INTER-ALLIED GAMES of 1919 Pershing Stadium, Paris June 22 through July 6th

Edited and supplemented by George A. Scheffel

A recent letter to SPI from Joe T. Holten of Corpus Christie, Texas referring to the Inter-Allied Games of 1919, prompted further research of this little known athletic event.

Mr. Holten was a member of the A. E. F. during World War I and at its conclusion in 1918, spent some time in France awaiting his return to the United States. While there he spent a weekend in Paris. His letter included details of the Fourth of July spent at the Games. The Games were preceded in the morning by a parade and review of a select group of American and French troops. They were reviewed by President Poincare, Premier Clemenceau and General Pershing.

Over 25,000 turned out in the aftermoon to see the Games. There was a parade of the athletes before the events began. At one time in the arena these events were going on simultaneously: a boxing bout, pole vault, high jump, a sabre contest, a baseball game, 600 meter dash, while overhead soared airplanes of various types, of five or six nations. The Grand Finale was a display of fireworks and a concert by the combined General Headquarters and Marine Bands.

Nearly 1500 athletes representing eighteen nations or dominions participated in fifteen major sporting divisions covering over 100 events. The major sports were Baseball, Basketball, Boxing, Equitation, Fencing, Football (Soccer and Rugby), Golf, Rowing, Shooting, Swimming, Tennis, Track and Field, Tug-of-War, Wrestling and Mass Games.

The athletes were from Australia, Belgium, British Army of the Rhine, Canada, Czechoslovakia, England, France, Greece, Guatemala, Hedjaz, Italy, Newfoundland, New Zealand, Poland, Roumania, Serbia and the United States.

The Games were open to all members of the Allied Armed Forces. The rules read that each nation participating may enter any officer, non-commissioned officer or private soldier, who has at anytime between 4th August 1914 and 11 November 1918, been a member of the military forces of that nation. The Amateur-Prof essional question, which on other occasions has created great problems, was not raised.

A series of trials and contests were held at the various army units to find the best individuals and teams to represent the United States in the Games. Meanwhile, at the invitation of the A. E. F. Headquarters Commander, other Allied nations were preparing their teams.

Publicity for the Games was handled by the Games Committee and consisted of the printing of 500,000 tickets for the fifteen days of events. These were distributed to members of the A. E. F. and to the Allies along with the invitations to participate. There was no charge, the tickets were free, although there was a special section reserved for dignitaries. 1000 posters in color were placed on billboards in Paris and nearby areas and 1000 placards of the same design were placed in shop windows and hotels. Thousands of folders with maps and directions to the stadium were also available at these locations.(Fig.4)

The items of most interest to collectors were post cards, a replica of the posters, which were printed in French and English, as were the programs and other items relating to the Games. 100,000 of these were given away free at various locations and at the Games. The art work, which was the same as the posters and placards, was done by First Lieutenant J. H. Dulin, F. A. At present there is no known philatelic commemoration. That is not to say none exists, but a member of S. P. I. has both, postally used and unused copies of the card. (Fig. 1 & 2)

As a result of all this publicity, one source says that almost 90,000 showed up for the Opening Day Ceremonies. It was apparent, that although the 1916 Olympic Games were cancelled because of the Great War, interest in sporting events resumed with the coming of Peace.

A number of competitors who appeared in the 1919 Games also appeared in the 1920 Olympics and at least one had been in the 1912 Olympics at Stockholm. One American who should be familiar to old time New Yorkers was Eddie Eagan who won the middleweight title in boxing at the 1919 Games and the light heavyweight medal at the 1920 Olympics at Antwerp. In 1932 he won another gold medal at Lake Placid, New York as a member of the United States 4 man bobsled in the Winter Olympics. He was active for many years as a fund raiser for the United States Olympic Committee and later was Chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission.

