Australia Post Slogan Postmarks

In 1978, Brisbane, Australia was elected as the next host of the Commonwealth Games. This was the third occasion that the games had been held in Australia. The previous two meetings were held at Sidney (1938) and Perth (1962).

To mark the event, Australia Post has issued several postal items such as stamps, covers, aerograme, souvenir packs, meters and postmarks.

Postal slogan cancels were the earliest material issued by Australia Post to celebrate the games. The 1st series of slogans was used by the Queensland Post Offices on 11 August 1980. The last slogan to appear on a letter was in fleptember 1982.

The rest of the Australian States used the games slogans in 1982 and they were generally covered only Mail Exchanges in capital cities.

A summary of the postal slogan cancels is given in the following pages. Any corrections to the Mail Centre name and Post Code will be most welcome. Lim Lik, 18 Jalan SS21/56A, Petaling Jaya, Selangar, Malaysia.





LETS POOL OUR OLYMPIC AND SPORTS KNOWLEDGE

A- 96 Not receiving any member response concerning the stamp issues of Japan's National Athletic Festival your editor found information about the National Athletic Meet series in "Japanese Philately", No. 214, April 1978, Volume 33, No. 2.

The first NAM (National Athletic Meet) was held in 1946 but was not commemorated by a stamp issue. Since 1947 a stamp issue has publicized every NAM which are held in a different prefecture each year in three different stages: Winter, Summer and Fall. The 'Winter' celebration usually includes skating in

January and skiing in February. Although labeled the "Summer" stage, these water sports celebrations are usually held in September. The largest of the three stages, the "Fall" stage, is almost always contested in October but it was held in August 1954(because of the early winters of the Hokkaido prefecture) and in June 1964 (due to the fact that the Olympic games were held in Japan in October.)

The first stamp issue in 1947 (Scott 397-400), a set of four, commemorated the "Fall"stage of the 2nd. Athletic Meet held in Kanazawa, Oct. 30 to Nov. 3. In 1948 there was one swimming stamp (Scott 417) which commemmorated the summer swimming events held at Yawata Sept 16 to 19 and four "Fall" stamps (Scott 418-21) to mark the Oct. 29-Nov. 3 Fukuoka field events. The number of stamps increased to seven in 1949 when two (Scott 444-445) were issued for the "Winter" events of the 4th National Athletic Meet (skating at Suwa Jan. 27-30 and skiing at Sapporo March 3-6) one for the "Summer" swimming events held at Yokohama Sept.15-18 (Scott 469) and the remaining set (Scott 470-473) for the Oct. 30 "Fall" events at Tokyo. Starting in 1950 the stamps were confined to honoring the "Fall" events only and the number was cut from four to two stamps in 1951 and from two to one in 1967. The single stamp policy has continued to the present time.

In addition to these stamp issues, Japan issued two postal cards for the 'Winter" stage each year from 1969 through 1974 and a single card to honor the "Summer" stage from 1969 to 1973. In 1973 a special "Spring" NAM, celebrating the reversion of Okinawa to Japanese control, was also marked by a postal card.

XXIIIrd OLYMPIAD The Postmark Panic

Instant Philately! That was what the public was doing at the Olympics! Anything postmarked on a handback basis was nearly as popular as pin trading. The \$20 "Golden Moments" book sold at the US Postal Service stations proved to be extremely popular. It contained all the Olympic postal emissions including stationery.

So, naturally, the people, who had been subliminally lulled by heavy USPS advertising in the press and on TV were eager buyers of all kinds of Olympic philatelic products--mainly the stamps, stationery, maximum cards and the book.

The postal stations did not keep the usual 9 AM to 5 PM hours. They usually opened a few hours before an event and were often closed for one hour for lunch. And the lines! Cancellation tables were set up outside. Clerks applied two versions of the black cancellation upon request. Some clerks insisted only on applying the cancel to a stamp, but others didn't care and would even cancel your hand.

If you wanted anything else from the USPS, you had to go to one of the postal stations -- usually a standing building with air conditioning, but sometimes a long bus with only two windows for service.

