- Official Guide or Souvenir Album
- Daily Programs
- Entrance Tickets
- Official Pin
- Official Posters
- Autogrammes
- Coins and Non-official medals
- Photo's

- Films and Video
- Sound on Records or Tape
- Books, magazins etc.

There are a number of collectors of this material all over the world, many of them collecting philatelic items as well, but up till now not joined in a club. In order to enable everybody who is interested in collecting non-pilatelic material there are two possibilities:

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


HOW TO MAKE UNIQUE OLYMPIC FDC'S - - - - - - - -

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-OLYMPIC NOTES-

by SHERWIN PODOLSKY

PHILATELIC LITERATURE. Roger Koerber, 605 Northland Towers West, Southfield, Michigan 48075 offers at least three Olympic and sport topical references:

"Catalog of Olympic Games Vignettes" by Paul F.
Rampacher. Olympic labels 1906 to 1956.
"Worldwide Cancellations of the Olympic Games" by G.
Schneider. 1906 to1960 special cancellations.
"Gymnastic and Sports Festival Special Postmarks of
Germany and Switzerland" by A. de Winter.

These are listed in their 1982 net price list of over 1300 different titles. Many references are not directly devoted to sports and Olympic topicals, but are definitely of interest. An example is Volume 4, 1932 #716-23 of Planty's Photo Encyclopedia of Cacheted FDCs. This illustrates many cachets on FPCs of the 1932 Clympic stamps.

Nevertheless, the most thorough reference for Clympic collectors is still Heiko Volk, Jr.'s book "Tie Olympischen Spiele im Blickpunkt der Fhilatelie und ihren Ranigebieten" ("The Olympic Games in the Viewpoint of Philately and its Related Areas") which covers 1894 through 1944. In German, the book is obtainable from Otto Volk, Albert-Schweitzer Strasse 34, D-6120 Erbach, West Germany.

For those looking for the flavor and romance of history mixed with philately, "A Philatelic History of the Olympic Games" by Ernest Trory which was initially published in serials starting in 1956 is without peer. Pages are big, illustrations large and excellent, paper slick and durable. Olympiads from 1896 through 1936 are given generous, if not necessarily as thorough treatment as in Volk, Jr.'s book. ROMOLYMPHIL '82. We came. We saw. We were conquered. Morris
Rosen and I were the two invitees from the United States to attend
the World Exhibition of Olympic Philately. Our hosts were the
Italian National Olympic Committee (C.O.N.I.).

We were conquered by our host's magnificent hospitality and the unique opportunity to see the entire philatelic chronology of the Olympic Games from 1896 through 1980 without duplication all at one place.

Separately I have listed the exhibitors and the segments they exhibited. All exhibitors except Manfred Pergman of Geneva, Switzerland attended ROMOLYMPHIL '82.

Our "Olympic Village" was the Hotel Parco dei Principi, a first class hotel at the northeast tip of the Porghese gardens. Every room had a balcony. The exhibitors gathered in the dining room at a single large table for breakfast, lunch and dinner. Preakfasts were "contin-

tal." Lunch and dinner were based on the same menu of various choices.

The exhibition was held from May 19 through 26, 1982 at Palazzo
Braschi in Rome. However, the guests were scheduled to arrive on May

18 and to leave on May 27.

Breakfast would start usually at 8 a.m. and a bus would transport us to the exhibition at 9 a.m.. We weaved through the notorious Rome traffic for about an hour, passing by Excelsior Hotel, site of the guests of the International Olympic Committee, on Via Veneto which was decorated with Olympic flags. We saw billboards pasted on walls advertising the exhibition.

Palazzo Braschi is a medieval palace, comparatively small, with much marble and classical statues. Some of the walls had Renaissance

frescoes. The setting for the exhibition was thus elegant.

The Italian post office had a large booth and offered three different special postmarks during the exhibition. There was a commemorative airletter for the 85th session of the International Olympic committee.

Other post offices also had booths and some offered souvenir cancellations. These included France, USSR, Somalia and San Marino.

The Italian postal printers offered a most attractive souvenir sheet reproducing prior Olympic stamps without postal validity.

Also available were commemorative labels and picture postcards and posters of various sizes. The exterior of Palazzo Braschi bore a large banner reproducing the poster for ROMOLYMPHIL '82.

Our special bus would return us to the hotel for lunch, leaving downtown Rome at about 1 p.m. and arriving at the hotel about 2 p.m.. Lunch took about two hours. We would return to the exhibition hall at 5 p.m.. At about 7:30 p.m., we would return to the hotel for dinner which began about 8:30 p.m. and continued until about 10:30 p.m.. Italian wines were free-flowing and the camaraderie was spirited.

Tours were provided for the guests. The local sites of Rome included the Vatican City, the Colosseum, the Forum, St. Paul's, many fountains and a local synagogue. Many medieval buildings were in current use and we also saw excavations here and there.

Some of us would take time for shopping or to explore certain sites on our own. An all-day tour was provided to Orvieto (a very famous wine country) and to Assisi, the home of St. Francis who will be subject of a U.S. commemorative stamp in October. We found the farms in the country to be small compared to the U.S., generally and much of the growing was devoted to grape vines and olive trees.

