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# IOOR 716 FDC

#### GLENN ESTUS

According to SPI's book "Postal History and Vignettes of the 1932 Olympic Games," Dr. Harry Ioor produced one basic cachet for the III Olympic Winter Games stamp (Scott 716) issued January 25, 1932. This cachet is catalogued as J4 with two sub-varieties--J4a and J4b.

During the recent XIII Olympic Winter Games, the author had the opportunity of assembling an almost complete collection of over 100 different cachets on this issue for the National Fine Arts Committee, the cultural arm of the Lake Placid Olympic Organizing Committee. Material from several top collections was exhibited.

Figures 1 through 3 show an unusual progression in the printing of the Ice Hockey/Skier cachet. It would seem that figure 1 was first printed. All the necessary information is present. The problem is the misspelling "FebUrary". In figure 2, the misspelled word is completely removed and a blank space is present. Figure 3 (perhaps a special event cover rather than a first day cover) shows the addition of two lines of dates and the deletion of the last three lines shown in figures 1 and 2.

In addition to the listing in SPI's book, this cachet is listed in Photo Cachet Catalog--Harry Ioor by Dr. Douglas Parks and in Planty's Photo Encyclopedia of Cacheted FDC's by Prof. Earl Planty and Michael Mellone.

Both SPI and Planty illustrate the cover shown in figure 2 while Parks shows the cover in figure 1.



SPI lists the colors of the cachet as black and light blue (J4) and blui sh green (J4b). Planty lists the colors as blue and black and in Parks there are two listings of color (see below).

SPI lists 2 sub-varietes:

J4a--'same (as J4), with "Via Airmail" below the stamps and "special flight" around border alternating in blue and red and separated by small airplanes."

J4b-'Bluish--green, on cover with red and blue barber pole (airmail) stripes along 4 sides'.

Planty list 1 sub-variety:

716-15A--same as SPI's J4a.

Parks lists 3 varieties:

716-ORla--cachet in black and light blue.

716-OR1b--cachet in black and greenish blue.

716-OR1c--same as SPI's J4a without "Via Airmail".

Finally, according to a member of the American First Day Cover Society, there also exists first day covers with only the skier from the Ioor design printed.

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

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#### OLYMPIC AUCTION RESULTS

621 lots of Olympic material were auctioned off at the David Feldman international stamp auction held at Hotel Nova Park, Zurich, Switzerland on November 8, 1980. The magnitude of this auction far overshadows the 163 lots in the Ernest Trory Olympic Games auction held at Basel in October 1973 by Bobson Lowe.

Serious Olympic collectors are urged to obtain their own copies of this auction from David Feldman, S. A., Case Postale 81, 1213 Onex,

Geneva, Switzerland. The price is 15 Swiss francs.

At the time of this auction, the Swiss franc was worth about 61¢ (US). At this writing in early January, 1981, the Swiss franc is down to about 56¢ (US). Because of the wild fluctuation, I have left the prices realized in Swiss francs. However, the buyer's commission of  $12\frac{1}{2}\%$  has not been added. The effective rate at the time of the auction in November, including the  $12\frac{1}{2}\%$  buyers commission would, however, be about 69¢ (US) per Swiss franc.

The Olympic lot with the top realization was a large cover with complete 1896 Greek Olympic set tied by "Pleine Mer" boxed ship cancellations with no date. The cover is described as probably mailed in 1899, very rare showpiece and exhibition item. It realized

13,000 sfr.

A close second in realizations was a registered cover with the France 1924 50¢ Olympic stamp imperforated and tied by Epinal/Vosges 4.7.24 circular date cancel. It fetched 12,000 sfr.

Realizing 8,000 sfr. was a set of the 1920 Belgium Olympic

issue in black die proofs in very fine condition.

Readers may also want to know which items made the largest realizations over the estimates. There are simply too many items to analyze to make such a determination. However, the following chronological listings of the highlights should show up such exceptional lots.

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
A memorial cachet cover honoring former University of Notre Dame head football coach Knute K. Rockne, has been sponsored and is available from the River City Local Post, South Bend, Indiana.