Trophies, medals and diplomas were awarded for the events. The Inter-Allied Medal was given winners, second and third places, and to members of winning teams. The medal was bronze and was designed by. F. Fraisse. It depicted the Goddess of Victory awarding laurel wreaths to ancient Greek Olympic Athletes. The reverse side indicated the place of finish, event and athlete's name. Winners of all principal sports also received gold or silver medals of the French Ministry of War. Trophies were donated by prominent officials of the competing nations, among whom were President Wilson, President Poincare, General Pershing,

King Victor Emanuelle of Italy, King Albert of Belgium and others. President Wilson's trophy can well be considered the principal one. It was a bronze by the classic sculptor, Lanson and represents the successful return of Jason, after his heroic quest for the Golden Fleece. It was awarded for Track and Field events. (Fig. 3)

Much of the credit for the setting up of these Games must go to Elwood S. Brown whose idea started it all. Earlier Mr. Brown had been in the Philippine Islands as a YMCA Physical Director, where he began a series of sporting events for Filipino and American personnel stationed at United States bases there. He was so successful that these events eventually became the Far Eastern Games, which are still being held, but are now known as the Asian Games. (See Olympic Notes in the Journal of Sports Philately of September/October 1982) In 1918 he came to Europe to work with the Allied troops for the YMCA, and through his efforts the 1919 Games came to be.

On October 18, 1918 he wrote to General Headquarters of the A. E. F. and outlined a plan for a "great set of military Olympic Games" open only to soldiers of the Allied Armies. Since the war was still on, no action could be taken at that time. Brown followed up his first memo with another on November 27, 1918, after the Armistice, reminding them of his continued interest in his original suggestion.

From this beginning came the Inter-Allied Games of 1919 held at Pershing Stadium, Joinville-le-Pont, Paris. The stadium was especially built for the occasion by the YMCA and presented to the A. E. F. and turned over to France at the conclusion of the Games.

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THINGS TO SEND FOR

The October One, 1983 issue of FIRST DAYS, magazine of the American First Day Cover Society, is a special one devoted to sports and Olympic material. There are 150 pages in this fat issue, very well printed and amply illustrated. There is loads of advertising suggesting intriguing sources of supply. Most of the articles deal with baseball, but there are some dealing with Olympics, cricket, and a smattering of other sports. Copies of the issue are \$2 each. Write to AFDCS SALES, 146-17 Delaware Ave., Flushing, NY 11355. One afterthought: an index of all sports articles appearing in FIRST DAYS is included. The classification is by US stamps related to sports, including postal stationery, and articles related to foreign material and of general interest are also reported. I count no less than 24 articles on 1932 Olympic FDCs alone, three of them by Sherwin Podolsky and one by Glenn Estus.

Carol Gordon issues possibly the most attractive FDCs for the US 1984 Olympic issues. The unifying theme among all her designs is the ancient Olympic sports. Her covers are about European-size to do justice and provide balance. There is a text on the reverse giving a bit of history. Send her a stamped, long envelope with your address. Overseas readers can send two IRCs. Write Carol Gordon Cachets, 2803 Ocean Park Blvd., Suite 261, Santa Monica, CA. 90405. She also obtains unusual cancellations on some of her FDCs.

The International Olympic Committee, Chateau de Vidy, 1007 Lausanne, Switzerland sells 8 different multicolored and attractive picture postcards at 1 Swiss franc each. Subjects include: 1896 poster, 1900 Paris featuring female fencer in most unusual uniform, 1904 St. Louis program, 1908 London program, IOC headquarters, abstract showing Olympic rings, nude male runners, and nude figures walking.

As official suppliers of the 1984 Summer Olympics make themselves known in national advertising, collectors should write to their local offices and inquire about labels and slogan meters. United Air Lines, Fuji Film and the Southland Corporation (sponsors of 7-11 convenience stores) already have slogan meters and the latter two also have self-stick labels. Remember, postally used covers with meters showing proper potage rates are by far more desirable (and exhibitable) than souvenir impressions with "00" values. The latter are not to be shunned, though, but those with denominations other than "00" are preferred. Find out also if meter tape impressions are available. Try to get duplicates for trading. If you have access to discarded envelopes from business mail, these can also be a good source. Alert your relatives and friends to your interests and show them how to save the envelopes in good condition for you. If the recipient wants to open the mail, I prefer a neat scissors cut along the edge at the short end that does the least damage to the cachet (if any), letterhead or meter impression. Usually this is the left side. However, any condition is better than none, until you have plenty of duplicates.

