

The 1984 baseball cancel program opened up with the Rockford '84 Stamp Exhibition cancel honoring Roberto Clemente, the former Pittsburgh Pirate star. This was the first of several cancels to be used in 1984 honoring Clemente, who was also honored this year with a commemorative postage stamp by the U.S.P.S.

Each year the New Britain, Connecticut post office notes the opening day of their minor league baseball team's season at Beehive Field with a special cancel.


1984 was an Olympic year and featured baseball as a demonstration sport and not as a full-fledged Olympic event. Prior to the start of the Olympics, the U.S. Olympic baseball team traveled throughout the country playing exhibition games against various teams. Only the Syracuse, New York post office noted this with a special cancel when the team played a team comprised of north eastern United States college all-stars in Syracuse. The Olympians won this game 7 to 4.



In July, the San Francisco post office used a special cancel at Candlestick Park noting the major league allstar game being played at the home field of the San Francisco Giants. The logo for the game is reproduced on the cancel and features a small illustration of the front of a cable car with an even smaller illustration of the logo of major league baseball. The National League all-stars again defeated the American League all-stars 3-1.




California also hosted the 1984 Summer Olympic. Special post office stations were set up at or near facilities for many of the events. The baseball station used two different baseball cancels, each being used July 31 through August 7.






On August 10, Parsippany, New Jersey hosted the 5th Annual National Sports Collectors Convention. This was noted with a special cancel featuring crossed baseball bats and a baseball.




On August 18-19, Omaha Expo '84, a stamp collectors exposition, was held and featured a special baseball cancel showing a glove and bat.



A Philatelic exhibition was also held in Puerto Rico on August 20-25 and used a special cancel honoring Roberto Clemente.




In September, a philatelic exhibition post office at OLEPEX, held in Olean, New York, used an attractive cancel honoring Roberto Clemente.




The baseball season ended in October with a bountiful

array of cancels.


The American League Playoffs between the Detroit Tigers and the Chicago White Sox were noted with a special cancel used at a post office operated at Tiger Stadium in Detroit, Michigan. This cancel was reportedly used October 2-5, however I have only been able to obtain cancels for October 2, 3, and 5.




The National League Playoffs between the San Diego Padres and the Chicago Cubs were noted with a cancel used at Jack Murphy Stadium, San Diego, California. This cancel was used October 4, 6 and 7.




World Series cancels were used in both Detroit and San Diego. The cancels used in Detroit were used October 9-10 and 12-14.




The World Series cancels for San Diego were used October 9-10. Detroit won the series 4 games to 1.



A philatelic exhibition post office at WESPNEX used a special cancel on October 12 and 13 featuring a young girl wearing a bonnet, looking in a mirror and posing with a baseball bat in hand. The cancel notes Women's Day at Yankee Stadium. As the baseball season was over by this time, I suppose this event was a women's rally and dealt more with political matters than sport.



POWPEX '84 in San Diego, California featured a special baseball cancel honoring the Padres winning of the National League Championship. The cancel was used at the philatelic station's post office on October 27 and 28.
















THINGS TO SEND FOR

Non-philatelic collectibles, including Olympic, are offered in the auction catalogs of Kurt R. Krueger, Suite H, 160 N. Washington, Iola, Wisconsin 54945. Catalogs are sent only against advance payment of \$4.00. Items include baseball pins and games. Material includes medals, tokens, paper items.

