



SPEZIALKATALOG POSTSTEMPEL UND SONDER-EINSCHREIBZETTEL ZU DEN OLYMPISCHEN SPIELEN 1980 (Special Catalog of Postmarks and Special Registry Labels of the 1980 Olympic Games) by Manfred Winternheimer. Published by Internationalen Motivgruppe Olympiaden und Sport (IMOS). Order from IMOS, Justus von Liebigstrasse 14, D-6707 Schifferstadt, West Germany. No price stated. Loose-leaf. 152 pages (5 3/4 x 6 3/4 inches) plus card covers. Bound in two-ring vinyl binder.

SPI member Winternheimer has been providing the essential research to enable collectors to keep up with each new Olympiad's bountiful productions. There will be a separate release dealing with the most numerous postal stationery of Moscow 1980.

The quality of this production is excellent. Winternheimer's numbering system is very popularly used by collectors and dealers. The illustrations are large and clear. The postal material for each Olympiad (Winter, Summer, 1980) is divided into host country, participating countries and non-participating countries. Then the varieties are classified by machine cancels, hand cancels, First Day cancels, Special Hand Cancels, Special Machine cancels, Meters, Special date stamps and postal cachets (rubberstamps), and registry labels (including registry cancellations). Following the classification numbering system in a general first review will enable the reader to quickly grasp it.

There is a large range of subvarieties of the various cancellations, particularly of the Moscow 1980 Olympics. Considering the volume of material, I find it amazing that so many varieties were detected. So, before trading off your apparent duplicates, get this catalog to be sure you are not disposing of varieties that provide so much spice to collecting.

The Lake Placid 1980 material is all listed here and I see some stamp show special cancels I missed. There are FIVE meters listed. Does anyone in the USA have them all? There are not that many cancels for Lake Placid 1980 from participating nations, and some are not First Day. The non-First Day usually turn out to be the most difficult to get as time goes on.

THE ETERNAL OLYMPICS/ The Art and History of Sport. Edited by Nicolaos Yalouris. Published by Caratzas Brothers, Publishers, 481 Main Street, New Rochelle, New York 10801. 1979. 303 pages  $(9\frac{1}{7} \times 13\frac{1}{4} \text{ inches})$ . Cloth bound. Price \$60 (but write the publisher to learn about discounts).

Rarely has there been a book that combines presentations of sports, history, religion and art. This is such a book. Authoritative and lavishly produced, it is the only illustrated work dealing with the ancient games. All facets of the games are covered. A separate section is devoted to the evolution of each event: running, jumping, the discus, the javelin, boxing, wrestling, etc.. The place of women in the ancient Olympics is also discussed. What emerges is a view of sport which had a humanistic dimension and which aimed to develop man's many potentials.

The narrative is illustrated with some of the greatest masterpieces of classical art, which drew much of its inspiration from sport and from the beauty of the human form in athletic competition. All of the events, the intensivetraining of the athletes, as well as their portraits are depicted on handsome vases, bold sculptured reliefs, magnificent bronze and marble statues as well as in rare coins and in mosaics. Also included in this work are splendid color photographs of the ancient Olympic sites, monuments and temples, as they are today along with renderings how they must have once appeared.

The editor, Nicolaos Yalouris, is the director of the National Archaeological Museum in Athens and the second vice-president of the International Olympic Academy. Other contributors include archaeological professors, a classical philologist, and museum curators.

The above review is an adaptation of the description on the book flyleaf. It is quite accurate. The book is stunningly impressive. The major sections listed in the table of contents are: prehistory of the Games, athletics and education, The Olympic Games in ancient Greece, the events, and sport in the Hellenist and Roman periods.

Other events included are the pentathlon, the pancration, equestrian events and other sports. There is a highly detailed chapter on famous athletes in ancient Greece. The appendix includes a list of ancient Olympic victors (with the successive numbers of the Olympiads, the names of the victors, the contest in which they were victorious). There is a profuse bibliography and the list of illustrations identifies the source.

