## THE SPANGLER CUP

One of the oldest and most popular international ice hockey events in Europe is The Spangler Cup Tournament. It is an annual affair held in Davos, Switzerland. Dr. Karl Spangler, medical doctor from Davos created this competition in the spirit of friendship and understanding amongst the once unfriendly nations from the World War I conflict.

The initial competition was held from Dec. 26, 1923 to Jan. 1, 1924, in Davos during which a large amount of snow was experienced. (Note: the hockey rinks of that era were open outdoors type). The following teams participated and also finished in that order: 1. Oxford University H.C., 2. Berlin S.C., 3. Vienna E.V., 4. H.C. Davos, 5. Cambridge University H.C. Following tournament had 12 teams from eight different nations. The first Canadian appearance came in 1927 in an indirect manner, the French team PARIS-CANADIANS contained a number of players from Canada. It is possible, however, that the LONDON LIONS may have had some Canadians on its roster, but this is very much uncertain. The London club participated in the 1926 completion. Because of world politics and reorganization of the cup, tournament games were played out of the realm of regular competition. From 1938 to 1945, the era of World War II, caused the interruption of this event for obvious reasons. The home clubs in Switzerland carried on during the absence of foreign clubs and it was Davos A.C. that was the winner. Later it was decided any club winning the tournament three times would retire the Spangler Cup Trophy.

In 1946 the regular competition resumed in the original format and spirit. Davos A.C. having won the cup three times. Since it was accomplished during the absence of foreign teams, the club returned the Spangler Cup Trophy for competition. After 15 years of competition, the L.T.C. Prague of Czechoslovakia retired the cup for good, winning the tournament in 1946, 1947 & 1948.

In 1949 there was a pause and only friendly tournament was held, but in 1950 the competition was resumed. The village of Davos donated a new trophy, Spangler Cup I. This cup was retired by ACBB Paris winning in 1959, 1960 & 1961.

Spangler Cup II was donated by the people of Davos, which was won by SLOVAN Bratislava of Czechoslovakia in 1974. The winner was decided on penalty shots.

There were some strong teams noted like in 1972 the Swiss National Team, as well as, the Norwegian National Team. In 1974 there were All Star teams from Finland, Holland, Poland and Switzerland. The next few years various national teams were represented. In 1975 Olympic teams of Czechoslovakia, Finland, Norway, Poland and Switzerland competed. The following year Czechoslovakia B, Finland, Japan and Switzerland competed.



Philatelically, The Spangler Cup event received a pictorial commemorative cancel. The same format was been used annually, however, it varies in the size of the circle in which the village name and date are located. In addition, the same pictorial form is used in the meter logo used by the organizing committee.

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# Golf on Christmas Island

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*Stamp Lover: April 1980*

A set of two stamps to celebrate 25 years of golf on the island was issued on 12th February. The 20c and 55c depict respectively, the '9th Green' and the 'Club-house'. The stamps were designed by Richard Granger Barrett and printed in lithography by Format International Security Printers Ltd in sheets of 50 (2 × 25) on unwatermarked paper.

The formation of the Golf Club on Christmas Island was first proposed in 1951. Rumour has it that an area was cleared for a course in the centre of the island under the guise of jungle clearing for a phosphate quarry. However, it was not until October 1954 that a petition was presented to the Christmas Island Manager requesting permission to form a golf club. The area then selected was on the coast near Waterfall and had been partly cleared some years before by prisoners of war during the Japanese occupation.

A meeting was subsequently held on 3rd November 1954 at which it was formerly decided to establish the Christmas Island Golf Club.

Construction of the course was carried out by members in their own time using equipment and plant made available by the British Phosphate Commissioners. On 18th June the first official competition was held on the newly constructed six holes with sand greens. Since that time the course has been extended to nine holes with the last of the sand greens being replaced by grass in 1959.

In May 1955 the members constructed an old bush hut to serve as a 'club house'. Later it was replaced by the present club house, constructed by the British Phosphate Commissioners.



- A-77 Several sources indicate that the 1980 United States Olympic stamps and postal stationery publicizing the Moscow Olympics was withdrawn from sale March 11, 1980.

Page three of United States Postal Bulletin Number 21237, dated March 20, 1980, discusses the suspended sales of 1980 Olympic items. In part it reads, "All postmasters should have been notified by their management sectional center to remove from sale all stamps and philatelic products related to the 1980 Summer Olympics." The article goes on to list the item numbers and describes the articles affected by the order.

Postmaster William F. Bolger announced on July 30, 1980 that with the conclusion of the summer olympics in Moscow, sale of the summer olympic items which had been withdrawn March 11 would be resumed by the United States Postal Service on Monday, Aug. 4, 1980 in honor of American Olympic athletes who refrained from participating at the Moscow games at the President's request, the future of the Olympic movement, and also in honor of the great Jesse Owens, who died March 31.