Also, some of the sponsors may have special promotions with an Olympic tie-in that may generate a response to you in an envelope with the desired meter slogan. Even if the promotions may be directed to persons not in your age or sex group, consider entering. Try not to miss any opportunity. I know of no dealer that is going out for this material, so we are on our own. If you can pursue at a steady pace, it will not be so overwhelming later.

Do not be discouraged by size of the envelopes you get. Usually these are going to be #10 size envelopes or larger. The letterhead on the envelope is important to identify the user of the particular slogan meter. I recommend retaining the entire envelope unfolded. Eventually we hope to catalog all the meters and labels. And if any sponsors have interesting cachets or commemorative letterheads, that is more interesting for us to know about.

We have to orient ourselves to a commercially sponsored Olympic Games for 1984. Government sponsorship is nearly zero. So, the philatelic aspects are going to be heavily commercial.







THE STORY OF THE OLYMPIC GAMES

The story of the Olympic Games goes back beyond recorded history but it is believed they originated as festivals to commemorate the legendary wrestling bout between two Greek gods, Zeus and Kronos, for possession of the earth. The festivals were staged at Olympia in south-western Greece. The first festival of which records were

first festival of which records were kept was held in 776 B.C., after which the games were properly organised and held every four years.

With the decline of Greece, the Olympics were transferred to Rome where they degenerated into noisy carnivals. This resulted in Emperor Theodosius I placing a complete ban on the games in 394 A.D.

The Olympics remained under a cloud for more than 1500 years until the latter part of the 19th Century when a Frenchman, Baron Pierre de Courbertin, campaigned vigorously for their revival on the grounds that they would pramote friendship and peace between nations.

The Baron's campaign succeeded and the first modern Olympic Games were staged in Athens in 1896. Since then the Games have been staged every four years, except for the periods of the two world wars.

FIPO TO JOIN FIP

Following an invitation from His Excellency Mr. Juan Antonio Samaranch, president of the International Olympic Committee, Mr. Ladislav Dvoracek, president of the International Federation of Philatelic (FIP), visited the IOC headquarters at Lausanne, Switzerland on September 7, 1983. The two presidents agreed to establish permanent cooperation between their two organizations.

A protocol for ratification by both organizations will be prepared in the coming months. A working group will study and develop draft rules for competitive international exhibitions of Olympic and sports philately. These rules may be in force at the OLYMPHILEX '84 exhibition which the International Federation of Olympic Philately (FIPO) is planning to stage at Lausanne late next year.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I have now developed a 'generic' article promoting sport and Olympic philately and also SPI that may be published in any sport or Olympic non-philatelic magazine. The article only lacks illustrative material.

Ideally, items should be illustrated that are relevant to the organization publishing the article. I do not claim to have always suitable material in my own collection that could be used for illustration.

If any SPI members are also affiliated with a sport or Olympic organization publishing its own, they might like to consider using the article in that organization's magazine. Or, perhaps such members might like to adapt the article to make it more relevant for the purpose. There is plenty of room for flexibility and items for illustration do not necessarily have to come from my collection.

Interested members should write me for a copy of the 'generic' publicity article and we can discuss further the possibilities. Indeed, members wishing to develop their own articles along the same lines are highly encouraged to do so.

This is an excellent way to reach collectors and potential collectors outside organized philately and expand SPI membership and goals. There are many mutual benefits in sports and philately. We need only to see the keen interest of the International Olympic Committee in its promotion of the International Federation of Olympic Philately to see the educational and friendship values.

EXHIBITING AT SESCAL '83

There were four sport and Olympic exhibits at SESCAL held at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles in October, 1983. This compares with only three last year. The four are:

The Ancient Olympic Games by Eileen L. Meier - no award, 2 frames Gold Rush at Lake Placid by Wesley Smith - bronze, 5 frames 1936 Olympische Spiele - James A. Bowman - silver, 6 frames Gymnastics in Philately - E. C. Gustafson - bronze, 4 frames

In my opinion, the awards did reflect fairly the scale of quality—the best award going to Bowman's exhibit. Eileen Meier's exhibit which has done very well in East Coast exhibits was severely cut back to only two frames and seemed only an appetizer. However, it was her choice to show only two frames according to what she had written to me.

