. Imperforated on carton paper. There is a thin line or stroke outward from the edge of the design. On the small designs, the line is perpendicular from the right center. On the large designs, the line is perpendicular from the top center. The line is often faint or appears as a dot or dash. Printed in issued colors.

Type II also exists in a special board with the label of J. P. Segg & Co., London W., England at bottom. About 20 of these presentation board are reportedly known or were made.

- IV. Proofs printed in blocks of six of the large designs or blocks of nine of the large designs on stiff caron paper with margins. Plate numbers printed on sheetlet margins. Plate numbers reported include H 2007 to H 2014. Presumably printed in issued colors.
- V. Proofs on normal paper with watermark. Imperforated. Watermark appears to be a small coat of arms. A block examined, however, shows that the watermark does not always cover every stamp. Colors differ from issued stamps.

VI. Same as Type V, perforated $13\frac{1}{2} \times 13\frac{1}{2}$.

VII. Black proof of single value in sheetlet with large margins.

It is assumed that all values exist in every type. However, I have only seen all values in Types I and III. I am not certain that Types I and/or II exist in issued colors.

It has been alleged that Types I and/or II are actually printers waste or printers samples manufactured after the issuance of the stamps. All proof types are ungummed.



FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY (West Germany)

The Federal Republic of Germany was formed on September 20, 1949, and is bordered on the north by the North Sea and Denmark; east by the Baltic Sea, East Germany, and Czechoslovakia; south by Austria and Switzerland; and west by France, Luxembourg, Belgium, and the Netherlands. Berlin, the former capital of Germany and located in East Germany, is divided into West and East Berlin as is the entire country. This 95,973 square mile country has lowlands in the north, a valley along the Rhine River, forests in the east and west, and mountains in the central and southern areas. The capital is Bonn.

Structure

Immediately after World War II, sport dimished in participation and popularity due to the overemphasis of sport by the National Socialists. However, physical education programs have gradually returned and are the responsibility of the states under the Ministers of Culture and Education. The aim of physical education is to "educate the whole person as an individual through the physical." The primary school program consists of gymnastics, games, swimming, running, jumping, and throwing activities while in the intermediate school team games are included. In addition, the girls have folk dancing.

While funds are given by the state government as well as by the Federal Government to promote sport and cities provide the facilities, the citizens have the responsibility to interest and teach the people sports activities. "In German life of today sports stand in the center as the biggest sociological movement after church and politics." A sports for everyone philosophy exists in West Germany; and while no central orders or decrees are given, the Deutscher Sportbunde (German Sports Federation), formed in 1950, is the unifying organization for all aspects of sports including international competition in cooperation with the National Olympic Committee.

Sports are organized by sports clubs—over 35,000 in number. Each of the 40 sports have a Federal Sport Association which is responsible for its own sport and organizes the contests between the states to determine the champion of West Germany. With the exception of rowing, hockey, and sailing each Federal Association is divided into thirteen State Sport Associations which handle contests and clinics, as well as courses for the less skilled within the states. In addition, the State Associations represent the sports clubs before the state governments as well as develop sports facilities.

After reaching ten years of age, both girls and boys compete in sports tournaments and meets with other schools. The Federal Youth Games are held twice a year—summer and winter—for youths between the ages of ten and twenty. These youths represent schools, sports organizations, and youth unions; and they enter single and team contests as well as song, game, and dance activities. Summer activities consist of swimming, running, jumping, and throwing events while winter activities include apparatus and tumbling events. Each contestant receives a certificate of achievement if 40 points are achieved in their age category. A special certificate and recognition by the President of West Germany is given if 70 points are achieved; the highest achievement possible. Dr. Carl Diem devised this point system and standards for each age category. On stamps have been issued for these organizations.

Special Events

Olympic Games

An Olympic Youth Camp is held every four years for the most talented boys and girls selected by the committee of the camp on the bases of art talents, athletic ability, and scientific research papers. These young people attend the Olympic Games, and upon return speak about their experiences in hopes of developing sportsmanship in all young people. In 1960, the German Olympic Society developed "The Golden Plan" which provided for the creation of playgrounds and sports centers during a fifteen year period.