The cachet shows Coach Rockne with the famed Golden Dome in the background. "Knute Rockne--All-American" is the cachets' wording. A movie by that title premiered in South Bend with actors Pat O'Brien and Ronald Reagan portraying Knute Rockne and George Gipp ("The Gipper") respectively.

An informative filler card is included in each cover. The covers are postmarked at Notre Dame, Indiana post office on March 31, 1981---the 50th anniversary of the plane crash which killed Rockne near Bazaar, Kansas. He is buried in South Bend.

The Rockne Memorial Cover is the first of a planned series of covers entitled the International Sports and Games Collection. The Rockne cachet was designed by The Lettering Pen, South Bend.

Orders for the Rockne cover should be sent to E. A. Bella, 4927 York Road, South Bend, IN 46614. Covers are \$1 each plus a number 10 self-addressed, stamped envelope.



#### 1932 OLYMPIC FDC AUCTION RESULTS

Results of the auction of the Philip E. Baker FDC collection are now available. The auction was held December 13, 1980 by American Philatelic Brokers, Inc. F. O. Drawer 10380, Bradentown, Florida 33507. Philip E. Baker was the consummate collector and FDCs were only one of his specialties. Nevertheless, his material was of exceptionally high quality. Listed below are only the results of the 1932 Olympic covers, identified primarily by cachet. The condition of the covers is at least very fine, with many described as pristine.

Florida is already known as the center for many dealers and specialists in US FDCs. Earl Planty, author of his famous classic cachet catalog and encyclopedia, lives there. One major New York

dealer recently moved to Florida, too.

Planty SPT

Olympic Tit is interesting to note that no Beazell/cacheted FDCs were offered. However, the auction had Beazell photographed FDCs with other US stamps. Two covers bearing the Ohio River Canalization stamp of 1929 in very fine condition realized \$165 each.

It is also interesting to note that sets of covers tend to work out to a value of about \$24 to \$36 per cover.

There is a large influx of new collectors in US FDCs due to the impact of advertising in the national, non-philatelic press and magazines. These new collectors are probably absorbing the cheaper, more common cachets first. These cachets seem to be showing the largest increases. Many middle-range scarce cachets seem to be obtaining modest premiums over the cheaper covers at this time.

#### THE SPORTS STAMPS OF GREAT BRITAIN: 10 OCT 1980

by Robert J. Wilcox

Four stamps were issued, designed by Robert Goldsmith, and printed in offset litho by the House of Questa on phosphor coated paper, sheets of 100, 2 panes of 50, PVAD gum, perf 14 X 14½. They are the first British litho commemoratives.

- 12 p; Athletics (Centerany of Amateur Athletic Association)
  First class internal postage rate.
- 13½p; Rugby football (Centenary Welsh Rugby Union) European rate.
- 15p; Boxing (Centenary Amateur Boxing Association)
  Air mail to North America.
- 17½p; Cricket (Centenary of England-Australia Test Matches)
  Air mail to Australia.

A presentation Pack was available (72 p) and 4 postcard reproductions of the stamps. This is normal with all British commemoratives. However there was an exhibition of Sports Stamps at the National Postal Museum, and as a souvenir the 12p postcard was overprinted "A Souvenir of the Elizabethan Sports Stamps Exhibition. / National Postal Museum—October - November, 1980". The 12p stamp was affixed and the card sold for 25p. After addressing it could then be posted to receive the red Maltese Cross National Postal Museum cancellation. Numbers overprinted were small and heavy demand led to rationing: just one card per person. Dealers are now (Jan. 81) asking £5 first day, £2 other days.

#### AUSTRALIAN SPORTING PERSONALITIES ON NEW STAMPS

A set of four special issue stamps featuring famous Australian Sporting Personalities will be issued by Australia Post on 18 February 1981.

The denominations and subjects are: 22¢ Darby Munro, 35¢ Victor Trumper, 55¢ Sir Norman Brookes and 60¢ Walter Lindrum.

For this issue, Sydney artist Tony Rafty has depicted these famous Australian sportsmen in caricature. This art style was popular when such personalities were featured on cigarette cards some years ago around the time when three of the personalities featured were active.

