FINLAND'S OLYMPICS - AN ADDENDUM

Edited by S. Podolsky and G. Scheffel

Correspondence has been received from Ossi Virtanen giving further information regarding two articles that he submitted and were published in earlier editions of the Journal of Sports Philately. The articles were "Helsinki's Olympic Stadium" which was printed in the September - October 1985 issue and "Finland's Olympic Slogan Cancels" in the November - December 1985 issue.

Mr. Virtanen advises that the height of the tower at the Olympic Stadium was indeed 72 meters but that the fact that the world record for the javelin toss was also 72 meters was mere chance, not pre-planned

He also furnished a complete list of the Olympic Slogan Cancels used in Finland in 1948. Slogan cancels were used in twelve cities and three of the cancels were bilingual. They also urged Olympic contributions. He included a photocopy of a meter "Maailmat Kohtaavat" - "The Meeting of the Nations" which was used in 1953.

The contributions requested in the Olympic slogans were used to finance participation of the Finnish Team to the Olympic Games in London in 1948. The Swedish text in the three cancels was there because according to the Finnish Constitution there are two official languages in Finland - Finnish and Swedish. Bilingual cancels were used by three of the twelve cities



The cancellation translates to: "Remember the Olympic Contribution" or "Don't Forget the Olympic Contribution" in Finnish. The bilingual (Swedish and Finnish) cancels were used at Helsinki - Helsingfors, Turku - Abo and Vaasa - Vasa. Note that the bilingual text was used well into 1949 at Vaasa - Vasa while other cities appear to have used the slogan only in the 1948 Olympic year.

Figure 1. The bilingual continuous slogan as used at Helsinki - Helsingfors in 1948. Rectangular lines have been reinforced for the purpose of illustration. Actual cancels have many or most of the lines missing.



Figure 2. The Finnish continuous slogan cancel used at Kotka in 1948. There are usually faint traces of lines from the box containing the slogan.



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

The slogan meter used by a Finnish film company to publicize its Olympic film "Maailmat Kohtaavat" which translates to "The Meeting of the Nations." The slogan also includes the Olympic rings and a view of the tower of the Olympic Stadium in Helsinki. Mr. Virtanen reports acquiring this cover showing the meter very recently. This meter is dated January 5, 1953.

100™ WENLOCK OLYMPIAN GAMES 1986

The modern Olympic movement is generally dated from 1894 and the International Congress of Paris, at which, under the inspiration of Pierre de Coubertin it was agreed to re-establish the ancient Olympic Games, and to hold them, in proper Hellenic tradition, in Athens in 1896. International sport was a growing phenomenon in the nineteenth century, and there were many influences on the decision to resurrect the Olympic Games. Not insignificant among those influences were Dr. William Penny Brookes and the Much Wenlock Olympian Society.

Much Wenlock was, and still is, a small country town. It is in the heart of England, a few miles from Birmingham, Britain's contender for the 1992 Olympics. Dr. Brookes was an important figure in the town, and he had a strong and active desire to improve the quality of life for ordinary folk. In 1850 he founded the Much Wenlock Olympian Society "for the promotion of the moral, physical and intellectual improve-ment" of working people by, amongst other things "the award of prizes annually at public meeting for skill in athletic exercises and proficiency in intellectual and industrial attainments".

The first Wenlock Olympian Games were held in the town in 1850. The events were more traditional rustic sports than the classical Olympic events, and included football, an old women's race for a pound of tea, and chasing a pig through the town. By the 1870's however athletics events were dominant, with both track and field events, the pentathlon having been introduced in 1868. The Games had become a national event and attracted competitors from all over the country. Pageantry remained part of the Games, with a procession of the athletes through the town, olive crowns and medals for the winners, and the most popular event was still a variant of mediæval tilting with the lance, with costumed competitors.

Dr. Brookes was a man of wide horizons, and not just at the national level. In 1859 the society sent a prize of £10 to games held in Athens, the winner of which was made an honorary member of the Wenlock Olympian Society. In 1877 King George I of Greece presented Dr. Brookes with a trophy, which he received at Britain's National Olympian Association Games of that year. Dr. Brookes had helped found that Association in 1865.