Many of the ancient artifacts are in widely scattered museums in several cities. What is amazing in this book that illustrations of several artifacts (sculpture, vases) are brought into sequence to show different styles of running, different types of foot races, the wrestling match from start to finish, etc..

Here is a book that should have everything the sport and Olympic philatelist needs for research and write-up. The 1979 edition is in English. A Greek edition was published in 1976.

The publisher also offers other books of Greek interest and there is a discount available, even if only one book is ordered. Readers should write for information. Also, examination of the book at a local library should impress one with its superior quality.

LE COMITE INTERNATIONAL OLYMPIQUE. Published by the International Olympic Committee, Chateau de Vidy, 1007 Lausanne, Switzerland. 148 pages. Hardbound. Page size 10 x  $12\frac{1}{4}$  inches. Price not stated. Bilingual, French and English. 1981.

This golden covered book is a luxurious production chronologically presenting the Olympic idea and the development of the International Olympic Committee under each of its presidents from Demetrius Vikelas of Greece in 1894 through Juan Antonio Samaranch at present. Color and black and white photographs present the organization of the IOC, the executive board, the international sports federations, the commissions, the national Olympic Committees, the congresses, the sessions and a listing of IOC members since 1894.

The richness of the Olympic movement and its ideals is magnificently presented. This is not a textbook but a record of progress of the Olympic movement chronologically classified by IOC president. Profuse illustrations testify to that progress.

The philatelist will find ample resource information on the International Olympic Committee presented here.

L'OLYMPISME PAR L'AFFICHE/OLYMPISM THROUGH POSTERS. Published by the International Olympic Committee. 1983. 191 pages, page size 10 x  $12\frac{1}{4}$  inches. Hard bound. French and English. Price not stated.

This book, entirely in fresh and rich color, presents illustrations of Olympic posters from Athens 1896 through Los Angeles and Sarajevo 1984. However, the illustration for Athens 1896 is the cover page of the official report, as acknowledged in the text. A section details with posters for selected other Olympic events. A third section shows posters for different championships and regional Games.

Details include: the dates of the events, the number of participants, the number of women participants, the designer, the printer, the printing process used for the poster, size orsizes, the number of copies in the print run and brief comments. The pages are durable and heavy. This is a book made to last. The book is not a catalog and there are no catalog numbers.

The cover is blue with an inlaid color illustration of the famous 1912 Stockholm Olympic poster which also appears on vignettes. The spine bears the title COMITE INTERNATIONAL OLYMPIQUE and Olympic rings. Highly recommended.

Foreign buyers should inquire first about postage costs before ordering. The prices quotes are postpaid in the United States only. Postage is extra for foreign shipments.

A perusal through his price list discloses a broad offering at most reasonable prices. Interested collectors should not miss this opportunity.

#### UNDERGROUND CACHETS

I have quite a few comments, solicited and unsolicited, about the lock that the Franklin Mint has on official 1984 Olympic cachets. There has been almost no advertising of any cachets for the US Olympic issue in the US philatelic press because permission has been exclusively by the US Olympic Committee and the Los Angeles Olympic Committee to the Franklin Mint. Except for the first blush of advertising by the Franklin Mint in the national press, there has been no follow-up advertising, at least to date.

One knowledgeable FDC dealer has the following to say: "On the lack of advertising for the Olympics, people are fed up with the Committee and restrictions. Why give the Olympics any more publicity? My spies tell me that Franklin Mint is producing less than 50,000 covers per issue--and if they sell them all they might make something. But giving a monopoly to one firm on items that should belong to the world body is not good. I can just see what will happen with all the sidewalk vendors going at it when the Olympics arrive."

Yet, some enthusiasts are making their own cachets. Ward Nichols has a thermograph blue cachet. Sherwin Podolsky has two cachets: (1) a two-color adaptation of a 1932 publicity cachet not used for FDCs and (2) statue of the Olympian Zeus, two colors on colored envelope. If interested, send inquiry with SASE. Addresses are in the officers' masthead.