The only stamps on sale were all the Olympic issues and the Jim Thorpe and Babe Ruth .20 issues. There were no other denominations. Philatelists quickly discovered a commemorative postal meter usually operable at every venue. Obviously, the flexible meter could be set for any denomination desired. Only tapes were available to be stuck on the letter or package.

The OLYMPHILEX '84 postal venue was inside the the Pasadena Center Conference Building (much like a philatelic booth at a stamp show). On the first day, some 30 letters got out with meters dated June 25 instead of July 25. Collectors quickly got the idea to make covers with .13 Olympic stamps and request a .07 meter for the domestic first class rate of .20. Other combinations were possible--such as a .35 Olympic airmail with a .05 meter for the overseas .40 airmail rate. Some covers were sent insured. registered, certified mail or special delivery using combinations of Olympic stamps and meters.

Unfortunately, the supervisor at the OLYMPHILEX '84 postal station did not like the idea of selling the meters so cheap. She decreed a flat \$1 minimum. Later the meter was put out of service allegedly because of "abuse." Complaints to the headquarters of the U.S. Olympic program at Long Beach lead to restoration of meter service at Pasadena.

But sparks were flying at the Coliseum, too! Meter service was refused. In fact, one day I plopped about 20 covers at one of the three postal stations and clerk bugged out, refused me service and

when I refused to leave, simply put a "Closed" sign at his counter and left. Words were very, very heavy and finally I persuaded the supervisor to call Mr. Nesland at Long Beach. After a half-hour wait, another supervisor entered and ordered a clerk to give me complete service.

But the ultimate panic took place at the Coliseum on closing day, August 12! There were the usual three tables outdoors for the special cancels in black. Each table had two clerks. Each clerk had a line at least 100 feet long taking at least a 3-hour wait!

The lines at each of the postal stations (where the book, stamps, meters and other special service were available) was another 1 to 2 hour wait! Since these stations opened at 1 PM, Conrad Klinkner waited a total of 5 hours to service all his covers. I had arrived at 3 PM that afternoon, but did not complete my tasks until 7 PM, just in time to rush into the Coliseum to catch the closing ceremonies beginning.

My approach was to have all my covers and cards prepared in advance. The only things I needed were to have the black cancels applied first and then go inside the station to get the meters and double ring circular (registry type) cancels applied to tie the meter to the covers. The black cancels were never available inside the postal stations.

Meter service was refused the first day at the Pentathlon station. But Conrad Klinkner was finally able to persuade the postal people there on the second day to give him meter service.

The same postal stations were used for Opening Day, Closing Day, boxing and athletics cancellations. Thus, the same three meter machines, one in each station, can have meter numbers for all three special cancels.

In my opinion, the ideal way to show an Olympic meter cover for the XXIIrd Olympiad is as follows:

- an Olympic stamp on the cover will be tied with a black cancellation containing the pictorial character;
- a meter for the balance of the postage rate will be affixed to the front of the cover;
- the meter will be tied with the double ring circular (registry type) cancel to the cover;
- 4. the total postage on the cover will be the correct rate for the service required; and
- 5. the cover will be addressed.

The black cancel should explain the location of the meter machine whose number is printed on the meter tape. This is not always the case! For example, after I obtained boxing and athletics cancels on my covers at the Coliseum, meter service was refused at all the Coliseum post offices. So, I had to go to the swimming station four blocks away (and wait 45 minutes for it to open after lunch) to complete my service.

Some collectors simply didn't have the patience to wait in two lines. They simply went to the postal station and obtained the

meter only and sometimes did and did not remember to ask for the double ring cancel to the tie the meter to the cover. These covers are not incorrect; complete mail service was given as long as full postal rates were paid.


It was easy to be confused about the rates. For example, water polo is depicted on the airletter, reverse side. So the public was buying the airletter at the water polo venue. But suppose it is sent to a domestic (USA) address special delivery. Special delivery is \$2.10. First class is .20 domestic rate. Should the additional postage (by meter) be \$2.00 or \$2.10?

Many covers were made with too much postage because people often wanted to match the themes of the stamp and cancel. I was surprised to see almost no retail offers of the official labels. Also, the range of official Olympic picture postcards was surprisingly limited at the souvenir stands.