For 1980 Lake Placid Olympics, Wesley Smith's presentation was excellent, I thought, with practically all known varieties flawlessly written up and attractively presented. There were three pages at the end of references and bibliography, which might have been thought excessive in an exhibit and more appropriate in a book. The two perf varieties of the stamps were shown and I would think all the stamp show pictorial cancels were there, too. The cancel types were accurately described. A misperf of the stamp issue had a touch of uniqueness in such a modern exhibit. About the only things possibly missing might be the meters and more commercial usages. There were too many souvenir-type covers. I felt the exhibit deserved a silver considering the recentness and yet near completeness.

Gustafson's exhibit was methodically classified in his subject matter and showed very little variety in his philatelic materials which were basically the regular stamps and just a few covers. His topical knowledge was powerful, but the philatelic knowledge seemed basic and sparse.

What did the judges have to say at the judge's critique which I attended? Well, they were brutally frank and it was repeated more than once that at exhibits you are exhibiting for the judges. Think about that—you are not exhibiting for the public or yourself when you are out for an award. Here are some notes I made as they were commenting (or ripping apart) some of the exhibits:

- four covers on one page is too much.
- the more interesting material should be in the first frame; don'thave a weak first frame and expect the remaining strong frames to pull your exhibit out very far.
 - multiples are a nice break in an exhibit showing consistently single items otherwise. This was restated a number of times.
 - varieties in usages would add a useful dimension in many exhi-
 - economy of words is vital. The top thematic exhibit "The "Elephant" used only two lines to describe something. Thus, some items at the top would get two lines, another at bottom would get two lines. Total 4 lines on the whole page. In a few instances, at the most there would be four lines used. The judges say to take a second look later at what you write.

The SESCAL judges stated fearlessly that they look for rare items and difficulty of acquisition in all the exhibits. This was an emphasis that was also stated by a mostly different jury last year when I attended also the critique.

The judges criticized too many picture postcards, "too many pictures" that downplay the philatelic material. Showiness distracts from the philately in an exhibit showing too many postcards, even though much of it is postal stationery, they seemed to say.

Wesley Smith accused the judges of discriminating against the modern exhibit, a point that I indirectly supported in my questioning.

If you ever have opportunity to attend judges' critiques, don't miss it. You will never fail to be enlightened and stimulated.



HENRI TRACHTENBERG

by Sherwin Podolsky

(Author's note: When I read that an East Coast auction house was handling Trachtenberg's Olympic collection and that it was for sale, I wrote Henri for information about himself and collecting. He is a long-time member and advertiser in JSP as a well-known dealer. Henri answered promptly. The following is his response with little editing.)

"You must know that I am amongst the pioneers of sport collecting. I started collecting this topical in 1950. Immediately I issued a pocket catalog containing all the issues of sport. I have continued to publish this catalog and the latest one is dated 1982-83.

"I transferred my hobby to Olympics in the earliest stage by purchasing the 1896 Greek Olympic set never hinged for only a few dollars. Since then, the rarest Olympic items have passed through my hands. Now and then I added a rare item to my own collection. Thus, in it you will find the complete 1896 set on a sheet with the first day cancellation of 25 March 1896.

"But my favorite collection was France, I mean the French Olympics and especially the 1924 issue with all the varieties and different cancellations. These are extremely rare and some of them, in spite of all the clamor, are known only in a very limited quantity --ten pieces. As to the imperforated set, only two complete sets are known until now.

"I have never exhibited my collection, as I did not want to be disloyal to my clients. My collection was only known to a few collectors like Dr. Manfred Bergman and the late Salvatore Caruso. They have both been my very important clients. Already, Dr. Bergman's collection has received several large gold medals.