If you are not a member of the International Federation of Olympic Philately, you are missing many free items. Membership is free but you must fill out an application and attach two passport-size photographs of yourself. Your application should describe your philatelic activities and should relate to Olympic philately--even if you are interested in only an Olympic-type sport, merely used Olympic stamps, or only one Olympiad or any other aspect of the Olympic Games including ancient Olympics and Pierre de Coubertin (founder) and the International Olympic Committee. Free applications are obtainable from Sherwin Podolsky for a stamped, addressed envelope or IRC. You can then send me your completed application for review, signature and return to you and then you send to the International Olympic Committee for acceptance. You may have to wait a bit because the executive committee reviews all applications

for acceptance and it holds periodic meetings. The IOC uses commemorative meters, and has offered bulletins, substantial Olympic philatelic history catalog, and other freebies. They come as nice surprises and no one knows what is coming next. They also have many beautiful items for sale -- magnificent books (the one on Olympism through Posters is a stunner) and well-made and colorful picture postcards. Some postcard designs are allegorical or reproduce Olympic posters. You can also write Monique Berlioux, director, International Olympic Committee, Chateau de Vidy, Lausanne, Switzerland. The International Federation of Olympic Philately under the sponsorship and patronage of the International Olympic Committee. When writing Mme. Berlioux, tell her you read about it in our Journal of Sports Philately published by Sports Philatelists International.



"PHAR LAP"

A set of four stamps was issued by Austalia on October 18, 1978 which featured horse racing. The 50c. value showed the famous racing horse "Phar Lap".

The Australian Philatelic Bulletin (No. 138, January

1979) noted that:

"Phar Lap remains a legendary figure more than 46 years after his tragic death in America. This magnificent chestnut gelding, the 1930 Melbourne Cup winner, ran a total of 41 placing in 50 starts in Australia before going to race in America in 1932.

On March 20, 1932 he was hailed as champion of the world when he won, in record time, the Agua Cliente

Handicap, then the richest race in the world."

This famous horse was born and bred in South Canterbury,


New Zealand and was later sold to Australian owners. On November 22, 1983 a special postmark was used in Geraldine, New Zealand, (birth place of Phar Lap) in honor of this legendary racing horse.

A REPORT FROM OLYMPHILEX '85

I did not attend this fabulous show held under the auspices of the International Olympic Committee at Lausanne, Switzerland in March, 1985. Although I am on the board of FIPO, the International Federation of Olympic Philately and the IOC has paid for the trips of board members to meetings in Lausanne in the past, the IOC decided to pay for trips for only the persons most immediately involved with the show. I did not find out about this until it was too late to make any plans on my own to attend.

Nevertheless, I have some information from Manfred Bergman, Alex Borsody, Morris Rosen and others that I am compiling into this report. Some of the comments are candid, so I won't always tell you who said what. No doubt there will be other and separate reports (I hope) that will shed light on the many facets of the show. It is always interesting to compare points of view.

Dr. Bergman notes that "the show was really nice. However, there were only two levels of collections, the very good ones and the very poor ones - mostly from the eastern bloc, Turkey, Spain and others."

"Swapping was very active in the last two days, but nothing exceptional from the collectors." Volk sold off his private collections which made some people very happy. An original 1896 book was offered.

The years shown were mostly 1896 to 1936 and the most popular year shown was 1936. "This is because so much material is available, but it shows lack of efforts."

Already everybody is thinking about the next OLYMPHILEX which will take place in Rome in 1987. According to Dr. Bergman, FIPO decided to make the show every two years, but not in an Olympic year. FIPO will leave the organization of philatelic exhibitions in the Olympic years to the organizing committees of the Olympic Games. A representative from Calgary was in Lausanne and discussed the show for the Olympics at Calgary in 1988.

FILTEMA, Via Targioni Tozzetti, 33 D, 50144 Firenze, Italy sent out a black and white but deluxe auction catalog devoted exclusively to sports, Olympics and scouts. Over 2,500 lots profusely illustrated with many at modest minimum bid start prices (thanks to the strong U.S. dollar). The catalog indicates closing date of June 10, 1985, too late for you readers. But try to get on the mailing list in order not to miss the next opportunity. Although in Italian, there is an English-French-German explanation of symbols and abbreviations. Also, key words are translated into the three indicated languages. There is a 10% buyers commission, plus 1,000 Lira charge per lot purchased (about 50¢ at current exchange) plus 18% Value Added Tax. But overseas buyers may not be subject to the VAT. Inquire about that nuisance if you wish. The catalog has the finest assembly of items for individual sports that I have seen anywhere. The back-ofthe-book material includes lovely postcards, proofs and errors, and a very large offering of vignettes, seals, labels and poster stamps. There is a profusion of material with bid prices below \$10 at current exchange rates. Try not to miss this one. FILTEMA is located in Florence, Italy. Phone number (055) 350281. This might be a worthwhile stop if you are visiting Europe. (Firenze is the Italian spelling of Florence.)