### OLYMPIC REVIEW



Five pages are devoted to the philately of the IOC Congresses and sessions by Giuseppe Sabelli Fioretti. There is new information about the varieties of the 1925 Czechoslovakia IOC semi-postals. Overprint flaws, paper thicknesses (three types), and perforation varieties are described. The known 1930 rare special cancel for Berlin Olympic Congress is illustrated with the special postcard. The next items are in 1956 and appear frequently thereafter. Stamps and cancellations are described.

Other articles discuss the 1984 Olympic Games at Los Angeles and Sarajevo, the 1932 Los Angeles Olympics, Art and Sport, the significance of Athletics in Plato, Sports for the Deaf, etc.. "How To Make Los Angeles Unofficial City First Day Cancels of Stamps Issued in San Antonio, Texas, Successfully Challenging Murphy's Law that "if anything can go wrong, it will." (Nothing went wrong!)"

C. Klinker is an SPI member and Olympics collector who was determined to do something spectacular about the San Antonio Olympics issues of 6/17/83. T. & J. Neima of Clipper Cargo are neighbors of Klinkner, cover dealers who have emphasized Olympics in their business in the past year--philatelics and collateral materials. With singleminded determination they combined forces.

In an undertaking like this, logistics is paramount: Advance phone calls to the philatelic service in the San Antonio Post Office to find out what time the stamps and maximum cards would go on sale, whether at the same or two different windows; careful examination of airline flight schedules from San Antonio to Los Angeles; an advance visit to the philatelic window at Los Angeles Terminal Annex Post Office; "dry runs" to the airport and post offices at both ends, to assure sufficent time between points on June 17.

Klinkner drove to San Antonio in time to stand in line when the post office opened. He bought the stamps and maximum cards and raced to San Antonio Airport to put them on a Continental Airlines flight to L.A. which arrived there at 1:00 p.m. Neima picked them up at the counter and drove with son Jay very fast to the Los Angeles Terminal Annex Post Office, furiously licking stamps along the way. There the philatelic clerk (bless her!) cooperated fully with bullseye and fancy cancels to bring the project to fulfillment. The cancels were very "wet", and to avoid smearing, they spread them out (all over the tables and counters) and blotted them individually. Even with the two working, there simply wasn't time to complete all the items planned, and the clerk even stayed late for them. However, the items that were completed are gorgeous and reflect the careful planning and execution that figured into them.

If you anticipate undertaking such a project yourself, know that it will take more time and money than you may originally plan. Have a "plan B" in mind in case "plan A" (such as a missed airplane) goes awry. Protect your philatelic materials at every stage (foul weather can demolish your best efforts unless you remember to bring plastic bags). The creative collector can prevail over the odds!

### MAXIMUM CARDS FOR U.S. OLYMPICS

The U. S. Postal Service is now issuing maximum cards featuring original stamp art. These pictorial cards show the stamp designs without the wording and denominations. In some instances there is more shown of the original design than was printed on the corresponding stamp.

The cards are available in four varieties:

- a. mint, with no cancellations
- b. cancelled on picture side with round cancel and corresponding
- c. cancelled on reverse (address) side with First Day cancellation and corresponding stamp
- d. cancelled on both sides (two stamps)

All the forthcoming Olympic adhesive stamps will have their designs available on maximum cards. Reportedly, there will be 24 stamps.

The cards are available for  $50\,\text{c}$  each plus the face value of the stamps. Each card measures  $4\ 1/8$  inches x  $5\ 7/8$  inches, the maximum size allowed by the Universal Postal Convention which establishes international mail size standards.

Readers wishing to obtain these cards, along with current available US mint stamps as may be desired, should write for the latest free Philatelic Catalog available from the U. S. Postal Service, Philatelic Sales Division, Washington, DC 20265-997, USA.