In 1956, the first Olympic stamp (Fig. 200) was issued under the new government and depicts the Olympic rings. While Pierre de Coubertin first displayed the interlocking rings on an Olympic flag in 1910, the International Olympic Committee did not designate an official interlocking pattern until 1958. 10 In these 1956 Olympics, West Germany won 26 medals: six gold, thirteen silver, and seven bronze.

To commemorate the Rome Olympic Games in 1960, four stamps depicting sports scenes from Greek urns were issued and includes: wrestlers (Fig. 201), sprinters (Fig. 202), discus and javelin throwers (Fig. 203), and a four-horse chariot race (Fig. 204). In the 1960 Olympiad, Germany (East and West) received 42 medals: twelve gold, twenty silver, and ten bronze.

To publicize the Mexico City Olympics in 1968, one stamp (Fig. 205) portrays Pierre de Coubertin, the organizer of the modern Olympic Games. Baron de Coubertin had attended his last Olympic Games in Berlin, the year prior to his death. In addition, four semi-postal stamps were issued and the surtax went to the Foundation for the Promotion of the

1972 Olympic Games. The first stamp (Fig. 206) portrays Karl-Friedrich Freiherr von Langen, equestrian, who was a 1928 gold medal winner for both the team and individual dressage events. Rudolf Harbig, runner, (Fig. 207) received the 1936 bronze medal for the 4 x 400 meter relay event; and Helene Mayer, fencer, (Fig. 208) received the 1928 gold and 1936 silver medals for the women's individual foil event.

The other stamp (Fig. 209) portrays Carl Diem as a sports organizer. Diem (1882-1962) assumed this leadership role in 1906 when he joined the German Olympic Committee. He worked to achieve peace between the Turners and other sports minded persons, and he headed a German commission which traveled to the United States in 1913 to obtain new ideas for gymnastic programs. In 1913, Diem also originated the German Sport Badge, modeled after Sweden, to promote sports. He organized the 1936 Olympic Games, and began the Youth Camp program. Diem was associated with teacher education between 1920 and World War II, and helped to reopen the Sporthochschule in Cologne in 1947. After 1936, he began excavations at Olympia, Greece, which were completed in 1961. Diem published a well-known book, World History of Sport and Physical Education in 1960. Diem's wife, Idselott, has continued his great work; and has contributed much in her own name.

The semi-postal stamps for the Olympics issued in 1970 depicts scenes in Munich: Residence (Palace) (Fig. 210), Propylaen (Fig. 211), Glyptothek (Fig. 212), and Bavaria Statue and Colonnade (Fig. 213). In 1972, a souvenir sheet (Fig. 214) portrays the Games site with each of the four stamps within the sheet illustrating a building: gymnastics stadium, soccer football stadium, tent and lake, and the television tower. The Olympic Park cost \$750,000,000, and 121 countries were represented by 12,000 athletes. A second souvenir sheet (Fig. 215) was issued which depicts the sports events of long jump, basketball, discus, and canceing. Other stamps issued for these Games illustrate various sports events and will be mentioned later.

Three stamps (Fig. 216), only used in Berlin, illustrates the identical design of the Olympic symbols and publicizes a Pre-Olympic Festival Day on June 20, 1952 prior to the Helsinki Games in July. Thus, all summer Games received philatelic notice since West Germany was founded. A stamp (Fig. 217) for Berlin use was issued in 1952 and depicts the Olympic Stadium in Berlin.

Turnfest

The members of the Turnvereine "believed in mass demonstration of body exercises, of group and section gymnastics as a display of faith in the community and the country." 12 The first Turnfest or Turner festival was held in 1860 at Coburg, Saxony. In 1868, the delegates from the Turner Societies organized the German Gymnastic Association. These societies maintained programs for all ages and were family clubs. Three Turnfest stamps were issued. To commemorate the 150 years of the German Turnversines and the 1958 festival, one stamp (Fig. 218) portrays the Turner emblem and cak leaf. In 1968, the Berlin stamp (Fig. 219)

was issued depicting the Turner emblem to publicize the German festival held in Berlin, May 28-June 3, 1968. The other stamp (Fig. 220) publicized the festival held in Stuttgart, June 12-17, 1973, by portraying a festival poster.