There were lines at cancellation tables and postal stations where-ever you went. My guess is that an average time was one hour at most of the venues except at the Coliseum where $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 hours was the norm except on closing day when it was 4 to 5 hours. This includes visits to both the cancellation tables and the postal station.

Some people apparently went to every venue to get the stamps pasted into their "Golden Moments" book with a matching venue cancel. Others (and most) will have the stamps with cancels of just one or a few venues.

There was one related naval cover made. The US Coast Guard Cutter POLAR STAR (WAGB-10) had a command and control platform for the sailing events at San Pedro Harbor. A special cachet was provided during the events. The naval clerk was rather sloppy in applying the rubberstamp cachet and my few covers are not very good. The sailing and yachting events took place at adjacent Long Beach.



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



POSTES, PHILATELIE ET OLYMPISME/POST, PHILATELY AND OLYMPISM - Volume I. Published by the International Olympic Committee. Giuseppe Sabelli Fioretti and Jose Maria Soler Vila, editors. Printed in Spain. Soft cover. 6 x 8 3/8 inches. 184 numbered pages. In French and English. Price US\$12.50 postpaid. From the International Olympic Committee, Chateau de Vidy, 1007 Lausanne. Switzerland.

This richly illustrated book with stamps all in color and many postmarks and some proofs blends a romantic narrative with a presentation of philatelic details. The period covered ranges from the origins of the ancient Olympic gods through the modern Olympic era to the IXth Olympic Congress in Berlin 1930.

There are prefaces by the president of the International Olympic Committe, Juan Antonio Samaranch and by the editors. Then comes The Myth of Olympia, Olympism primarily as depicted on

the Greek 1960 set, the twelve Gods of Olympia, Diagoras of Rhodes, Pierre de Fredi, baron de Coubertin, the vignette of the CIO. Then begins the philatelic chronology of the modern Olympic Games. There is a chapter on the Olympic flag. A final page presents a bibliography.

The book avoids the sterile conciseness of a listing. History is presented. The imaginative philatelist will find names and eventsthat would never have been associated with the Olympic Games if not otherwise explained here. Did you know that Chicago was originally selected for the IIIrd Olympiad in 1904? The book reports only 5 known copies of the supposed 20 originally produced of the J. P. Segg card with the proofs of the final Greek 1906 Olympic set. Did you know that the Olympic flag was originally first flown in Egypt in 1914 and why?

There are also technical details that tend to supplement data in Heiko Volk, Jr.'s master work DIE OLYMPISCHEN SPIELE IM BLICKPUNKT DER PHILATELIE UND IHREN RANDGEBIETEN (The Olympic Games in the Viewpoint of Philately and its Related Areas). The emphasis on the narrative approach fleshes out much of the conciseness of the detail in Volk's book. But the major plus for the IOC book is that it is in English and provides the big stepping stone for Olympic and sport collectors whether novice or advanced. This void has been a major gap for too many years. Ernest Trory's Philatelic History of the Olymic Games was issued piecemeal starting in 1956 and covered the Olympics only through 1936 and is long out of print.

The book is not without some lapses. The chapter on Diagoras of Rhodes is devoted exclusively to philatelic details and omits a narrative history of the subject. Most labels and seals are not illustrated. Some of the more complex listings—such as for the 1928 postal stationery—would have been better served with illustrations. The bibliography has only one English reference listed. Certainly Trory's work should have been listed.

There is a thorough treatment of the postmarks, but the illustrations appear to be slightly stylized by redrawing. There are some details on forged postmarks but they are not complete. Although many of the color illustrations are reduced from the originals, the color quality is excellent.

There is still room for in-depth specialist treatment for each Olympiad. The Olympic Committee stationery envelopes are not included. Much more could be illustrated of many things. However, this would be asking for practically a book on each Olympiad and that is not the scope of the volumes published by the IOC here.

The book is an indispensable reference for every Olympic collector. I look forward to future volumes with great interest.

Income increased in all categories except for mail sales and '32 Olympic Handbook. Dues income improved primarily because of additional new members rather than existing members prepaying dues. Total income improved by \$626.