A letter on White House stationery to your editor, signed by Jim Purks, Assistant Press Secretary, Office of Media Liaison, and dated Aug. 8, 1980, discusses the withdrawal order: "Dear Mr. Epstein: Thank you for your letter regarding the postage stamps commemorating the 1980 Moscow games. The withdrawal order was not the result of an executive order. The White House advised the State Department to withdraw the stamps from sale and this in turn was relayed to the Postal Service, which had asked for guidance. President Carter personally approved placing the stamps back up for sale....."





war and concentration camp victims of the Nazis. The other aquatic event was the 1965 International Modern Pentathlon Championship in Leipzig in which a swimmer was shown leaving the starting blocks (Fig. 291).

In addition to the European championship stamp (Fig. 288), two Olympics were commemorated by diving stamps: two stamps (Figs. 264, 292) in 1964 and one (Fig. 293) in 1972. Women divers appeared on all stamps, and in 1964 the women earned a gold and a silver medal while receiving two bronze medals in 1972. No men won either year.

Sailboats were depicted on seven stamps: three were for the Leipzig Fairs in 1956 (Fig. 294), 1960 (Fig. 295), and 1973 (Fig. 273); one (Fig. 296) was for the Society of Sport and Technology; one (Fig. 297) for the 1960 Olympiad; and one (Fig. 298) portrayed a Soviet painting in the Dresden Gallery of Modern Masters, "Hot Day," by J. D. Romas. Two stamps (Figs. 299, 300) were issued to commemorate the launching of a trade union vacation ship on June 25, 1960. The latter also depicts a sailboat in the foreground.

The 1961 World Canoe Slalom and the White Water Racing Championships were held at Hainsberg near Dresden. The slalom event is held in wild water with currents of at least two meters per second for 800 meters while white water events are three to eight kilometers and use natural obstacles.<sup>11</sup> All three stamps showed boats going through the slalom gates, and events depicted were the one-man Kayak (Fig. 301), one-man Canadian (Fig. 302), and the two-man Canadian canoe (Fig. 303).<sup>12</sup> The 1966 World Canoe Championships were held in Berlin, and two stamps were issued: one (Fig. 304) depicted the women's doubles with East Germany winning the 500 meter women's kayak pairs, and the other (Fig. 305) portrayed the men's singles event with West Germany winning the 1,000 meter Canadian singles. Other stamps include: the 1968 European Women's Rowing Championships in Berlin (Fig. 306); sculling in the Mexico City Olympics (Fig. 307) with a silver medal for men's single sculls; and rowing in the Munich Olympics (Fig. 308) in which three gold, one silver, and three bronze medals were won. Kurt Biedermann (1902-1942), a white water racer, was portrayed on one (Fig. 309) of the stamps commemorating the war victims of the Nazis.

#### Individual Activities

Sports aviation has been depicted on several stamps. The first stamp (Fig. 310) showed young Pioneers building model airplanes in 1961. In 1968, two stamps (Figs. 311, 312) depicted "Trener" stunt planes. Competition in aerobatics tests the skill of the pilot and the versatility of the aircraft through a large variety of maneuvers. All air-has to be insured and certified as to air worthiness. In world competitions a team consists of three to five pilots and both a women's and men's team can enter. Three programs are flown during world championships: a known compulsory, an unknown compulsory, and a program of the pilot's choice. The highest one-third of the men and one-half of the women competitors then compete in a fourth pilot-choice program.<sup>13</sup>

The Eighth International Parachute Championships were held in Leipzig in 1966, and these stamps were portrayed: parachutist landing on target (Fig. 313); group parachute jump (Fig. 314); and free fall (Fig. 315). In 1972, a stamp (Fig. 316) publicizing the Society for Sport and Technology illustrated a parachute and a light plane. In sport parachuting the target is a white, red, yellow, or orange cross and is large enough to be seen from the height the parachutists are dropped. Only qualified parachutists, who are pronounced medically fit and are registered with a national aero club, can participate in international championships. Both a men's and a women's team of four persons enter from each country. Events include: a precision jump onto a target, a style jump, and a free fall jump.<sup>14</sup> During these 1966 championships, the Soviet Union won all of the women's events and lost only the men's precision jump to East Germany.<sup>15</sup>

Sixteen of the bicycle stamps commemorate the annual Prague-Berlin-Warsaw Bicycle Peace Race. Originally a race was planned as a round trip between Prague and Warsaw, and this first race in 1948 had the purpose of cementing relationships between the peoples of Czechoslovakia and Poland. Picasso's dove, the symbol of peace, was the symbol used for this race and the leading newspapers of these two countries co-sponsored the event. In 1952, the first time a bicycle stamp (Fig. 317) was issued in East Germany, an East German newspaper also helped in sponsoring this Peace Race and the route included Germany to Berlin. Both individual and team winners are announced, and each year the event starts from a different city. Contestants come from countries other than these three.<sup>16</sup> Other stamps issued for this race include the Sixth in 1953 (Figs. 318-320), Seventh (Figs. 321, 322), Eighth—two identical designs (Fig. 323), Ninth (Figs. 324, 325), Tenth (Fig. 326), Fifteenth (Figs. 327-329), and the Twentieth Race (Figs. 330, 331).