Stoke-Mandeville Games

The Stoke-Mandeville Games (the Olympics of the paralyzed) was founded in 1948 "to encourage men and women with spinal cord lesions from injury or disease to train for and participate in as wide a range of sports as possible."13 These international Games have been held annually since 1952, and one stamp (Fig. 221), depicting an archer in a wheelchair, was issued for the Twenty-first Games held at Heidelberg, August 1-10, 1972, in the same country as the Olympics Games—a practice followed during the years of the Olympics. Forty-five countries were represented by 1,000 paralyzed athletes. Contests are held from wheel-chairs. Equipment and dress are standard, but certain adaptations in rules are made to provide for the wheelchairs. Events include: archery basketball, bench press weight lifting (men), bowls, dartchery (combined darts and archery), fencing, pentathlon, snooker (men), swimming (all starts made from in the water, table tennis, and track and field. 14

Activities

Dance

Folk dances in northern Germany are more formal and space consuming than in southern Germany, where waltzing is popular. ¹⁵ Other favorite dances include the polka and schottische. Two stamps note dance: the first (Fig. 222), a Berlin stamp, honors the Twentieth Berlin Festival Weeks in 1970 by portraying the symbols of dance, theater, and art; and the other stamp (Fig. 223) depicts carnival dancers for the Cologne Carnival Sesquicentennial.

Aquatics

The first aquatic stamp (Fig. 224) was a Berlin issue depicting a child at the seashore, and the surtax was used to finance vacations for Berlin children. The remaining stamps were issued to raise money for 1972 Munich Olympics. One stamp (Fig. 225) depicts a swimmer, two portrays sailing (One (Fig. 226) in 1969 and the other (Fig. 227) in 1972, and canoeing is illustrated on one of the stamps of a 1972 souvenir sheet (Fig. 215).

Individual Activities

In 1969, a semi-postal stamp (Fig. 228) noted archery. This was the first time archery was on the Olympic program since 1920; however, no medals were received. A gymnast (Fig. 229) was depicted in 1972; but no medals were won in gymnastics. Another stamp (Fig. 230) in that set portrays a wrestling scene, and a bronze medal was received for the welterweight class while a silver medal was earned in the Greco-Roman bantamweight class.

An illustration of a track appears on a 1969 semi-postal (Fig. 231) publicizing the Games while a woman long jumper and a woman discus thrower were shown on the 1972 souvenir sheet (Fig. 232). Heidemarie Rosendahl received a gold medal for the long jump and a silver in the pentathlon, but no medals were won for the discus event. In track, the men won a gold and a bronze medal while the women received two gold, one silver, and one bronze. On a 1974 Berlin issue (Fig. 233) a boy athlete is depicted at the starting mark, and the surtax from this stamp benefited the young people of Berlin.

Judo is portrayed on the only stamp (Fig. 234) commemorating the Tokyo Olympics in 1964. This was the first appearance of judo on the Olympic program. A silver medal was awarded for the middleweight class while a bronze was received for the open class—no weight limitations.

Richard Schirrmann founded the youth hostel movement in Germany in the early 1900's. Wilhelm Munker and Julius Schult assisted in the development of the organization. 16 Youth shelters have been developed in barns, castles, monasteries, club houses, and country homes. A small fee is charged for supervision and maintenance expenses. Two stamps were issued in 1952 with the surtax aiding the youth program in West Germany. One stamp (Fig. 235) portrays boy hikers and a youth hostel while the other (Fig. 236) illustrates girl hikers and a youth hostel in the background. In 1974, a stamp (Fig. 237) noted Walkers Day, depicting landscape and a footpath. In addition to hosteling and walking, mountain climbing also is popular in West Germany. To honor several voluntary service groups, one stamp (Fig. 238) portrays a mountain climber rescuer bringing down a casualty.


In 1972 two sets of stamps, one (Figs. 239-242) issued by the German Federal Republic and the other (Figs. 243-246) issued for use in Berlin only, noted the nineteenth century chess pieces may by Fayence Works in Gien, France, and housed in the Hamburg Museum. The surtax for both sets aided the Independent Welfare Organizations, and both issued the same pieces—knight, rook, queen, and king—but in different colors and designs. In addition, the Berlin issues include the word Berlin. Robert Huebner, 23, of West Germany received individual top honors in the 1972 Chess Olympics held in Skoplje, Yugoslavia.