The catalog also provides an order form. The minimum order is \$5.00. The order form allows for registration if desired. Many foreign readers may find registration service to be a wise option.

Readers interested in selected sport motifs should note that individual cards may be purchased. It is not necessary to buy complete sets. Also, if quantities of cards are desired of a specific sport, these can be ordered also. However, the minimum order fee is still \$5.00.

There is also a 50¢ postage and handling fee for up to 500 items-whether such items are stamps, cards, booklets or folders. For larger quantities, there are higher fees.

Foreign readers are particularly urged to obtain their requirements direct from the U.S. Postal Service. Mint cards are sold at philatelic windows in most large cities. However, cards with cancelled stamps are only available at the First Day of Issue ceremonies usually.





## TEMBAL '33

TEMBAL '83, the International Exhibition of Thematic Philately was held at the Swiss Industries Fair in Basel September 21 to 29, 1983. There were 311 adult competitive exhibitors. Altogether there were 2,048 frames, including honorary, non-competitive, competitive (adult and junior) exhibits. Each frame contained 12 pages. The lighting was at least adequate.

The medal classes included large gold, gold, large vermeil, vermeil, silver, silver-bronze and bronze. Six of the 311 adult competitive exhibits were found not to be topical; however, they were judged nevertheless and they got awards ranging from bronze to large vermeil. The non-topical exhibits were mainly postal history.

I counted 21 sport and Olympic exhibits. These were grouped with chess, scouting and hunting which are not included in the count. However, there was one exhibit on Sport and Art by Vsevelod Furman (USSR) in the History of Art group, also not included in my count of 21 and it won a silver-bronze.

The highest awards won by sport and Olympic exhibits were three golds with details as follows:

Erich Brenzikofer (Switzerland) - Play and Sport on Snow and Ice Franco Pellegrini (Italy) - In the Spirit of Olympia 1896-1906. Franco Canepa (Italy) - The Games of Paris 1924

Brenzikofer and Canepa's exhibits also won special awards.

Winning large vermeil medals were the following:

Heiko Volk (West Germany) - Olympic Games (from 1896 to1952) Edmund Messmer (West Germany) - Olympia 1896-1928 Mario Anghelopoulos (Greece) - Olympic Games Franceska Rapkin. (England) - The 1936 Olympic Games Dieter Germann (West Germany) - Olympische Spiele 1936 in Germany

Anghelopoulos also won a special award.

Vermeil awards went to:

Herbert Huber (West Germany) - Wrestling in the Mirror of Philately Jean Michel (Switzerland) - The History of Tennis Ladislav Karel (Switzerland) - Olympic Games (1896 to 1956)

Huber's exhibit won no less than three special awards. Michel and Karel got one special award each.

There were two large silver awards:

Gunter Nuyken (West Germany) - The Voyage of the Olympic Torch Bruno Hegler (West Germany) - European Championships The following won silver (small) awards:

Ernst Huhnen (West Germany) - Gymnastics
Marcel Spang (Luxembourg) - Winter Sports
Dr. Bela Simady (Hungary) - Olympic Winners from Hercules to 1932
James Bowman (USA) - Olympic Games 1936
Harry Beinart (South Africa) - Olympic Games (ancient and modern)

Silver-bronze medals went to:

Antonio Castellano (Spain) - Cycling Jan Krajmer (Czechoslovakia) - Running - King of the Athletic Disciplines

Interestingly, no Olympic or Sport exhibit won any lesser award.

The following are results in the literature class:

Soccer on Postage Stamps - by J. Santenelli (Argentina) - no award Soccer World Championships in the Mirror of Philately - L.

Lorente (Spain) - Bronze
Soccer Stamps of the World 1924-1980 - by Barbara W. de Violini

(deceased) - Bronze

Dr. Manfred Bergman (Switzerland) showed his exhibit "Les Jeux Olympiques" in the Court of Honor. He also served as president of the International Jury. TEMBAL '83 was patronized by the FIP (International Federation of Philately).