A half-day tour to Tivoli brought us to a remarkable garden of

hundreds of fountains of all kinds of designs and layouts.

A group of non-Italian (mostly) guests also visited Naples, Sorrento and Pompei. It was explained to us that Pompei was destroyed in 79 A.D. by smoke and ash from the exploding volcano, Mt. Vesuvius. Pompei was then a Roman commercial center. We saw the ruins of the city that left no doubt of the archeological splendor at that time. The citizens were pagans and bacchanals. Frescoes included well-preserved erotic art.

A few of us took tours on our own to Florence and Pisa to see Michelangelo's David and the leaning tower of Pisa, both unforgettable sights.

A palmares ceremony was held at Palazzo Braschi. Every exhibitor received a number of gifts and awards. Since the exhibition was non-competitive, the gifts and awards were identical for every exhibitor. However, the most impressive award was a medal reproducing the design on the commemorative airletter. The medal was set on a thick martle has and thus suitable as a bookend.

The awards were presented by Juan Samaranch, president of the

The awards were presented by Juan Samaranch, president of the International Olympic Committee, and by Franco Carraro, president

of the Italian National Olympic Committee.

The exhibitors were invited to attend the opening ceremony of the 85th session of the International Olympic Committee at the Argentina theater, a beautiful opera house, on the evening of May 26. Speeches were given by president of the Italian republic, Mr. Samaranch and Mr. Carraro. Ballet and opera presentations followed with a grand finale of the national and Olympic anthems by the band of the carabinieri (Italian police band).

What can be said about the exhibits themselves? It is impossible to discuss each and do justice to all. The Greek presentations were fantastically detailed. Indeed all the exhibits had rare and difficult items. I did feel there were shortcomings in the 1980 Moscow exhibit in that no cancellations or postally travelled items were presented. Mr. Furman of Odessa who was invited originally did not come. The exhibit appeared to be basically the items available from the Russian philatelic agency in unused or mint condition.

Rules of the International Federation of Philately (FIP) did not apply to ROMOLYMPHIL '82. Therefore a certain amount of non-philatelic material was permissible. This included mainly Olympic vignettes (seals and labels). To some extent unused (presumably) picture postcards and original newspaper articles were shown, but not ostentatiously. A limited number of medals were shown.

Although the rules for exhibiting emphasized only host country material, a certain amount of non-host country material was shown up to 1948. Thus the Uruguay material of 1924 and 1928, Fortugal of 1928, and overprints on 1948 Great Britain provided diversions of

exceptional interest because they consisted of covers.

Mr. Bergman's exhibits included reference of postmark dates to Olympic events held on those dates, where the dates were on covers. This showed exceptional depth of research, in my opinion, and the exhibit would also include an appropriate stamp with design showing the event, usually a sport.

Mr. Tisironis' exhibit included printing varieties of the 1896 Olympic stamps. Unfortunately, none of this information has been

published in English, to date.

I met Navid Fogel, an SPI member, with his wife at ROMOLYMPHIL '82. It was a surprise and delight to meet for the first time. He was absorbing the exhibit in detail, and made many mental notes.

A 109-page soft-cover catalog wrote up each segment of the exhibition along with a photograph of the exhibitor. The catalog contained text in three languages: Italian, French and English. This was largely the work of Giuseppe Sabelli Fioretti, a philatelic journalist and serious philatelist who also exhibited.

Practically every chronological segment included an Olympic

committee cover.

At the conclusion of ROMOLYMPHIL '82, the hosts expressed the hope that the idea of an invitational World Olympic Philatelic Exhibition may be continued perhaps at Los Angeles, 1984.

The ideals of Olympism and philately merge in Clympic philately. The Italian hosts brought these ideals to reality magnificently.

A - 76 The "Rowers Tent Camp" handstamp used at Grunau during the 1936 Berlin Olympic games was presumably a publicity cachet applied to mail during the period of the events.

Your editor has in his collection this handstamp applied in violet to a 1936 Graph.Anstalt W.Meyerheim Berlin/Oly.-1 post card picturing the Grunau rowing course. It is to the left of the usual Berlin/Grunau Regattabahn "Bell" Olympic handstamp which cancels the post card's stamp. Circular in form the arc text inside the circle at top reads"Jungruderer=Olympia=Zel lager 1936". Circling the bottom are the words "Berlin 1936". The text is Old English. A swastika is superimposed over a German spreadwinged eagle forms the central design motif of this attractive handstamp cachet.

Since this handstamp cachet does not have a date line (day, month and year) your editor doubts if it was ever officially used to invalidate postage stamps. Information to the contrary would be appreciated by your editor.

A - 84 The list of designers mistakes gracing sports and Olympic stamps is very, very long. A good place to start would be information from the book "Errors in Postage Stamp Design" by Irvine & Seshold (published in 1979 by the National Philatelic Society, 1 Whitehall Place, London SW1A2HE for \$21.) which lists all errors in stamp designs of all kinds.

Sports and Olympic errors are delt with on pages 111-115 (in the Chapter "Errors in Portrayal of Subject"), Page 135 ("Anachronisms"), Pages 142-143 ("Commemoration of Non-Events) and Page 161 ("Intentional Errors").