Expenses increased by \$2051 after excluding computer. The largest increase was for JSP printing = \$1139. Some of the factors contributing to this increase were larger size of Journal, reprinting of back issues and check lists. All expense categories over \$100 increased versus the last fiscal year. These increase are considered within normal ranges. The award certificates and binder expense are not annual expenditures and were not amortized.

No increase in dues is needed to meet expected fiscal expenditures for the next \underline{two} fiscal years.

AUCTION RESULTS

by Dale Lilljedahl

On September 12-13, Greg Manning Auctions of Montville, New Jersey held an auction which included a reasonable number of Olympic lots. Although this sale did not match its June auction in the volumn of material, it still offered some interesting items. By far the most exciting lot was a block of four of the 1948 Oman overprint with a double surcharge which Scott values around \$300 for a single. From the picture it appeared well centered and was listed as very fine, never hinged. This block' price of \$850 far exceeded the sales price of any other Olympic item.

Manning usually only deals in stamps, so this auction included no covers: however, there was a good representation of imperforate material. with lots of Monaco 1948, Jugoslavia 1952, and Egypt 1960 issues. Also, several groups of the early Greece Olympic issues were sold. Below is a listing of the lots in chronological order. Included is a description of the lot, its selling price, as well as its estimated value when possible. The selling price does not include the 10% buyer's commission, and in all

cases the Scott numbers are used.

- 1896- Three lots of Greece #117-128 were offered. Two were listed as fine, never hinged and came with Dienna certificates. These sold for \$400 and \$230 against a catalogue of \$936.20. The third set lacked #121, but was otherwise listed as fine to very fine, never hinged and sold for \$325.
- 1896- Greece #117-128 on small pieces tied with Kerkyra July 9, 1898, c.d.s. except for #121 which had a May 31 c.d.s. This also came with a Dienna certificate and sold for \$220 against an estimated value of \$300-\$400.
- 1900- Greece #159-163. Fine to very fine with some never hinged. \$406 est./ \$135 sold.
- 1906- Greece #184-197. Fresh and fine to very fine with light hinges. Set comes with a Dienna certificate and sold for \$180 against a cataloge of \$690.
- 1906- Two lots of Greece #194-197. Both listed as fresh and fine to very fine with some never hinged. Against a catalogue of \$570, they sold for \$200 and \$375.
- 1924- Syria #133-136, two sets of blocks. Fine to very fine, never hinged with some small faults listed. \$360 est./ \$54 sold.
- 1924- Syria #133 with inverted surcharge. Fine to very fine with original gum. Signed "Brun." Sold for \$50 against a Yvert catalogue of \$121.
- 1924- Syria #166-169 Blocks. Very fresh, fine to very fine and never hinged. \$360 est./ \$115 sold.
- 1936- Germany #B79-B89 Blocks. Fresh, fine to very fine and never hinged. \$206 est./ \$70 sold.

- 1939- Haiti #B1, CB1,& CB2 Blocks (de Coubertin issue) Very fine and never hinged. \$350 est./ \$145 sold.
- 1948- Monaco #CB7-CB10 imperforate margin blocks. Very fine and never hinged. Sold for \$60 against a Yvert catalogue of \$187.
- 1948- Monaco #CB7-CB10 imperforate blocks. Very fine and some with light hinge. Sold for \$50 against a Yvert catalogue of \$165.
- 1948- Oman #30a double surcharge block. Very fine and never hinged with a Stanley Gibbons expert mark. \$1400 est./ \$850 sold.
- 1952- Two sets of Jugoslavia #359-364 imperforate. Both were very fine and never hinged with some gum skips. Against an estimate of \$250 they sold for \$56 and \$46.
- 1952- Two sets of Jugoslavia #359-364 imperforate pairs. Both are very fine never hinged with minor wrinkles. Against an estimate of \$500 they sold for \$90 and \$75.
- 1952- Two sets of Luxemburg #280-285 Blocks. Very fine and never hinged Against a \$201 estimate they sold for \$66 and \$60.
- 1960- Egypt #505-509 imperforate se-tenent strip of five from the bottom of the sheet with the control number. Extremely fine and never hinged. \$400-\$600 est./ \$350 sold.
- 1960- Panama #433-434, C234-C237 imperforate horizontal pairs. Very fine and never hinged. Only 100 issued. Sold for \$58.
- 1960- Panama #433-434, C234-C237 imperforate vertical pairs. Very fine and never hinged, some with Kessler expert marks. Sold for \$64.
- 1972- Germany #B490e booklet pane sheet containing 20 panes and 3 gutters. Very fine and never hinged with several folds along the perfs. Sold for \$58 against a Micheal catalogue of \$400.