The Palmares catalog reports that TEMBAL '83 gathered the largest participation to date in a specialized international thematic exhibition.

On May 28, 1983, about 60 members and friends attended the IMOS meeting at Hotel Munchnerhof. From the USA were Jim Bowman, Bob de Violini and this writer. SPI members noted were Harry Beinart, Manfred Winternheimer, Henri Trachtenberg, and Dr. Manfred Bergman. A warm welcome was extended by IMOS president Gunter Nuyken. Also, the USA visitors were greeted by many of the IMOS members who came from Poland, Finland, France, West Germany, Greece, Switzerland and Italy and England. After the formalities, there was furious trading and much conversation in the beer hall.

I also examined the exhibit that won the Grand Prize in the competitive class: Venice (the story of a city) by Luciana Viti (Italy). The language of the exhibit was Italian, but did not detract of the almost poetic beauty and balance of the philatelic elements and superb printed narrative (typing?). The range of philatelic items included pre-adhesive stampless letters to the most modern pictorials. Many exhibits included what is called a Plan of the Collection. This is a page with an enumerated outline of the exhibit and usually listing the number of pages for each element or line in the outline.

Many of the exhibits showed creative imagination based on deep research, not only philatelic but also into the particular theme. While the inclusion of scarce and rare items probably helped

in securing a better quality award, the jury appeared to show high appreciation of creative and intelligent use of relevant inexpensive materials. Oversize covers, if necessary, were shown vertically on the album pages. I saw no pages turned horizontally.

The bourse was very large. Many dealers had their stocks arranged by topic and this was a great convenience for collectors. There was a great deal of interest in covers and cancellations.

The Swiss post office offered complete postal service including registry service with special registration marking denoting the TEMBAL station. Two different hand cancellations and a special postal card were available. Further, the special postal card was available with an illustration showing an ancient coin. Also, two official envelopes were available (with no postal franking). 23 post offices had booths offering current stamps at face value. Some also offered earlier issues and many had commemorative special cancellations honoring TEMBAL. The postal booth from Cuba also offered stamps of Nicaragua.

I distributed an SPI prospectus to nearly everyone at the IMOS meeting and everyone received a souvenir cover with an SPI cachet.

While I counted 21 exhibits listed in the catalog, apparently only 20 were shown at the exhibition and all these won medals. The omitted exhibit was that of Emmanuel Neofitos of Greece showing basketball. Perhaps it was never delivered to the exhibition.

Readers may find the TEMBAL catalogs very useful references. Among other things, the complete addresses of the dealers are included. Also, those interested in communicating with exhibitors could write to the TEMBAL Organizing Committee, Inselstrasse 51, 4057 Basel, Switzerland. Appropriate postage or an international reply coupon would be a proper courtesy.

A snack bar and a restaurant were on the exhibition premises. Many tables, chairs and benches were scattered throughout the hall for the convenience of everyone. The only convenience that I found lacking was water fountains.

David Feldman S. A., Case Postale 81, 1213 Onex, Geneva, Switzerland, an auction house featured a catalog for a mail auction sale devoted exclusively to Olympic Games and Thematics. The closing date of the sale is July 14, 1983. However, this auction house regularly features many outstanding Olympic and sport lots and interested readers should be sure to receive the catalogs regularly. I was able to examine the lots in the July 14 mail sale. I learned that the condition of "fine" is actually for average condition material. For example, one postal card was noted to be addressed and with spotting, although it was not postally used; it is described as fine in the catalog and no mention is made that it is addressed and unused. Also, many lots do not mention the quality of cancellations in the descriptions. Readers may protect themselves by requesting photocopies or perhaps stipulating their condition requirements in the bidding. I noted a few lots of questionable authenticity. However, the auction house offers the usual protection to the buyer who will seek expertization at the buyer's expense.