Two stamps (Figs. 332, 333) depicted the 1960 World Bicycling Championships in Leipzig which had no East German winners, and two stamps (Figs. 334, 335) were issued for the 1960 Olympiad in which a gold and a bronze medal were won. One stamp (Fig. 334) publicized the World Indoor Bicycle Championships in Erfurt in 1969. The dress for a cyclist is a jersey or undershirt with sleeves and a pair of dark-colored racing shorts. A padded crash hat is worn for track events. A competitor must be licensed by his club in accordance with national regulations. Starts are either standing or rolling, and finishes are judged by the crossing of the finish line by time. A person can not receive any help when completing the course by walking the bicycle; however, refreshments can be handed to the competitor.<sup>17</sup> Albert Richter (1912-1940), bicyclist, was portrayed as one of the sports war victims of the Nazis (Fig. 336). Another stamp (Fig. 337) depicted a bicyclist to publicize traffic safety in 1966.

Motorcycle safety was noted in this same set (Fig. 338). Three stamps were issued for the 1963 World Motorcycle Championships. One stamp (Fig. 339) depicted the moto cross held at Apolda, and the other



two (Figs. 340, 341) showed cyclists at Sachsenring. Moto cross or scrambles takes place on cross-country courses with unprepared surfaces, and the courses are between one and three miles. A set-distance or a set time can be used to declare the winner of the event. Solo motorcycles usually are used as depicted on the stamps; however, side car races are also popular in Europe.<sup>18</sup> A design featuring a compass and a motorcyclist was used on a stamp (Fig. 342) in 1972 to publicize the Society for Sport and Technology.

Three boxing stamps were issued for two boxing events. The first stamp (Fig. 343) was for the 1960 Olympiad in which a bronze medal was received in the heavyweight class; and the other event was the Sixteenth European Boxing Championships in Berlin in 1965 (Figs. 344, 345), and the light-heavyweight and heavyweight titles were won by Germany. The surtax from one of the two stamps for the latter event aided the German Turner and Sports Organization.

The International and European Weight Lifting Championships were held in Berlin in 1966 and two stamps (Figs. 346, 347) commemorated the event portraying weight lifters in action. Wrestling was depicted on one 1972 Olympic stamp (Fig. 348), and a silver medal was won in the featherweight class of Greco-Roman wrestling. Werner Seelenbinder (1904-1944), a wrestler, was one of the Nazi war victims commemorated in 1963 (Fig. 349). Judo was represented by two stamps (Figs. 264, 350) in the 1964 Olympic series, and a silver medal was won for the middleweight class while a bronze medal was received in the open class.

Three equestrian stamps (Figs. 351-353) publicized the 1958 Grand Prix of the German Democratic Republic; Two stamps (Figs. 264, 354) were issued for the 1964 Olympiad in which two gold, two silver, and two bronze medals were earned; and one stamp (Fig. 355) for the 1965 Modern Pentathlon Championship in Leipzig. To publicize the 1967 Thoroughbred Horse Show of Socialist Countries in Hoppegarten, Berlin, four stamps (Figs. 356-359) were issued, and in 1974, four stamps (Figs. 360-363) honoring the International Congress for Horsebreeding of the Socialist Countries.

The only fencing stamp (Fig. 364) was issued in a set of five publicizing the International Modern Pentathlon Championships held in Leipzig in 1965. The modern pentathlon is believed to have a military origin since the activities represent those needed by a courier prior to the invention of the radio. First the courier had to ride cross-country and swim the rivers and streams. If he was confronted by the enemy the courier needed skill in pistol shooting and swordsmanship.<sup>19</sup> Hungary won both the team and individual titles in 1965. Pistol shooting was portrayed on another stamp (Fig. 365) in the Modern Pentathlon Championships set. The other marksmanship stamp (Fig. 256) was issued to publicize the Society for Sport and Technology.

Outdoor activities received philatelic attention in East Germany. Camping was featured on a stamp (Fig. 366) commemorating the tenth anniversary of the Pioneer Movement in 1958. Tents were depicted on stamps for the 1960 (Fig. 295) and 1973 (Fig. 272) Leipzig Fairs. To commemorate the 1961 World Fishing Championships two stamps—one (Fig. 367) portraying target line casting and the other (Fig. 368) river

fishing--were issued. An angler was illustrated on a stamp (Fig. 369) publicizing the 1968 World Angling Championships in Gustrow. Kurt Schlosser (1900-1944), a mountaineer, was depicted in the 1963 series (Fig. 370) honoring the Nazi sports victims.