If overseas readers wish to send postage to a US person, please note that postage rates went up in February, 1985. Surface letter rate from USA to countries other than Canada and Mexico is 37¢ for the first ounce plus plus 20¢ for each additional ounce up to 8 ounces. Airmail to most overseas countries is 44¢ per half-ounce. Postcards surface rate are 25¢ each and airmail postcards are 33¢. For other rates, please ask your correspondent.

The early Greek issues were well represented, as well as the imperforates of Third World nation's Olympic issues since 1964. In the listing below I do not include the "dealer" lots which contain multiple sets, and the prices do not include the 10% buyer's premium. Scott numbers are used throughout.

MORE NOTES ON THE 1984 LOS ANGELES OLYMPICS

Laurentz Jonker wishes to add his comments about the USPS meters inscribed LOS ANGELES OLYMPICS that were used at the Olympic post office venues. I quote almost verbatim from them and have tried to limit the editing to purely grammatical adjustments:

"The postal clerks at the Olympic post offices were mostly angry at the improper use of the meters. The meters were intended only for special mail as special delivery, certified mail, registered mail, parcel post and insured mail. Philatelists at the Olympics would use low value meters and that was incorrect. These clerks said that Olympic stamps should have been used for low value and low rate postage. (Of course, that was not always so because there were still rate problems with low denominations not met by the available and limited selection of stamps.) I know the problem gave the postal clerks much irritation. The lady postal clerk supervisor at OLYMPHILEX '84 station, Pat Vines, told Laurentz that his registered covers were no problem for the meters, but she did not like selling dry meters and low value meters.

"The postal clerks were upset when ordered by Allan Nesland, the headquarters supervisor, to accede to collector wishes in selling the meters."

Readers may recall that the available postage consisted only of the Olympic stamps plus the .20 Jim Thorpe and .20 Babe Ruth stamps. Sometimes domestic rate mail had a .13 Olympic stamp and request was made for a .07 meter to meet the .20 first class domestic rate. While this was a good way for collectors to use up excess .13 Olympic stamps, the postal clerks sometimes were not pleased with supplying such low rate .07 meters.

Also, Pat Vines did not sell any stamps or meters. Although a supervisor, she mainly applied the black venue cancels at a separate table and did not handle money transactions. When she heard her subordinates were selling low value meters, she decreed a \$1.00 minimum value for meters until collector complaints to Mr. Nesland resulted in an order to her to rescind the practice.

In the October, 1983 "Document FIPO NO. 3," Maurizio Tecardi shows pictures of some of the post office stations at the Olympic venues. He also makes comments on the uses of the special meter.

Tecardi notes that OLYMPHILEX station meter (No. 3300619) with the date 25 July 1984 are very rare. Most meters used that date show the month as June in error. Also, the meter did not function July 30 through August 3 because it needed repairs. However, the story this writer has is that the supervisor shut it down as a rebuke for alleged abuse by collectors for small-value meters.

The Pentathlon meter at Trabuco Canyon, No. 3301128 was not used on July 29, 1984.

On August 6, 1984, the meter machine of the swimming stadium post office posted all mail with the date of August 7,1984. That was meter number 3312477.

The Olympic Village, UCLA meter machine worked only a few minutes on August 12, 1984. It appears that only 30 cancellations were made for postcards and letters and 8 dry tapes with "00" value were made. This writer believes that Tecardi obtained all these items.