BOOK REVIEWS

MANUAL OF PHILATELIC JUDGING, Second Edition. APS Judges Accreditation Committee. Bernard A. Hennig, Chairman. 1983. \$7.50 (20% discount available to APS members). American Philatelic Society, P O Box 8000, State College, PA 16803. Soft Cover. 69 pages. 4 x 9 inches.

This revised handbook should be in the library of every collector. There are many new ideas and clarifications that make the first edition obsolete and even misleading. There are eight chapters: judging an exhibit of traditional philately; presentation aspects of philatelic judging; judging the youthful exhibitor, judging postal history exhibits, judging thematic exhibits, judging philatelic literature exhibits, exhibit regulation guidelines; and APS regulations and definitions.

The chapter on youthful exhibitor is new. However, the chapter on thematic or topical exhibits is of particular interest to us.

There is emphasis on following the rules of the International Federation of Philately. The point system allowing only 10 points for presentation indicates that the FIP recognizes that collectors have improved their presentation techniques considerably over the years so that more attention can be devoted to subject and philatelic elements. These two elements are allocated 45 points each.

Nevertheless, newer collectors have yet to master presentation techniques through experience and will still find the challenge most important

It is the Plan of the Exhibit that receives considerably new discussion. "The plan...disciplines the exhibitor to arrange the exhibit in a logical, systematic sequence which the paragraph of introduction may not accomplish. The Plan is prepared in a table of contents or index order." The chapter headings should be indicative of the theme rather than philatelic material. Thus, a heading might be "1924 Olympic Winners" rather than "1924 Olympic Cancellations." "Carbon-copy" exhibits, such as might follow a catalog are discouraged.

Yet, the collector is strongly encouraged to include essays, proofs, specimens, errors, postal stationery, cancellations, meters, covers that went through the mail, etc. Neither should the collection contain a preponderance of any one such philatelic element, however.

There is discussion on stamps of countries with questionable philatelic practices. "While inclusion will no longer disqualify an exhibit internationally, the exhibit may lose a medal level or two...". "The use of items such as photographs, newspaper clippings, letters, press releases, picture postcards, is not acceptable within an exhibit, and the exhibit shall be downgraded accordingly." However, such material may be placed on Title or Plan pages.

"Covers that have passed through the mail are to be preferred to those that are shipped in wholesale lots to a dealer." How should you hardle the cover with a long set of stamps only one or two of which relate to your topic? Don't show it.

When is an overfranked cover acceptable in an exhibit? Only when the value on the stamp was suitable for an overweight package.

The rules are ambiguous for presenting oversize covers. They say avoid if at all possible and yet indicate ways to present them. Trim the #10 cover (horrors!). Mount diagonally (and twist your neck out of shape if you have too many such pages). Or mount the page horizontally in the exhibit frame (and too many such pages will push other material out of your exhibit). I would opt for either or both of the latter methods and consider buying an extra frame.

The stamp and thematic cancel on a FDC must be the primary reason for showing a First Day Cowr, not the cachet. "Most judges will tolerate a very few cachets to tell a point that could not be told otherwise." If you are trying for a very high award, having most judges on your side may not be enough.

There is much additional information. This booklet is highly recommended. The first edition was a complete sellout. Do not wait.

THE "IDEAL" OLYMPIC COVER?

The July 2 edition of LINN'S Stamp News ran an article describing the Olymphilex '84 Philatelic Exhibition held in Pasadena as part of the Olympic Arts Festival. Unable to attend in person, I decided to follow the article's instructions and order a copy of the Olymphilex program by mail from the Federated Philatelic Clubs of Southern California.