The Feldman auction house is offering some top-notch Olympic material lately. Its April 1983 auction catalog listed listed 488 lots of often incredible material. This is mainly material from the estate of Salvatore Caruso. Allegedly, only one-third of his collection was in this auction and more will be offered in the Fall.

I also met Heiko Volk, an exhibitor, whose father is Otto Volk, a recent advertiser in JSP. Heiko explained that a specialized and well-illustrated Olympic catalog is published every six weeks. Emphasis is on covers and many vignettes are included. There is a miniauction. Otto Volk will accept consignments of better material and I know of one collector who has built up a credit in order to purchase material he needs. The Volk catalog includes explanations in English and the firm can handle inquiries in English with no problem. Heiko also works for his father. The International Exhibition of Thematic Philately held in Basel, Switzerland May 21-29 included many sports and Olympic-related exhibits of outstanding quality. The competitive exhibits (excluding literature and non-competitive items) comprised approximately 2,000 frames of 12 pages each, of which 137 frames were sports related.

SPI members receiving medals include: Heiko Volk (large vermeil), and Harry Beinart, James Bowman and Donald Beuthal (all silver). Donald Beuthal's theme was Computers. In a separate article, Sherwin Podolsky lists all the sport and Olympic exhibits and details.

I had the pleasure of taking two worthwhile side trips relating to the Olympic collecting field. The first was a trip to the Olympic Museum in Lausanne, Switzerland which is a <u>must</u> for Olympic collectors. Not only are the exhibits worthwhile, but the library that occupies the second floor has an unbelievable wealth of material relating to all facets of Olympics and sports.

The second side trip was to the Odenwald in Germany to visit relatives who fortunately happen to live about a 45- minute drive from Erbach/Odenwald where Otto Volk Briefmarken is located. The Volk firm specializes in Olympics and sports-related materials. During a very enjoyable visit with SPI member Heiko Volk I had the opportunity to view a portion of his personal collection of the 1936 Olympics.

As a final observation relative to TEMBAL, I strongly recommend that one should attempt to see at least one International Thematic event as an exhibitor or as an observer. It is a unique opportunity for us who exhibit to view the many techniques of presentation and writeups that are used. The German and Swiss exhibitors are particularly skillful in this respect. These two countries accounted for approximately 30 per cent of the TEMBAL awards.

## FOPU

The minutes of the executive board meeting of the International Federation of Olympic Philately at the headquarters of the International Olympic Committee at Lausanne, Switzerland on May 25, 1983 are at hand. The president of FIPO is Juan Antonio Samaranch who is also president of the IOC. Twelve persons attended the meeting including Sherwin Podolsky and Robert de Violini. A. Sekimoto (Japan) and Michel Pecquet (France) who are SPI members also attended.

An attractive and colorful emblem for FIPO was approved. It features the Olympic rings in an informal arrangement of perforated stamps.

While it appears that applications for 19 members were available for review in the advance papers furnished to the board, 23 persons apparently were approved for membership. Only 4 of these persons reside in the USA. This is due, however, to belated publicity as to the availability of the membership application forms in the USA and through SPI.

A decision about subscription fees will be made by the President in 1984. Citizens or residents of a country without a National Olympic Committee recognized by the International Olympic Committee may be members of FIPO.

The National Olympic Committee of Italy (CONI) is making an office available in Rome for the use of FIPO. Secretary functions are now being assumed by Maurizio Tecardi. Thus persons wishing to join FIPO may request application forms from:

Mr. Maurizio Tecardi General Secretariat International Federation of Olympic Philately c/o CONI Foro Italico Rome, Italy

Mr. Tecardi will send the rules of the Federation and a questionnaire to those requesting. Mr. Tecardi is taking over the functions of Mr. Sabelli Fioretti who is currently indisposed.

Mr. Samaranch expressed the wish to meet the president of the International Federation of Olympic Philately for the purpose of establishing relationships. Mr. Vidal Torrens was to convey this desire.