Darby Munro, one of Australia's most famous jockeys, was born David Hugh Munro on 5 March 1913 in Sydney. He grew up around race horses, and was only 14 years old when he rode his first winner.

Darby Munro, named "The Demon" by both the racing fraternity and the public, rode many winners during his career. He had three Melbourne Cup wins to his credit - he rode Peter Pan in 1934, Sirius in 1944 and Russia in 1946 to victories in the famous race.

Darby Munro retired from riding in 1954 to work as a trainer. He died on 3 April 1966.

Victor Thomas Trumper was born on 2 November 1877 in Sydney. While at school he showed a natural batting ability and in 1899 toured England with the Australian Cricket team, establishing himself as a world class batsman.

His most remarkable season was in 1902 while he was in England with the Australian team. It was one of the wettest summers on record and Victor Trumper scored 2570 runs in 53 innings, including 11 centuries, to achieve an average of 48.49. In 1914 Victor Trumper and A. Sims created the current world record eighth wicket stand of 433 runs at Christchurch, New Zealand. He died on 28 June 1915.

Norman Everard Brookes was born in Melbourne on 14 November 1877. He started playing interstate tennis in 1896 and in 1905 won the Allcomers' singles title at Wimbledon in London. Two years later, Norman Brookes returned to Wimbledon to win the singles, doubles and mixed doubles championships, becoming the first non-Briton to win the Wimbledon singles. In parternship with Anthony Wilding of New Zealand in 1907, Norman Brookes won the Davis Cup for Australasia for the first time. He again won the Wimbledon singles title in 1914.



Norman Brookes played Davis Cup tennis until 1921. He was the first president of the Lawn Tennis Association of Australia, a position he held continuously from 1926 to 1955. Norman Brookes was knighted in 1939 for his services to tennis. He died on 28 September 1968, and is depicted on the stamp in a business suit to emphasis the importance of his role as a tennis administrator.

Walter Albert Lindrum was born on 29 August 1898 in Kalgoorlie, Western Australia.

From childhood, Walter Lindrum worked hard to gain proficiency in billiards. In 1929 he went to England and in the following five years broke all records for speed of scoring and size of breaks. He became world champion in 1932 when he defeated Joe Davis.

In a match on 19 and 20 January 1932, Walter Lindrum made a world record break of 4137 points in two hours and fifty-five minutes. New rules were introduced in an effort to curb Walter Lindrum's superiority but none of the rules prevented him from breaking records.

Walter Lindrum retired in 1950 as undefeated world champion, and spent the remainder of his career in exhibition games for charity. He was awarded the OBE in 1958 for his charity work. He died in 1960.

The four stamps will be available in a souvenir pack for \$A1.89. The stamps and souvenir pack will be available at post offices for approximately six weeks following the issue date. They will remain on sale at philatelic sales centres until 30 September 1981, provided stocks last.

One first day cover, measuring 190 mm x 101 mm and numbered 151, has been provided for this issue. It will be available unserviced for \$A0.13 from 11 February 1981. The cover with the four stamps affixed and postmarked 18 February 1981 will cost \$A1.85, and will be available at all first day of issue post offices, including philateli sales centres, until 3 March 1981 provided stocks last.

Overseas collectors can obtain the stamps and first day cover by mail order. Remittances, which must accompany each order, should be forwarded to the Philatelic Bureau, GPO Box 9988, Melbourne, Victoria 3001, Australia.

#### LETS POOL OUR OLYMPIC AND SPORTS KNOWLEDGE

Sports and Olympic philatelists have, collectively, a great deal of knowledge, which when pooled, can be of mutual benefit. A - 73 The best source of reference pertaining to the Ancient Olympic Games is Ludwig Drees book"Olympia, Gods, Artists and Athletes", translated from the earlier German edition and published in 1968 by Frederick A.Praeger.

The Greek 1d stamp (Scott 681) picturing the judges entering the stadium were those who administrated the Ancient Olympic games. Among their responsibilities were the issuance, by heralds, of formal invitations to all of the Greek States, the supervision of the various buildings, the accommodations, arrangements for guests of honor and foreign envoys, planning the order of events, testing the athletes, sorting them into pairs and groups, and judging the events.