In 1890 de Coubertin visited the Games in Much Wenlock, and later that year wrote in "La Révue Athlétique" praising Dr. Brookes and his Olympic ideals and aims. Coubertin was made an honorary member of the Wenlock Olympian Society, and a special Games was organised for his benefit.

1986 sees the 100TM celebration of those Games which are being held on 19 and 20 July. The Society of Olympic Collectors is sponsoring a special post office handstamp to mark the occasion, and publishing a postcard showing the crowning of the champion in 1868, plus a special cacheted cover which will contain the official Wenlock Museum postcard as a filler. The SOC postcard is \$1 unused or \$2.50 serviced. The cacheted cover, serviced with the postmark, and Museum postcard together are \$4.50. AUCTION RESULTS

by Dale Lilljedahl

In the last issue of JSP, the auction results article covered the early Greek issues (1986-1906) of the David Feldman SA, Geneva mail auction of November 29, 1985, and as promised, this issue covers the remainder of Feldman's Olympic section. While none of the Olympic games between 1912 and 1964 are extensively represented, the items offered could enhance any collection. The relatively young age of the material seemed to keep the prices a little more reasonable than the Greek lots even though some of the pieces were extremely rare.

Again all of the lots are not listed. Some of the materia; did not sell, and because of Feldman's reserve bid policy, I excluded any lots selling at exactly the estimated price. True, I am probably leaving out a few genuine bids, but overall this omission provides a better feel for the true value of the material. It seemed a little suspicious that 30% to 40% of the lots sold for the exact estimated price, and I assumed that the reserve bid policy came into effect on these lots. The prices realized are in US dollars and are converted from Swiss francs at a rate of \$0.50 tp each franc. The prices do not include the 15% buyers commission.

LETS POOL OUR OLYMPIC AND SPORTS KNOWLEDGE

Sports and Olympic philatelists have, collectively, a great deal of knowledge, which when pooled, can be of mutual benefit. 106- A Yes, the International Business Machines Corporation overprinted a 40 yen Japanese postal card to publicize their role in the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic games. On the bottom quarter of these cards are the initials IBM, the "Moving Stars" logo and Japanese text which, translated, reads, "IBM computers play an important role at the '84 Los Angeles Olympics/ IBM works with society."

IBM, during the Los Angeles 1984 games, had in operation from July 14 to Aug.13 an Olympic Message Voice System which provided an effective way of communicating with Olympic athletes or officials inside the two Olympic Villages. Its use was available twenty-four hours a day in twelve national languages (Arabic, English, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Mandarin, Norwegian, Spanish, Portuguese and Russian).

In addition to the main message center which was set up opposite the temporary post office in Los Angeles Hotel Biltmore there were several kiosks at both the UCLA and USC Olympic Villages.

Instructions on the correction sticker affixed to the front of the 1984 Olympic Message System User's Guide, which was available in English from the IBM Corporation, Old Orchard Road, Armonk, New York 10504 read, "From inside the UCLA Olympic Village, dial 8540 for the UCLA OMS. From Olympic phones outside the UCLA Village dial 9-209-8540 for the UCLA OMS. From other phones outside the Village, dial 209-8540. From inside the USC Olympic Village, dial 4560 for the USC OMS.From Olympic phones outside the USC Village, dial 9-740-4560 for the USC OMS. From all other phones outside the Village dial 740-4560.

The guide also discusses the importance of the message system, explains how it worked, listed each countrys code letters and provided example messages.

- Q- 108 I heard that Youth Activities were held in conjunction with the Los Angeles Olympic games. Can anyone provide information about these competitions?
- Q- 109 I am interested in the 1976 Olympic games one and two dollar sculpture values that were issued by the Canadian Post Office.
- A-109 On March 14,1975 the Canadian Post issued embossed one and two dollar 1976 Olympic games Sculptures in miniature sheets of eight for each value as part of their pre-olympic postage stamp program. The panes were six color lithographed on one side coated paper by Ashton Potter Limited.

The one and two dollar stamp designs by Allan R. Fleming were based on Robert Tait McKenzie's "The Sprinter" located in the R.Tait Memorial Museum at the Mill of Kintail in Almonte and "The Plunger" which is on view at The Art Gallery of Ontario.