Tecardi reports that the USC Olympic Village machine was operated only on July 31 and August 12. However, mail posted on August 12 received a date of "12 JUL 84" in error. On July 12, 1984 the USC Olympic Village and its post office were not yet opened.

The IOC meter No. 3328453 was not used on August 12 due to lack of gummed paper.

Tecardi reports that the round double ring rubberstamp inscribed "LOS ANGELES 1984 OLYMPIC GAMES" was used in red ink at all the post offices except on the mobile post offices of the Pentathlon and Judo which applied the rubberstamp only in black. Readers may like to verify this report against their findings.

Tim Nagel adds to the report on the single dial HOST 1932-1984 OLYMPICS machine cancel. He adds:

A13 used on June 11 26A inverted used on an unclear date

Arco Metals Co., ALSCO, 1 Cascade Plce, Suite 1800, Akron, OH 44308 used an especially attractive meter with slogan reading: ARCO COMPANIES SUPPORT THE 23RD OLYMPICS. It also includes the Olympic rings. Meter No. is 3041776. I was able to get an example for myself, but subsequent correspondence from the firm indicates a change of slogan.

OLYMPIC NOTES

FDC Publishing Co, Box 206 Stewartsville, NJ 0886 has just published another round of specialized catalogs which contain information on certain U.S. Olympic stamps.

Mellone's Specialized Cachet Catalog of First Day Covers of the 1960s, Volume I 1960-1963 includes Scott #1146, the 4¢ stamp for the VIII Olympic Winter Games at Squaw Valley, California in 1960. 25 cachets are illustrated and are valued from \$1.50 to \$25 each. The most expensive is the hand-painted cachet by Ralph Dyer. There are five cachets listed at \$10 or \$15 apiece. The one by the Squaw Valley Olympic Committee showing the official emblem is priced at \$10. It is still fairly common and can be found for much less.

The Scott 1985 U. S. First Day Cover Catalog is very handy and a bargain at \$3.50. At best it only gives an overview of prices for cacheted FDCs. A special chart gives multiple premiums for the better known (and not necessarily more common) cachets. I found the pricing for the 1932 Olympic FDCs of particular interest. A cacheted FDC at the official city for the 2¢ 1932 Olympic stamp (single) has a basic price of \$15.00 and its uncacheted variety is priced at \$7. Covers canceled at Washington, DC on next day, 1/26/32, are priced at \$10 cacheted. However, a cacheted cover at an unofficial FD city is priced at only \$20. This is an incredible bargain. Perhaps not more than 6 or 10 FDCs are known canceled on FD 1/25/32 with postmarks of cities other than Lake Placid, NY. And it doesn't matter whether those unofficial FDCs are cacheted or not. The catalog gives no price for unofficial FDCs without cachet.

The price of \$75 is given the 2¢ 1932 Olympic FDC with the Beverly Hills cachet which is illustrated in the catalog. This is not a particularly attractive cachet in black, a vertical rectangle with 7 lines of wording and a couple of small printer's decorations. Nevertheless it is the first cachet by this particular cachetmaker and the market for this item is apparently set by FDC specialists rather than sport and Olympic topicalists.

Scott gives a premium multiple of only 3% for the 1932 2¢ Olympic FDC with Beazell cachet. This translates to only \$45. Nevertheless, such FDCs are trading in the marketplace for about \$150 apiece, down from the heated level of \$200 a few years ago. Knowledgeable Beazell specialists estimate that Robert C. Beazell made only about ten of each cachet but those made from 1935 to 1937 are scarcer and have a premium multiple of 12%.


Prices for unofficial FDCs for later US Olympic stamps (1960 and on) are not given in the catalogs. No unofficial FDC for the 1960 Winter Olympic stamp of the USA has ever been reported.