Mr. Vidal Torrens is collaborating with Mr. Soler Vila on developing a catalog of Olympic stamps. The members of the executive board are to receive the text of the catalog for study chapter by chapter. The catalog will be in color and probably published in Spain. Mr. Vidal Torrens has long experience in publishing sport stamp catalogs.

The board decided that an international exhibition of Olympic philately would be held in Lausanne for about ten days in November, 1984. The exhibition would be competitive with prizes.

The idea of a FIPO label or vignette was approved and a designer

will be asked to produce a final model.

Mr. Samaranch has asked for an Olympic philately section be opened at the library of the Olympic Museum in Lausanne. Mr. Pecquet agreed to take charge of the organization of this section. The IOC is negotiating to acquire the philatelic Olympic library of Mr. Sabelli Fioretti which would add a significant basis to the library.

It was agreed that a card index file on FIPO members be established.

The Olympic exhibition at the Olympic Games in Los Angeles was discussed. This will be open from July 25 to August 12, 1984 at the Pasadena Center, Pasadena, California. Hours will be from 8 AM to 7 PM. Procedures to ensure a balanced, largely non-duplicative variety of exhibits were discussed. FIPO recognition of the participants at the exhibition was discussed.

It was agreed that a restricted meeting will be held on December 6, 1983 at 4 PM at the Chateau de Vidy, headquarters of the IOC.



### President's Message

We now have two volunteer typists, George Scheffel of Concord, CA and Richard Zelachowski of North Arlington, NJ. They have been working on some assignments to retype drafts for our Journal and we hope to have them in print within the next several months.

However, I am always interested in hearing from those who would like to help out in some way. I would like to see people take charge of a special publicity project to seek publicity for SPI in non-philatelic athletic and sport journals. Specifically, we are looking for persons who will prepare articles for the journals. I have in mind a rather general article based on SPI's prospectus which accompanies the membership application form. The prospectus is a good overview of SPI's functions and services. An adaptation of the prospectus into an article format plus interesting illustrations that relate to the journal's sport subjects might be suitable.

Needless to say, we need to establish rapport with the editor of such journal to know whether our project would be feasible and acceptable.

In any case, the article should end up with referral to SPI's membership director, Margaret A. Jones, 3715 Ashford-Dunwoody Road N.E., Atlanta, GA 30319 for membership information. Without such a referral, the whole point of the publicity is lost.

I would be happy to assist members willing to develop and draft articles for one or more non-philatelic sport and athletic journals. I can proofread, offer suggestions, assist in promotion, provide cover letters on behalf of SPI as appropriate. At first I thought I would develop a general article myself, but find the task a bit overwhelming. Some SPI members might have more expertise in certain sports than I can offer. Or they might be in a better position to promote articles and see that they get published.

We are looking into expanding the size of JSP to provide more article content. Editor John Ia Porta hopes to start with the September-Oct. issue.

Efforts to improve the attractiveness of SPI's award certificates are continuing.



### LETS POOL OUR OLYMPIC AND SPORTS KNOWLEDGE

A-89 Modern County Cricket is generally recognized from 1873 when the Marylebone Cricket Club first laid down rules governing qualification. During the next five years Gloucestershire won championships three times. A large part of their success was due to the Grace brothers - E.M., W.G. and G.F.

In the early form of Cricket the ball was bowled underhanded and bats were shaped like hockey sticks. By the mid 1800's overhead bowling became legal.

The illustrations pictured on the British May 16, 1973 issue commemorating the centenary of County Cricket (Scott 694-696) are sketches of W.G.Grace by Harry Furniss.

William Gilbert Grace was born on July 18,1848 in Downend, England. He and his brothers joined in local matches at an early age. W.G. was selected to play in 1865 for the Gentlemen vs. the Players both at the Kennington Oval and at Lords. He was famous chiefly as a batsman but he was equally adapt as a bowler and fieldsman.

In July 1872, as a member of the Gloucestershire Eleven, he competed successfully against Yorkshire, a rivalry which continued until 1875 when he reached the zenith of his form. He was known to the public as "W.G." and his burley figure and thick black beard was familiar to Cricket enthusiasts.