According to the Canadian Post's bulletin for the issue Robert Tait McKenzie was born in 1867 at Almonte, Ontario and died in Philadelphia, Pa.in 1938. Interested in such sports as gymnastics, high-jumping, hurdling, boxing, football, swimming and fencing he graduated from McGill University with a degree in medicine and became its medical director of physical education, chief instructor at the gymnasium and anatomy professor. He also was a specialist in orthopedic surgery and is known for his research on spinal problems.

He began to sculpt as a means of using statuary for teaching and research. In his own words, "It was to show the ideal... form of a sprinter (by averaging the) dimensions of successful individuals." Both "The Sprinter" and "The Plunger" were intended to show the beauty of the healthy human form at the moment of resolve. The doctor believed that athletic sculpture illustrated the link between physical and spiritual virtue.

In 1904 he accepted the Directorship of the University of Pennsylvania's Physical Education Department which was offered to him. During World War I he served as a rehabilitation expert.

Dear Fellow Gymnastics Collector:

I was elated to discover a membership list with corresponding philatelic interests in the May-June issue of the $\underline{\sf SPI}$ Journal. Having only been a member of SPI for a little over a year (and wondering how many other "flipped-out" collectors there might be out there) this seemed like a perfect opportunity to establish contacts.

As I am not personally acquainted with any of you, a little about myself as an introduction. Although a competitor in high school in Europe, my "career" ended early. After dabbling briefly in coaching, my aspirations now lean toward judging Men's Gymnastics (I'm presently working on obtaining my judging credentials). Like most, general collecting became less feasible with the flood of new issues, so after college in the late 70's I resumed the hobby with Olympics in mind. It was only a short step from there to collecting my real love, gymnastics. Even though the Olympics with its many facets still comprises the majority of my collection, the gymnastics issues (mint, FDC, cancels, proofs, and memorabilia) are the first items I obtain. I hope to exhibit for the first time this fall with a selection of gymnastics material; the theme is as yet undecided.

The real purpose of this letter is to draw our small group together and hopefully fill out our ranks with some of SPI's general Olympicians (I wonder if that's the proper term?). With only nine members sharing our specialty (don't forget the SOKOL collectors) it would certainly be easy enough to exchange information in this newletter-type format. Let's not hesitate to include, besides news, items for sale, trading, or want lists. I am going to mail a copy of this on to our SPI editor, John La Porta, and see if we can get a "Gymnastics Page" for each issue. Why should the baseball, tennis and golf buffs have all the fun!

Let me know what you think of this idea. I would be more than willing to work as the clearinghouse for our collective interests in putting together our bi-monthly page, should we get it.

In keeping with this first newsletter (and I hope not the last), some news. I was fortunate enough to attend the XXIIIrd World Gymnastics Championships in Montreal, Canada last fall. They were held from November 3 through 10, 1985, at the Olympic Velodrome, site of the 1976 Olympic Cycling events. The competition was extremely exciting even though our U.S. team was left weakened by the retirement of most of our 1984 Olympians. The men's team, led by Olympian Tim Daggett, suffered a major setback on the first day when Dan Hayden was injured, leaving our depleated and demoralized ranks one short. They never completely recovered, taking 9th in the team competition. Scott Johnson was our highest All-Around finisher at 22nd, and we had no qualifiers into Event Finals.

The women, on the other hand, did very well against superb Eastern European competition. Locking up 6th place in the Team finals, we had 3 finishers in the top 20 All-Around (they therefore qualify to the World Cup this August in Beijing, China). Sabrina Mar, the only U.S. woman to compete in Event Finals, managed 6th place in Vault.

Unfortunately, there were no philatelic items issued or commemorative cancels used, to the best of my knowledge. However, I did prepare a special cachet, handpainted in 4 colors, which I franked with the 39¢ Christmas issue. A few of these covers were sent through the mails, the rest were hand cancelled at the branch post office in the Place Desjardins, under the Meridien Hotel where I and most of the U.S. non-athlete official contingent stayed. I do have a few of the former and many of the latter covers available for \$2.50 each plus SASE (#10 please). BE ADVISED that the hand cancels are rather poorly applied (i.e. partial cancel or slightly smudged). I will send the best of what I have. A reduced illustration of the cover is pictured below.