Winter Activities

West Germany is one of the two most prominent bobsled countries in Europe, the other being Switzerland. The Oberstdorf Jump in the Allgau Alps region is one of the biggest in the world making ski flying a

popular activity. 17 In 1949, Wurttenberg, a state in southern Germany issued two stamps commemorating the German Ski Championships at Isny im Allgau. One stamp (Fig. 247) shows a view of Isny while the other (Fig. 248) portrays a skier and a village. In 1971, four winter sport stamps and a souvenir sheet (Fig. 249) were issued for the Sappore Olympic Games, and the designs include: ski jumper, figure skater, downhill skier, and ice hockey. No medals were won in these events.

Team Activities

Two team sports, field hockey and basketball, are included on a semi-postal stamp and a souvenir sheet for the Munich Olympics. In 1969, a field hockey stamp (Fig. 250) was issued. West Germany is considered the oldest and strongest established European nation playing field hockey. They won over Pakistan, 1-0, after beating the Netherlands, 3-0; and this ended the Pakistan-India reign during the post World War II period. Pakistan was banned from competition for life after their display of poor sportsmanship following this game. The only goal had been scored in the sixty-first minute of the final game.

Basketball is depicted on one stamp in the 1972 souvenir sheet (Fig. 215). Since West Germany placed fifth in the preliminary round of Group B, the team did not go into the final competitions.

In 1974, two stamps (Figs. 251,252) were issued for the World Football Championship held at the Olympic Stadium in Munich. West Germany beat Holland, 2-1, to be the first Deutschland champion in twenty years. This Championship marked the third appearance by West Germany and the first for Holland. Present for the match was United States Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, West German President Walter Scheel, Chancellor Helmut Schmidt, Prince Bernhardt of the Netherlands, and Prince Ranior and Princess Grace of Monaco. 19

Summary

The first stamp for the Federal Republic of Germany was issued in 1949 while the first sport-related stamp also was issued in 1949 in Wurttenberg for local use only. In 1952, a stamp publicizing the Pre-Olympic Festival Day was printed for use in the Berlin area, and the Federal Republic also issued a stamp portraying hostelers in the same year.

Sport-related stamps constitute 5 per cent of the total stamp issuance in West Germany through 1974, and approximately half of these were printed to raise funds for the 1972 Olympic Games. All summer Olympics and the 1972 winter Games were noted during this period of the Federal Republic.

Similar to Pre-World War II Germany, most of the activities depicted are individualistic in nature; however, the World Football championships are also noted philatelically. The various Turnfests have been commemorated as well as the 1972 Stoke-Madeville Games.

A majority of the stamps are semi-postal in the Federal Republic. In addition to raising funds for the Olympic Games, children's and welfare programs have been aided by stamp issuances which portray sports activities and settings.

NOTE: Sports stamps published since this study was made in 1975 will be discussed later.

LETS POOL OUR OLYMPIC AND SPORTS KNOWLEDGE

A - 69 Again, we turn to Richard Mandell for information about Friedrich Ludwig Jahn who's picture appears on the DDR issue (Scott 110). In his book, "The First Modern Olympics" he dates the German educator's life from 1778 to 1852 and credits "turning" as conceived by C.F.Guts Muths in the 1700's to become a movement under Jahn's leadership. He also credits the words "Turnplatze" (playground) and "Turntage" (festivals) to be of Jahn's authorship. The movement, which had as its aim physical fitness, also became a means of organized resentment against Napoleon's occupation of Germany and percipitated sentiment to bring about German national unity.

Mandell's book "The Nazi Olympics" describes Jahn's mass gymnastic exercises being performed at convent ions, usually during patriotic holidays, where teams; numbering in the thousands formed disciplined rows and performed to music extremely strenus movements in unison.

A - 70 The only known handstamp to cancel mail from the 1936 Grunau Rowing venue for the XI Olympiad was the usual "Bell"cancel which reads "Berlin-Grunau Regattabahn/ XI Olympiade 1936."

However, your editor has in his collection another one of the interesting private cacheted handstamps that was applied, in violet, to a card with the handstamp mentioned above. It is circular in character with a swastika super-imposed over the eagle symbol of the Wimar Republic. The following text appears around the upper portion of the circle: "Jungruderer=Olympia=Zel lager 1936", which,translated means, "Young Rowers Olympic Tent Camp=1936=Grunau." To balance the upper text, at the bottom of this scarce handstamp, are the names, "Berlin-Grunau." However, this handstamp was not intended to cancel mail posted from the rowing course but rather to publicize the sport club's encampment at the games.

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