In the topical categories of competitive exhibitions, cachet varieties have generally not been accepted by judges. Covers with corner addresses of related organizations have been accepted without question. An example might be a cover of an Olympic organizing committee in an Olympic exhibit. The American First Day Cover Society is developing judging criteria for FDC exhibits which includes appreciation and recognition for cachets, among other things. Thus, an exhibit emphasizing cachets properly should be shown competitively in those exhibitions sponsored by the AFDCS. In time, however,

I expect that the American Philatelic Society will recognize judging criteria for FDCs and collectors will eventually feel more confident about exhibiting cacheted material in shows judged by the APS rules.

Nevertheless, the showing of cachet varieties of FDC probably should not result in demerits in competitive judging. It isn't as bad as showing a fake and not labeling as such. This faux pas can result in demerits, a lower award. In topical exhibits, it is probably better to emphasize the postmark varieties if one wants to gain points. There are no points, or very little, if any, in showing cachet varieties.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

ANSWER THE CALL

Despite appeals in the last two issues of JSP, no one has come forth to volunteer to serve as nominations chairperson for the 1986 SPI elections. We are looking for a person who is not serving in any officer capacity to independently solicit the present list of officers to determine their willingness to continue to serve in their same or other capacities. When this nominations chairperson is identified, an announcement would appear in JSP inviting other SPI members to run for office. That chairperson would negotiate a slate to present to the membership.

Although we have nearly 400 members, and our membership is growing, participation by members in the USA has been particularly poor. I find that in other sport philatelic organizations—in France, Italy, and in German-speaking countries—the willingness to serve is much more obvious and generous.

Why do USA members make such a poor showing of themselves? Well, I can give credit that some often share their ideas but incredibly few are willing to give their time and action to their words. Very few will make the time.

What is the alternative to this attitude? The alternative will be an atrophy of service. The few who do the work will become discouraged and some are already tired. None of us is looking for a lifetime of this voluntary work in one organization.

SPI will do best with a rotation of officers with periodic fresh enthusiasm and service. The more hands willing to give of their time, the more work can be shared to lighten anyone's burden. We do not need volunteers who will make a promise of commitment and who will not follow through.

I really don't have the answers for the apathy of USA members. Perhaps some of you will kindly fill me in. One answer might be: I only collect tug-of-war on stamps and this organization doesn't really share my specialized interest enough. Some of you are professional dealers and may feel a conflict of interest in serving. Some of you are too new in SPI to be familiar with it. Or some other excuse. In my opinion, there are very few valid excuses because the ones offered apply to many other organizations and USA members' participation is proportionally too low.

What are the selfish reasons to serve? You will find opportunities to exchange and find material for your collection indirectly but definitely increased. A personal dimension within your hobby will develop to be most satisfying. You will find sources of information beyond the traditional. You will become exposed to organized philately. You will eventually become a person instead of being on the receiving end all the time who will share and encourage and promote.

What do you choose to be?


- Q- 104 I understand that McDonald's has underwritten the cost of the swim stadium and 7-Eleven has financed the construction of the velodrome for the Los Angeles Olympic games. Can anyone provide information, including the names of the architects, for these Los Angeles venues?
- A- 104 An article in the July, 1982 issue of Los Angeles magazine confirms the fact that McDonald's paid for the swimming and diving facilities for the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic games at the University of Southern California which, according to the article, cost \$ 4 million. The \$ 3 million, 8000 seat velodrome, located on the campus of Cal State in Dominguez Hills, was financed by the Southland Corporation owners of the 7-Eleven chain.

Barclay F. Gordon's "Olympic Architecture", published in 1983 by John Wiley & Sons, credits Flewelling & Moody with technical support from Bill Rowley for the design of the open-air, temporary seated swim facilities which will be roofed after the Games. W.Ted Tyler Associates provided the plans for the 13 to 33 degree concrete banked velodrome which was, like the swim facilities, unenclosed.