The power of the judges was considerable. They could impose fines, disqualify competitors, banish them from Olympia, and have them publicly scourged.

The number of judges officiating at the Ancient Olympic games varied. When King Iphitus of Elis founded the games he was the only judge. In 580 BC a second judge was appointed. Rather than being called judges their designation was "Agonothetae" (game organizers). According to Pausanias, as the games progressed in time, nine judges were appointed, "three for the horse-race, three to watch the pentathlon, and three to preside over the remaining events." Then, the number rose to ten, then twelve, only to return to ten again in 348 BC, where it remained until the games were suspended.

The "Agonothetae" name was replaced by the term "Hellanodicae" (i.e., 'judges of the Greeks"). Unlike the eight judges illustrated on the 1d stamp, the color of their cloaks were purple, signifying an emblem of their high office. They carried in their hands a branch of palm which was initially awarded to each victor. The 6d stamp of the same set illustrates the judges crowning the victor on the fifth and final day, which ceremony took place in the Temple of Zeus. The wreath, always made from a single olive branch, commemorated Zeus's victory over Cronus.

#### DECEASED

16C - Ira Seebacher

#### Ira Seebacher 1911-1981

Ira Seebacher died on February 5, 1981, just one week after his 70th birth-

day on January 29th.

Ira was a longtime member of the Collectors Club of New York, having joined that organization in the late 1940's. He served the Club on a number of committees and was a member of the editorial committee for the Collectors Club Philatelist at the time of his death. That service had begun six years earlier in 1975.

In addition, he was a frequent contributor to that publication. His articles, always interesting, sparkled with wit and humor. To paraphrase Byron, who said in Don Juan, "I love the language, that soft bastard Latin...," it could be said of Ira he loved the English language. His writing was living proof of that love.

Ira Seebacher was a journalist and he enjoyed the respect of his peers in that profession for almost 50 years. He was on the staff of The Morning Telegraph for almost 40 years. When he retired from the paper, he was its sports editor, a position he had filled with distinction.

After his retirement from "The Telegraph," he was production manager of

"Photo Weekly," a family-owned publication, later acquired by Billboard Publications. In that capacity, his work was praised by top officials of the camera industry. One wrote, "As a journalist, he set high standards of reporting and writing about the photographic industry. His writing expressed a soft humor and his use of the English language was outstanding. His abiding love for photo-

graphy was implicit in his writing for 'Photo Weekly.'"

Ira Seebacher was a devoted philatelist. Though essentially a collector of sports-related stamps — in which area he formed a collection which truthfully may be described as the world's finest — he did not neglect other philatelic areas. His general collection, alone, comprised several hundred thousand stamps.

Ira Seebacher was probably the earliest topicalist in the United States, long before the advent of specialized societies catering to that field of collecting. He was the guiding spirit in the formation of Topical Philatelists, Inc., probably the first association of subject matter collectors in this country, and served as its first president for many years. Later, when Sports Philatelists

came into being, Ira served that organization in a number of organizational and editorial capacities.

Because his sports collection impinged on other collecting areas. Ira was active in aerophilately and French philately, to name but a few. Ira served a term as president of Aero Philatelists, Inc. and for many years on its Board of Directors. He also served as president of the France and Colonies Society. He also was program director for both of these organizations.

His collections were entered in a number of international exhibitions, both here and abroad, and always achieved some of the highest honors.

He is survived by his wife, Sophie Smoliar Seebacher, and his son, Dr. J. Robert Seebacher. — Philip Silver

#### A 1931 OLYMPIADE CANCEL

Illustrated is a machine cancellation of Vienna found on a postcard. The cancellation is dated December 22, 1930. The slogan reads in German: Besuchen Sie die Winter-Olympiade Murzzuschlag, 5, -8, Februar 1931.

Literally, the translation is, in part: Visit the Winter Olympiad, February 5 to 8, 1931. However, I do not know what Murzzuschlag means.

Who can supply the details behind the cancellation and its meaning? It is, perhaps, a "pre-Olympic" item? Or perhaps the cancellation slogan is an abuse of the word "Olympiade?"