"My reason for selling is because of age. I have had too many collections and no time for rest. So now I am enjoying a little free time which I can spend at my own leisure. I have not given up my interest in Olympics, and, if I find an interesting item, I shall always buy it for the pleasure of having it and offering it for the pleasure of another collector.

"My first and principal specialty was airmail collecting, and especially the pioneer flights. This is what made me go over to sport collecting, because I considered the first pioneer events to be sporting events.

"My references, among many others, include: member of all the airmail societies; president of the French International Airmail Club; founder member of the Federation Internationale des Societies Aerophilateliques; corresponding member of the Belgian Philatelic Academy; former general secretary of the International Association of Philatelic Journalists; secretary-general of the International Association of Philatelic Experts.

"As part of the article, I send a photograph of the four imperforated values of the French 1924 Olympic set. These were authenticated by me in 1981. Later, I will send, at first opportunity a specialized article on Olympics, probably 1924."









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1980 MOSCOW NEBENSTEMPEL

by Sherwin Podolsky

The Germans have a word that doesn't quite have a counterpart in English. "Nebenstempel" means "next to the cancel or postmark." Perhaps the word in English philately that comes closest is "cachet." But "cachet," too, has several uses. Here I mean to use it to note postal rubberstamp cachets that really don't give you the date of posting.

Russian polar ship covers have appeared with cachets that contain logo for the 1980 Moscow Olympics. Here are five that have shown up:

Figure 1 Cover addressed to Russell E. Ott with two stamps. The postmark is dated January 6, 1980 and features three penguins below the date bridge. Around the circumference reads: Soviet Antarctic Expedition Malyugin. At upper left is a round, double ring cachet featuring: ship in the background, penguin, the Olympic mascot Mishka. Between the animals is the tower logo for Moscow 1980 Olympics and below it are the three Olympic rings containing letters and numbers which refer to the 25th anniversary of Soviet AntarcticExpedition. The circumference refers to the Antarctic soviet ship Bashkiriya. All postal markings are black.

At lower left is an oval cachet featuring Olympic rings, Mishka on water skis being pulled by dolphins.

- Figure 2 Cover addressed to Ott. Stamps are postmarked by the same Malyugin postmark and date appears to be June 14, 1980. The large cachet at left contains Olympic logo, penguin on map of Antarctica, plane, ship and snow tractor. The ship name is at top and next is wording commemorating the 25th anniversary of Soviet Antarctic explorations. Postal markings in black.
- Figure 3 Addressed to Odessa, postmarked November 30, 1980 from ship Bellinghausen. At upper left is a television-style rubberstamp. Inside the screen is the Moscow Olympic logo at upper left, explorer waving in foreground and housing with flag on pole above it. Wording around the TV design refers to Vostok station, and 25th anniversary of Soviet Antarcitic exploration.

At lower left is a large red cachet entirely in English. At top is the year 1980, then "YEAR OF MOSCOW OLYMPICS/STANFORD UNIVERSITY PROGRAM ENDS AT VOSTOK STATION." Then there is a map of Antarctica with the Vostok polar station marked by a star and the Russian name.

At lower right are two black rubberstamp cachets. The double ring round-circular one shows a ship and has in English around the circumference: BLACK SEA SHIPPING COMPANY/M.S. BASHKIRIA. The oval type cachet has no reference to the Olympics, but refers to Vostok, 25th anniversary and has the name M.S. BASHKIRIA.

Figure 1 has two relevant Olympic cachets. Figure 2 has one and Figure 3 has two. They are all different.

Winternheimer's catalog of 1980 Moscow Olympic cancels and Nebenstempel doesn't mentions these polar Olympic cachets. In fact, when I met him at TEMBAL '83 at the IMOS meeting on May 28, I asked him about them and he did not seem to know anything about them.

I made a number of inquiries to Russian and polar specialists in the USA. All say these are scarce, but not rare and the general range of worth per cover is from \$3 to \$10 each, with the tendency at the lower end of the scale. The Soviet monopoly on its philatelic material is fickle and nearly always supplies eventually show up plentifully. Still, it wasn't easy to locate this material.

Do any readers have similar covers or cachets not reported here? Do any readers know good sources of supply?

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