SOME AGREEMENT WITH BOB WILCOCK'S CRITIOUE

I very much appreciated Bob's letter, "In Defense of Frivolity" in the May-June 1986 issue of JSP, and I'm inclined to agree with aspects of his constructive criticism of my Olymphilex '85 exhibit, as he opened my eyes to the fact that, "I couldn't see the forest for the trees".

I can now understand how my exhibit may well have come across as "frivolous". Too much of my exhibit was composed of, "raw material" with too few completed covers. I can see where my exhibit might have projected an image of an exhibitor who, as an aferthought, somewhat uncaringly, and with disinterest, threw some random bits and pieces together to fill up a frame.


I had neglected to explain the displays of, (too many) cut cancel/ stamp combinations, and how I used them to construct, "kit-build" my own completed Olympic covers, (of which there were too few). Thus, an exhibit of incompleteness. Also, I took too much for granted, with too few explanations.



My major problem is in being spread too thin. I have too many philatelic topical interests not only in Olympics, but also in trains, dirigibles, the Antarctic, aircraft, and nature to name a few. Too much time is spent in obtaining and collecting large quantities of pictorial, and historial anniversary dated cancels, on "blank" envelopes and pages, with most "squirreled away" for some future date when I can find the time(?) to use them to "kit-build" completed covers. I have a large package of (U.S.) postal cancels from the 1984 Winter Olympics, but have yet to complete a single cover. If, I could ever reapply myself to this topic, and fabricate my Winter Olympic cover collection in time, I could offer it as an exhibit for Olymphilex '87 in Rome, as per Bob Wicock's kind expressed hope. Much in my Olympic collection remains undone and incomplete.

I am rather proud of my few completed 1984 Summer Olympic items. One of which, shown in fig. 1, was inspired by the unique postal "preproduction" cancel shown in my article, "In Defense of my Olymphilex '85" in the March-April 1986 issue of JSP. The Polish gold medalist runner in the 1932 LA Olympics inspired my artistic creativity, and I pen-and-inked my own artwork, made into a rubber stamp, celebrating that same Polish runner, in my own private pictorial cancel. Bob was right, in his critique letter. I did find some non-Olympic stamps to use with my Olympic cancels. In the Fig. 1 example, I wanted to use a U.S. stamp that would tie-in with the Polish gold medalist. This is only one of numerous varieties. In some instances, I used non-Olympic Polish stamps, also. The example "minus-value cancel" was cut from a page with the sum total first class postage.

The following figures show some of my completed covers on both sides. Cut-out stamp and cancel combinations, and cachets, (cut-out illustrations from magazines) are applied to the envelopes with adhesive, then all parts and "tied" with additional first class postage and cancels.



BOWLING - MAILER'S POSTMARK PERMIT DISCOVERED

Figure 1 shows the 1971 U.S. Bowling 8¢ postal stationery envelope (Scott U563) overprinted with a very unusual blue and red pictorial mailer's postmark permit indicia.


The indicia is entirely in blue but the date is rubber-stamped Oct 24 1971 in red. The design shows a bowler making a strike and pins being knocked over appear in the red circular portion of the imprinted postage. Tying the indicia and imprinted postage is the black stamp show cancel of FLOREX '71, Orlando, Florida dated October 23, 1971. The blue indicia includes the wording: "Florex Bowls Your Over October 22, 23, 24 1971." Included in the pictorial portion of the indicia are three "x" in a row which in American bowling means three strikes in a row.

It is known that at one time the US Postal Service allowed the private creation of mailer's postmark permits. Subsequently, pictorial and commemorative types of designs in the mailer's postmark permit indicia were no longer approved and strict design limitations were imposed. Mailer's postmark permit indicia are still permissible but their creation and use are under more strict regulation.


The item is unaddressed and was found in a box of dealer bargain covers at a bourse. As is typical of stamp show covers, this one is unaddressed.

The first class postage rate was $8\mathfrak{c}$ in October, 1971, so the reason for double postage is unclear. Certainly the $8\mathfrak{c}$ imprinted postage was sufficient and the $8\mathfrak{c}$ adhesive stamp (John Sloan, American Artist, Scott 1433) was unnecessary.