The \$3.50 purchase price proved to be one of my better philatelic investments of the Games, considering the deluge of material that has become available. Not only was the catalog a fine souvenir of the Olymphilex Exhibition, but the envelope in which it was mailed is nothing short of exceptional. (See Figure 1)

The \$1.05 First Class postage rate was covered by the 20 % diving commemorative in combination with an 85 % Olympic meter label. The stamp is tied with the July 25 (opening day) Olymphilex Station cancel in black (Type 1 - with killer bars), and the red meter label is tied with the red double ring Olympic handstamp. An extra bonus was provided in the form of a multicolored vignette featuring the mascot, Sam the Eagle, in a synchronized swimming pose.

The final "icing on the cake" is the fact that the meter label is erroneously dated "JUN 25" rather than "JUL 25", an error reported by Sherwin Podolsky in the September-October issue of JSP. (I wonder if his estimate of about 30 pieces of metered mail on July 25 includes the programs processed by F.P.C.S.C.)

This cover, which combines an Olympic stamp, venue cancel, meter, handstamp and vignette, while obviously being philatelically inspired, also performed the legitimate postal function of delivering my program.

Is it the "ideal" cover? Who is to say? In any event, thanks are due to the F.P.C.S.C. member(s) who painstakingly processed these highly collectable souvenirs.

The Slogan Cancels For The 1956

Melbourne Olympic Games

by Sherwin Podolsky

Gunter Schneider's "Die Poststempel der Welt zu den Olympischen Spielen 1906 - 1960" is still the definitive reference for many Olympic postmark collectors, particularly because it covers items after 1944, when Otto Volk's reference work stops.

Nevertheless, new information continually comes to light requiring updating of published information. Also, there is need to publish much of this information in English for the benefit of many collectors who have difficulty with other languages.

Here I wish to tackle an area that is still not too difficult to collect: the slogan cancels for the Olympic Games at Melbourne, 1956. Covers bearing these cancels are still not very expensive, but still elusive enough to provide challenge.

The basic element in the slogan cancel is the rectangle containing the Olympic rings above a torch and commemorative wording. This is illustrated below:



Usually we think of a slogan cancel as being a machine type. However, the 1956 slogan rectangle has been found to be used three different ways:


steel handstamp type in black I.

black machine cancel

A. round postmark dial
B. boxed postmark
III. red meter

Schneider doesn't report the steel handstamp type probably because it is actually a postal cachet. Figure 1 shows its use on a First Day Cover for the blue 2/-Olympic stamp on December 1, 1954. This is the only way I have seen this postal cachet used--only on these FDCs.

Schneider says that the postmark portion containing the city name, location and date comes round or boxed. The slogan portion appears either to the right or left of the postmark portion. However, he makes reference to this description in the context of machine cancella-



tions. All the examples I have seen of the machine slogan cancellations show the postmark portion to the left of the rectangular slogan portion.

Figure 2 shows a type IIA cancellation with round postmark dial. Figure 3 shows a type IIB cancellation with boxed postmark. Some of the type IIB postmarks come numbers at the left and right of the date; some come with no numbers. Figure 3 shows an example of a type IIB postmark without numbers at left and right of the date.

Figure 4 shows an example of a meter.

In all of the illustrations, I may have taken liberty to reinforce details with touching up.

Separately I have taken Schneider's listings and modified them to incorporate information from items in my collection. I would appreciate very much if readers can corroborate my listings. Items from my collection are noted by underlining in the listings. Listings not underlined are as reported by Schneider. The listing I have prepared thus remains tentative and subject to revision.







a binder.

Each issue is really sort of three-in-one, with a section on history, a section on folklore, and another on philately. The latter is in the charge of Charley Chesloe, and it appears that he is planning an in-depth chronological examination of Czech issues, with many illustrations covering specialist details like watermarks, varieties, etc. New issue information also appears.

Each section is page-numbered separately, so users need not have the meat loaf in with the new issues. The history section in the first issue includes a very attractive map, in color on heavy paper. Families of Czech heritage, or with interest in the country - philatelic or otherwise - would find "something for everyone" in this modestly-priced publication. The history and folklore parts are appealing and informative, and the philatelic section is knowledgeable and useful.