W.G. Grace also represented Great Britain in International test matches against Australia. Grace's last test match was at Nuttingham in 1899.

During his forty-three year career he made 126 centuries, scored 54,896 runs and had taken 2,896 wickets.

W.G. Grace died at Eltham, England on October 23,1915.

### OLYMPIC AIRPOST COVERS

OLYMPIA-LUFTPOST by Gunter Sauer. In two parts, soft covers, 96 pages. Published by Philatelistenverband im Kulturbund der DDR, Zentraler Arbeitskreis Luftpost, DDR-6902 Jena-Lobeda, PSF 140. Author: Gunter Sauer, Heinestr. 77, DDR-1297 Zepernick, East Germany. No price stated. Published 1982.

The first Olympic flight covers listed are the Zeppelin flights of the 1936 Olympic Games. The second is the airletter for London 1948 Olympic Games, although no special flight is known. A cursory review indicates that Olympic flight material exists for every Summer and Winter Olympics since then. The work continues through 1980 Moscow. While many covers are illustrated, it is the special cancellations and special rubberstamp cachets (called Nebenstempel in German) that are the primary illustrated material.

A point value system is included on a loose card. The point range is from 3 to 200 points, except that the 1936 Zeppelin Olympic Flight covers are not valued at all. In my opinion, one point is probably US\$0.20. But some covers would seem to work out much higher.

The author has his own numbering system with everything numbered consecutively with the last, Number 199 for the US postal stationery for the Moscow 1980 Olympics. However, there are varieties, most of which are given sub-classifications.


This is a very useful and long-needed reference. Olympic flight covers of specific airlines are listed. The Rocket Post covers for Squaw Valley, 1960 are listed.

I have the feeling that readers may find unlisted items and possibly errors in this relatively new work in an area not previously so comprehensively documented. It should be noted that the numbering system for the cancellations and rubberstamp cancellations does not coincide with the numbering system for the covers; these are two different numbering systems.


Illustrations are all clear and quite satisfactory. Recommended.

## -OLYMPIC NOTES-

### by SHERWIN PODOLSKY

OLYMPIC PROGRAMS. There is an interesting specialty sideline to Olympic collecting: matching postmark dates with Olympic events. If you are fortunate to have, for example, a cover with an Olympic slogan postmark dated during the Games, you can try to find out what event occurred on that day and dress up your album or exhibit page with a stamp illustrating the event. The stamp may or may not have a design from a set issued for the particular Olympiad.

You can use a stamp illustrating the event from a set of stamps for another Olympiad or perhaps even from a non-host country for the same or another Olympiad. The justification for this is that topical collecting places emphasis on the subject matter of the stamp, the design on the stamp.

I have seen this technique used at ROMOLYMPHIL '82 and used it successfully at a competitive stamp exhibition with APS-accredited judges.

I carried this idea a bit further. For example, I used a 1932 naval Olympic cover with an Olympic slogan cancel that was postmarked on a day on which boxing events were held. The exhibit page showed this cover with various stamps showing boxing themes both modern and ancient. The modern stamps showed boxers with gloves and the write-up pointed out that the use of gloves was mainly a modern development. Space did not allow explaining the use of leather thongs sometimes with metal studs in ancient times.

Write-ups can even go further and refer to mythological Olympic themes, many of which are beautifully shown on many Greek stamps. This allows use of specialist varieties such as proofs and essays and stamp errors which count toward philatelic knowledge.

So, with imagination and a wider choice of material, the Olympic exhibitor and collector can develop write-ups and arrangements that do not have to follow the rigidity of Olympic reference catalogs.

This is the reason why I have separately set forth the general program for one Olympiad: Los Angeles 1932. The idea can be extended to any Olympiad. I hope I can persuade collectors and readers having programs of other Olympiads to share this information and publish it in JSP.