A competition map on one stamp (Fig. 371) and a runner at three different stations (Fig. 372) were the designs chosen to publicize the 1970 World Orienteering Championships. For orienteering competition an overprinted map of the locations of the control points and the out of bounds areas is given to the contestant who uses a red pen to plot the course. A card is stamped at each control point and any compulsory paths are marked by white and red/orange flags or tape. Competitors start at one to three minute intervals, and some competitions have a time limit while in others the event ends when the course is completed. In point orienteering the team or person with the fastest time wins, while in score orienteering each control point is worth from five to 50 points and the person or team with the highest score wins, with point deductions for every minute over the time limit and no bonus for finishing early. The competitor has to decide whether to visit many small scoring controls or a few high scoring controls in score orienteering.<sup>20</sup>

The Fourteenth World Chess Championships were held in Leipzig with 22 nations participating, and the Soviet Union won the team championship for the fifth time. To publicize this 1960 event, three stamps (Figs. 373-375) were issued depicting the emblem with various chess pieces. One stamp (Fig. 376) portraying a knight publicized the Sixteenth World Students' Chess Championships in Dresden in 1969, and the Soviet Union won the team championship. In 1968, a stamp (Fig. 377) was issued to honor the birth of Emanuel Lasker (1868-1941). Lasker was world chess champion between 1894 and 1921 and was the second German to hold the world title. In 1967, four stamps (Figs. 378-381) were issued with designs of various German playing cards, and each design bore face cards of a different suit.

### Gymnastics

The first gymnastic stamp (Fig. 382) in East Germany commemorated the death of Friedrich Ludwig Jahn (1778-1852), the father of German gymnastics. In 1810 Jahn began meeting his students in an open area, called a Turnplatz, on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons. Here he assembled apparatus recommended by Guts Muths and others. Equipment included balance beam, vertical ropes, ladders, horizontal bars between trees, high jump and pole vaulting standards, a jumping ditch and a running track.<sup>21</sup> In 1816, Jahn united his students with those of Plamann's school for boys in Berlin and developed a plan which was the foundation for future German Turner Societies. The uniform was long trousers and a gray unbleached linen jacket.<sup>22</sup> Jahn believed that physical education was a means to a national end rather than an end in itself.

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
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
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

# - OLYMPIC NOTES -

SPI member A. Sekimoto of Japan sends notes on the Far Eastern Championship Games, although he calls them the Far East Olympic Games. He reports the following dates and venues:

Thereafter, the Games were suspended. After the Second World War, the name was changed to the Asian Games and many more Asian countries joined.

Mr. Sekimoto sends two photocopies which will be printed with this article if reproducible.

Figure 1 shows a label showing a stylized nude tennis player. The upper part of the label is light green and white. The captioned bottom is black and white. The caption refers to the Far East Olympic Meet but is undated. Text is Japanese.

Figure 2 is a postal card with a special cancellation. The color of the cancellation is not given. The explanation of the cancellation is as follows:

Upper part: Osaka Municipal Stadium  
Middle part: 6th Far East Athletic Championships Meet  
Bottom: Japanese Era, Showa 12 (1923), May 21-26,  
Ichioka (name of post office).

Joe Lacko reports information from J. Justyn of Czechoslovakia about the Austrian machine slogan cancellation of 1930 (JSP May-June, 1981, pages 151-2). The cancellation inscribed Winter Olympiad was for the Workers Olympics. Similar events were held in Prague, Antwerp, Vienna. One was scheduled but never held at Barcelona, Spain because of the civil war during the 1930s.

I have a naval penalty cover, long size, with printed corner of Navy Department, Submarine Division 12, USS Narwhal, Flagship, Via Postmaster, San Diego, Calif., Official Business. The cover has a naval hand cancel in black of USS HOLLAND and is dated August 10, 1932. Between the killer bars of the cancellation reads: 10TH/OLYMPIAD. Cover is addressed to Chief of the Bureau of Engineering, Navy Department, Washington, D. C.. This is obviously a non-philatelic cover. Does anyone else have a similar cover from this ship related to the 1932 Olympics?

Ever wonder why the foreign texts of the 1932 official Winter Olympics vignette are so scarce? The design features a skier facing left and superimposed on a map of the USA. Here are the quantities produced:

English	790,000
French	65,000
German	65,000
Spanish	225,000
Total	1,145,000

Most of the foreign text labels went to travel agencies and business organizations for publicity. The foreign labels were intended for overseas mail. My own experience indicates that the Spanish text is the most difficult to find. Do you agree?





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
